Kip Won't Pick Winner

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Coach Kip Taylor, whose Oregon State Beavers have played both UCLA and Southern California, says it's hard to decide which of the two Rose Bowl contenders is the toughest opponent.

Offensively, UCLA is "tremendously better" than USC, Taylor said after the Bruins thrashed the Beavers 37-0 in a Pacific Coast Conference contest at Los Angeles Saturday.

BETTER DEFENSE
The Bruins, who whipped OSC 28-6 earlier in the season, have a better defense, Taylor added. He refused to predict a winner in the USC-UCLA clash Nov. 22.

UCLA's powerful offense simply overwhelmed Oregon State at Los Angeles. The Bruins had 24 first downs to nine for the Beavers; gained 263 yards rushing to 14 for OSC, and completed 12 of 26 passes for 209 yards. Oregon State completed 15 of 31 passes gaining 122 yards.

SPARK
Halfback Paul Cameron sparked the Bruins to their eighth win of the season. And despite valiant efforts of fullback Sam Baker and quarterback Chuck Brackbill, the Beavers crossed the midfield stripe only three times and never farther than the UCLA 35.

Beaver blunders in the opening minutes gave the Bruins a 4-0 lead on two safeties. UCLA then crashed through for four first half touchdowns and led 20-0 at the intermission. They added four more touchdowns in the second half.

IT WAS HILL
A story in Saturday's Herald and News regarding the Merrill-Jacksonville football game indicated that Jack Hendrickson kicked the conversion point which proved to be the margin of victory in the Huskies' 13-12 upset of Jacksonville Friday night.

According to later reports, and to give credit where credit is due, Hill Hill, Merrill line-man, kicked the point.

Merrill's winner over the Jacksonville Redskins earns them the right to meet the district six champion in the quarter final round of the Class B Oregon High School football tournament.

Bounce-Back Huskies Stand in Troy's Way

SEATTLE (AP) — Overlooked at the season's start and still not considered such a much just a month ago, Washington's football Huskies were baying Monday like a pack of killers at the heels of the Pacific Coast Conference leaders.

If there were any doubts remaining that the Huskies had, by their stride they settled 'em Saturday by applying a thick coat of turpentine to California's Golden Bears. The 22-7 upset victory tightened the Washington grip on third place and left them with an outside chance at the bid to the Rose Bowl.

To get it, they'll have to turn in another stunner this weekend against Southern California's unbeaten mighty Trojans and then trim Washington State while hoping for a Trojan triumph over unwhipped UCLA.

Remember the old-fashioned Fourth of July go-devil? That was the Washington offense Saturday — exploding in all directions as Don Heinrich touched the fuse. The Washington Wizard kept Cal in a dither all afternoon.

Facing their first loss to a Northwest team since Pappy Waldorf became their head coach, the Bears roared down again. This time Johnny Olzewski fumbled and Jack Lindskog pounced on the pellet at the Washington 24. That was all for Cal Pappy's boys made just two first downs in the second half and never did get back into Washington territory.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Southern California's Trojans and the UCLA Bruins, thundering toward the conference championship, swept through latest opposition with such ridiculous ease as to make the outcome of their own big clash, Nov. 22, the probable key to the Rose Bowl.

The two unbeaten juggernauts fashioned victories of big proportions.

Southern California gave Stanford the worst beating—54-7—since the two rivals started playing in 1905. It was a massacre of the school that won the title and the Rose Bowl last New Year's Day. The previous high score was USC's 41-12 in 1930.

TWO TO GO
The Trojans now have a 4-0 league record, with two to play. UCLA blasted Oregon State into small pieces, 37-0, the highest score in their series. It was the first time the Northern club had failed to tally this season and it has played and lost to the nation's No. 1 ranking team, Michigan State, by 14-17.

Comparatively, USC beat Oregon State, 28-6.

While UCLA is idle this weekend, with a 5-0 standing, Southern California meets the Washington Huskies, flying high on the comeback trail.

THIRD LOSS
The Huskies racked up California's Bears, 22-7 and for the fallen pre-season favorites it was the third successive conference setback.

It was Washington's fourth consecutive league win. The Huskies' record now stands at five wins and one loss. The defeat was inflicted by UCLA but the Huskies could still wind up in a three-way tie if they win from USC and the latter defeats its cross-town rivals, the Bruins.

QUESTION
The issue of whether Washington and its great passer, Don Heinrich, can pierce the massive USC defense and cope with a newly found Trojan offense will be decided in Los Angeles Saturday.

Washington State, conqueror of Oregon, 19-8, tackles California in Bend. The nation's top team, winner of one of eight games to date, travels to Stanford's home field for perhaps another licking. Idaho meets Oregon State at Corvallis and has high hopes of a win after shutting out Montana, 27-0 last Saturday.

'FIGHTIN' IRISH'
SOUTH BEND, Ind. (AP) — It'll be a long time before Oklahoma's chastened Sooners and the nation's TV fans forget what Notre Dame football spirit is like when it's brought to a boiling point.

The Fighting Irish never lived up to their nickname more than in Saturday's amazing 27-21 upset of the previously unbeaten Sooners, a two-touchdown favorite.

If they can do it again for a second straight week, Michigan State, the nation's top team in the AP poll, is due for a merry time next Saturday.

It was obvious to the 57,000 packed in Notre Dame Stadium, the millions viewing the game on television and even the Fighting Irish themselves that Oklahoma had a team with more class and ability.

