Four men were assessed fines or forfeited bail in Judge D. E. Van Vactor's district court this week for hunting violations after arrest by federal game officers.
Ronald Amos Davis, 53, and Edward M. Farrison, 22, both of Tulelake Falls, and Roger Eugene Eckert, Klamath Falls, were arrested last Saturday night on Lower Klamath Lake for shooting waterfowl after hours.
All were shooting about a half hour after closing time.
Eckert and Davis forfeited \$25 bail each in court Wednesday morning, and Farrison has yet to put in an appearance. His gun is being held by the court.
Joseph McKinley, Medford, was arrested on the Williamson River ranch Sunday by federal game men for shooting about half hour after closing and for having no plug in his shotgun.
He was assessed a total of \$50 for the two offenses.

Fair Leaders Slate Meeting

TULELAKE — Sam W. Kellett, manager of the Tulelake-Butte Valley Fair, C. J. Mann, president of the fair board, W. G. Hagelstein, vice-president, Floyd A. Boyd, Arthur Criss and Paul Christy, directors will go to San Francisco next week to attend sessions of the 30th annual convention of the Western Fairs Association, a non-profit trade group devoted to making fairs serve the greatest number of people.

Yankee Quits South After Warning From Hooded Men

TUPELO, Miss. (AP)—Newell Anderson and his pretty wife were on their way back to their native North Dakota today because, the 26-year-old newspaperman said, he had been warned to leave here on grounds that he is a Yankee.
The couple started driving to Fargo, N. D., late yesterday about one hour ahead of the ultimatum which Anderson said was set by two hooded men after they flagged him up on a wild automobile ride Monday night.
"We don't like foreigners coming in here and you'd better get out of town," Anderson said the men told him.
Anderson, who had been circulation manager of the Tupelo Journal for six weeks, said he had received a anonymous telephone threats for two weeks.
Mayor George Maynard said that "the business of him (Anderson) being a 'damn Yankee' had nothing to do with his leaving. There is something more behind it."
Maynard and other civic leaders in this northeast Mississippi town of 15,000 said they would get the true facts of the case "in order to remove the unjustified black eye against Tupelo and the South."
Anderson said he and his wife had been offered around-the-clock police protection for 30 days if they decided to stay.
