

TAG FOES SETTLE DISPUTE TONIGHT

Four exponents of mat skulduggery settle a rivalry tonight in the Army ring, official culmination of a battle last week that touched off a near-riot at the touch palace.

The principals are well-known to followers of the rowdy rivalry that shows weekly at the Army.

Tony Ross, the Salem slayer, teams with Jack Terry, the Hatcherman, against the wily Japanese team of Tor Yamato and Mr. Sakata.

Matchmaker Mack Lillard wasted little time in affixing the names of the quartet on a tag team contract after last week's hassle in the clout customers home mulling to themselves.

The hassle grew out of a duel between Yamato and Terry, both experts of the sleeper-hold.

'NO CONTEST'

That bout was called "no contest" by the referee after each had one fall and bedlam broke loose at the feet of the ringers.

The fans probably wouldn't have been given the chance to see tonight's feud if Sakata hadn't occupied Yamato's corner after whipping Billy Sandow and changing to his street clothes.

This maneuver infuriated Terry who, after losing the first fall, promptly ducked into the dressing room and returned with Rosa.

Things really popped then with some of the fans getting in a free-for-all outside the ring.

Yamato and Sakata hold the Pacific Northwest tag team championship but they refused to make tonight's fight a title go. They may be forced to if Ross and Terry whip them; that's precisely what Tugger Tony and Terrible Terry plan to do.

BERSERK

The bout shapes up as the most berserk melee a show here in some time—and there have been some dillies.

Sandow, the Columbus O. boy who shows signs of becoming a top hit here, returns against Harold (Buck) Davidson, who shakes his referee garb tonight for wrestling trunks in the one-hour opener.

WIL Plans Split Run

YAKIMA (AP)— The Western International League, with 10 teams participating, will play a split season with a seven game playoff in 1953, its directors decided Tuesday.

The annual meeting of the directors, which opened here Monday, was recessed at 2:30 a.m. and will be covered again in Phoenix, Ariz., on Dec. 1. The National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs will meet in Phoenix on the same date.

The directors from Oregon, Washington and Canada concluded this other business in Yakima:

1. Decided to play 144 games opening April 24 and concluding Sept. 7.

2. Set the veteran limit at 14, five more than in 1952, but with the proviso that only six could be signed who have played 45 games in the case of catchers, infielders and outfielders and pitched 45 innings in the case of pitchers in leagues higher than Class A. They are to be known as "classification veterans."

3. Set for final vote, at the Phoenix meeting, a motion that the salary limit for each club be raised from \$5,200 monthly to \$5,700 monthly to reach the limit set for leagues of A classification.

The principal business at Phoenix will be the adoption of a schedule, either submitted by Hugh Luby, general manager of the Salem club, or another to be drawn. The schedule provides for two Canadian clubs, Edmonton and Calgary, to open two weeks later than in the States.

American Jumpers Go Home

NEW YORK (AP)— The retirement—at least for this year—of the United States international jumping team today threw a monkey wrench into the big Mexican horse show, scheduled to start in Mexico City on Nov. 29.

Arthur McCashin, Bill Steinkraus and Mrs. Carol Durand, the United States jumpers, are going home to their families after the Toronto show next week. That move left a wide gap in the international field and Brig. Gen. Alfred G. Tuckerman, president of the National Horse Show, said last night that the United States would not send a team to Mexico.

NO NAGS

"We just can't find the horses and riders," said Gen. Tuckerman. "We tried our best for at least four weeks, ever since the team said it would disband, before we finally gave up. Perhaps we could get some riders to go, but they would not be properly trained and owners will not permit their mounts to be handled by unfamiliar riders."

The United States team dominated the international events in the show which ended an eight-day run in Madison Square Garden last night. The Americans won six of the 13 jumping tests to three for Ireland, two for Mexico and one each for France and Canada.

