Texans Fold in Fling On Professional Grid

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas was without professional football today just 11 months after it brought in a franchise with fanfare and ballyhoo that said the game couldn't miss in big, free-spending Texas.

The Dallas Texans, who lost seven games out of seven and almost a quarter of a million dollars, were orphaned yesterday when the 16 stockholders turned the franchise back to the National Football League. The Texans became a "road club" and play no more games in Dallas.

Coupled with the announcement that the Texans were quitting with a little more than half the season completed was the statement that a bid would be made to buy the club back when it came up for disposal probably next month.

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — Stanford will have a genuine passing attack against Oregon here Saturday, the first time since Oct. 11, says Coach Chuck Taylor.

He disclosed that quarterback Bob Garrett bruised his throwing arm against Oregon State five games ago and it failed to respond to treatment. The injury was kept secret until Garrett was sidelined for the season by a shoulder separation suffered last Saturday.

The idea was that Garrett's aerial reputation might keep defenses loose enough to help the Indians move on the ground.

With Garrett out Jack Gebert who did well in his first real taste of varsity experience against USC last week, will start.
