MD Critical Of Treatment

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Dr. Fount Richardson of Fayetteville, Ark., told members of the Southern Medical Association that doctors have lost the art of "treating from the heart."

In the early part of the century, Dr. Richardson said yesterday, the physician was loved and respected as a social worker and a community leader as well as a healer. "Then he began to specialize. He lost the art of treating families. He was not to be disturbed at night and on afternoons off."

"He had no time for community problems, leaving the patient a social worker and the politician. He had no time for charity."

When this happened, Dr. Richardson said, public agencies moved into the medical field to treat the indigent and the move toward socialized medicine had started.

New Senators Get Seniority

WASHINGTON (AP) — Four new senators — all Republicans — can claim an advantage in seniority over other new members elected last week.

Named to fill unexpired terms, they can qualify and become senators as soon as their predecessors' terms expire, and eventually become a committee chairman.

One of the four, Prescott Bush of Connecticut, went on the payroll Monday. He was named to serve the remainder of the term of the late Ewen McMahon, extending until 1957.

Also elected to unexpired terms were former Sen. John Sherman Cooper of Kentucky; Charles E. Potter of Michigan, now a member of the House; and former U.S. Dwight Griswold of Nebraska.

A fifth newcomer with a head start in seniority will be the new senator — as yet undesignated — from California. Vice President-Elect Richard Nixon said Tuesday he is resigning from the Senate effective Jan. 1 so his successor can qualify before Jan. 3. Nixon's replacement will be appointed by Gov. Earl Warren of California.

As it turned out two of the four newcomers, by succeeding Democrats who died in office, gave the Republicans the margin of control in the new Senate.

McMahon, who died last July, and Sen. Virgil Chapman of Kentucky, killed in a 1951 automobile accident, were elected to terms extending into the next Congress. Had they lived, the Democrats would have retained 49 seats and control in the new Senate.

German Wives Get U.S. Visas

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) — The United States is issuing visas to German wives of American soldiers at the rate of 500 a month. U. S. Consulate records showed Wednesday.

The figures indicate that the number of marriages of German girls and U. S. soldiers is twice as high as last year and far above the number during the rush which followed the lifting of the ban on such marriages in 1947.

Officials offer this explanation:

1. There are more American troops here now than at any other period since German-American weddings were permitted. During the Allied buildup against the Soviet menace, the number of U. S. soldiers in Germany has grown from less than 100,000 in 1947 to about 250,000 today.
2. Many American soldiers are now completing their overseas tours of duty and being returned to the United States. They marry shortly before they start home.

The marriage rate is reflected by the number of visas issued German girls for admittance to the United States as wives of American citizens.

An average of 500 such visas is being issued every month by U. S. consulates in Germany. Last year the rate was about half that, with a total of 3,049 issued during the entire year.

Ike To Visit Rhee in Secret

PUSAN, Korea (AP) — A government spokesman said today U. S. President-elect Dwight Eisenhower probably will meet President Syngman Rhee around Seoul in top secrecy.

The government has called off for security reasons a big reception for Eisenhower in Seoul, the spokesman, Clarence Rye, said.

Reports indicate a blackout will cover Eisenhower's trip to Korea until the President-elect is safely out of reach of potential Communist moves against him.

Psychologists Mull Films To Determine Fans Tastes

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA)—Exclusively Yours: Why do you like certain movies and dislike others? A staff of psychologists have

come up with the answer after a survey of Los Angeles moviegoers. Compiled by Applied Psychology Associates, Ward J. Jenness, Ph.D., director, the survey conclusions were:

"The primary reason people enjoy or do not enjoy a movie is related directly to the extent to which they are able to project themselves into one or more of the roles. 'Enjoyed' movies are those which enable the viewer to imagine himself as one of the characters (usually the hero or heroine) in the picture. 'Not enjoyed' movies fail to provide the ingredients necessary to enable the viewer to assume one of the roles."

U.N. Retains Defense Zone

TOKYO (AP) — A spokesman for the United Nations Command today said "no changes have been made and none are contemplated" in the sea defense zone in Korean waters.

The zone, which aroused Russian protests, was announced Sept. 27 by Gen. Mark Clark, Allied Far East commander. Japan has expressed concern lest the zone interfere with Japanese fishing in waters around Korea.

The zone was set up, said an Army announcement, "for the purpose of preventing attacks on the coast of Korea, securing U.N.C. lines of communication and preventing the introduction of contraband or enemy agents into ROK (Republic of Korea) territory."

Liner Gets Blue Ribbon

NEW YORK (AP) — The new liner United States has formally received the "blue ribbon" trophy emblematic of the world's transatlantic speed title.

At a banquet aboard the liner last night, Britain's Duke of Sutherland turned over to United States Lines President John Franklin the five-foot high, gold and silver trophy which his country has held since 1936.

The United States made a record west-east crossing last July 7 in three days, 10 hours and 40 minutes, shaving the Queen Mary's previous record by 10 hours and two minutes.