The faking of the Sooners' Eddie Crowder repeatedly had the experts in the press box following the wrong man. Billy Vessels was a superb performer and fullback Buck McPhail certainly lived up to expectations.

St. Helen's Rounds Out Playoff List

St. Helen's rounds out the list of qualifiers for the Oregon high school A football play-offs, which open next week-end.

It downed Columbia Prep of Portland, 18-7, Saturday to win the Class 2, District 1 title. The victory was St. Helen's eighth against one defeat.

In another major Saturday game, Klamath Falls handed Bend, one of the play-off entries, its first loss of the season, 33-25. Bend, ranked No. 7 in last week's Associated Press poll, had won seven games and tied one.

FIVE UNBEATEN
There are only five unbeaten, untied teams in the play-offs—Marshall, Central Catholic of Portland and Hillsboro, in Class 1, and Toledo and Willamina, in Class 2. Marshallfield has nine wins, the others eight each.

Jefferson, which travels to Bend for one of the Class 1 play-off openers, is undefeated and has six victories but was tied once. Jefferson and Central Catholic were tied for No. 2 in last week's poll.

WON FIVE
Grants Pass, which plays host to Marshallfield, the state's No. 1 ranked team, has won five games and lost three.

Both The Dalles and Benson, which meet at Portland Friday night in another play-off game, have blemishes on their records. The Dalles, ranked No. 5, suffered one defeat but won eight. Eighty-eight Benson's record is four wins, three losses and one tie—that with Jefferson, the Portland city champion.

At least one perfect record will be spoiled when Hillsboro, the No. 4 team, plays Central Catholic at Hillsboro Friday night.

FAVORITES
Two of the Class 2 favorites will meet at the start of the play-offs. Prineville, ranked No. 9 in the AP poll, will play host to Vale, rated tenth.

Prineville, against strong opposition, has won eight and lost only one. Vale, also playing tough football, compiled a record of six wins, one loss and one tie.

University of Eugene, which has six wins and two losses, will go to Ashland, whose team has won six and dropped three games.

In other Class 2 games, Toledo plays St. Helen's at Newport, and Willamina travels to Mt. Angel, which has six victories, one defeat and one tie.

Miss State Back Leads
NEW YORK (AP) — Jack Parker of Mississippi State forged to the front of collegiate football's individual scoring parade, boasting 97 points Monday.

The 20-year-old junior quarterback, who has scored 13 touchdowns and has kicked 19 extra points, had a field day Saturday against Auburn. Parker tallied three touchdowns, passed for three others, set up a seventh score and booted six conversions in his team's 49-34 victory.

Al Conway of William Jewell (Mo.) and Jules DeRouenoff, McNeese (La.) State, are tied for second place among the scoring leaders with 86 points each.

In the Pacific Coast Conference, George Black of Washington, and Johnny Olzewski and Bill Powell of California are tied for first with seven TDs and 42 points each.

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49'ers Fall Again, Pro Loops Knotted

NEW YORK (AP) — For the second time in two years, both conference races in the National Football League are locked in a two-way tie for first place with five weeks of the professional season left to go. And to make it even closer each team has a 5-2 record.

Detroit tied San Francisco for the National Conference lead Sunday by whipping Pittsburgh, 31-6, while the 49ers fell before the charged up New Yorkers, 23-14.

UPSET
The Giants' upset victory kept them in a tie with Cleveland for the American Conference lead, the Browns having defeated the Chicago Cardinals 28-13, as Marion Motley ran wild.

In other games, the Green Bay Packers upset the Chicago Bears, 41-28; Los Angeles handed winless Dallas its seventh straight defeat, 27-6; and Philadelphia crushed Washington, 38-20.

At New York, the piston-like legs of Eddie Price and Ray Poole's three field goals carried the Giants to their victory over the 49ers.

SCORES
Smashing off tackle, Price drove for 166 yards from scrimmage. He scored one touchdown and set up Poole's second field goal in taking the league ground-gaining lead from Hugh McElhenny, the 49ers' sensational rookie.

McElhenny was checked by the Giants' huge line with a net of four yards running. He now trails Price in the rushing department, 586 yards to 521.

COMBINE
At Cleveland, Otto Graham combined with Motley to trim the Cardinals. Graham completed 18 of 24 pass attempts for 249 yards and two touchdowns while Motley, running like the Motley of old, rolled for 94 yards from scrimmage. He also scored Cleveland's first touchdown on a 54-yard run after taking a screen pass from Graham.

For the third time in four years, Pacific University has won a share of the Northwest Conference football title.

The Badgers tied College of Idaho for the 1952 championship by turning back Lewis and Clark 25-7, at Forest Grove Saturday night.

The co-titlists played to a 7-7 deadlock early this season. They won their other conference games. There will be no play-off. Pacific shared the 1951 championship with Lewis and Clark.

Frank Buckiewicz, triple-threat All-Conference back, led Pacific to a convincing triumph over the Pioneers. He scored two touchdowns on runs of nine and 36 yards, and reeled off several other long gains.

Willamette moved into third place by overwhelming Linfield, 35-14, in a homecoming game honoring Spec Keene, former Willamette coach who now is athletic director at Oregon State College.

Pullback Paul Jewell and Halfback Chuck Lewis each scored two touchdowns for Willamette. One of Jewell's was on an 81-yard run. Cliff York intercepted a pass and ran 30 yards to the other score.

Willamette can clinch third place by defeating cellar-dwelling Whitman at Walla Walla in the only remaining conference game next week-end.