BIG EVENT

The big event of last night's session was the deciding of the open jumper champion. The title was won by Larlat, owned by Mr. and Mrs. George D. Paula of Baltimore. Larlat was the favorite as long as four days ago to beat out All Aire, the defending champion.

All Aire still had a chance going into the last event, but he flopped. Only two winners from last year repeated. They were Competition, owned by Mrs. Louisa Long Combs of Lee's Summit, Mo., in the single harness horse class, and Regal Aire, belonging to Jim Endicott of Webster Groves, Mo., in the final harness horse division.

NCAA Okays Eight Bowls

KANSAS CITY (AP)— The National Collegiate Athletic Association has stamped an okay on eight post-season football bowl games and left the door open for approval of others.

Wilbur C. Johns of UCLA, chairman of the NCAA committee on extra events, said Tuesday these bowls have been approved:

Rose Bowl, Pasadena; Sugar Bowl, New Orleans; Cotton Bowl, Dallas; Orange Bowl, Miami; Gator Bowl, Jacksonville, Fla.; Sun Bowl, El Paso, Tex.; Tangerine Bowl, Orlando, Fla.; and Salad Bowl, Phoenix, Ariz.

John's announcement said application should be made immediately by any other bowl sponsors seeking certification.

NCAA regulations on post-season contests were voted into effect last January.

Homer Smith, Princeton's Power Fullback, Named Back of Week

NEW YORK (AP)— Homer Smith, Princeton's old fashioned power-plunging fullback, was named Associated Press "Back of the Week" today for his tremendous ability to do the primary thing with a football—namely, run with it.

Smith was the top back of last Saturday by simply overpowering Harvard in an awesome display of slam-bang football—a contrast to the slick T-formation quarterbacks and speedy, clever halfbacks who often gain the headlines without being hit hard more than a handful of times in a game.

Starting from the first time his path.

Princeton got the ball, Smith ripped through the Harvard line for four touchdowns and 273 yards, the greatest running performance by a major college back this year.

Princeton's first play from scrimmage gave an indication of how the game would progress. Smith, lining up in the fullback slot of Princeton's single-wing offense, took the snap from center, faked a reverse to the circling wingback and was off for the goal 73 yards away. He burst through left tackle, cut back to the right and outran or bowled over anybody who barred

That was how it went all afternoon in Princeton's 41-21 victory—Harvard linemen and backs trying in vain to stop No. 33 as he plowed in and down the field. His other touchdowns were on short blasts of eight, ten and four yards, but in between he went 46 yards and 57 yards.

The five foot ten, 188-pound fullback wound up with an average of 10.5 yards—equal to a first down—for every time he carried the ball.

When he wasn't carrying the ball, his bruising blocks paved the way for other Princeton runners to accumulate 489 yards from scrimmage on rushing. He learned the rock 'em and sock 'em football while prepping at Lawrenceville and polished his football education with a year as a linebacker on Princeton's defensive platoon last year.

Smith, a good-looking, crew-cut youngster from Omaha, Neb., has been president of the class of 1954 for two years. He also won a letter in track last spring.

He had to be good last Saturday to overshadow the other stars.

These included Billy Vessels of Oklahoma who scored three touchdowns by the eyes of the nation's TV fans, and Jack Parker of Mississippi State who had a hand in six touchdowns.

Price Top Pro Runner

PHILADELPHIA (AP)— Fullback Eddie Price of the New York Giants has plunged into the lead as top ball carrier in the National Football League on the strength of his performance last Sunday against the San Francisco 49ers.

Price gained 106 yards as the Giants downed the 49ers 23-14 to run his season's total to 580 yards.

59 better than Hugh McElhenry of San Francisco and 66 better than Don Towler of the Los Angeles Rams.

McElhenry, with a total of 521

yards gained over the ground, has the league's best average—8.7 per try on 60 attempts. Towler has averaged 6.2 on 84 carries and Price 4.4 on 132 attempts.
