

Game Group Slates Talks

A wildlife lecture tour of 160 junior and senior high schools was begun this week by Oregon Game Commission information representatives Austin Hamer and Ronald Shay.

The programs, presented in student assemblies, include talks illustrated with large poster cartoons and movies.

Programs in the series of three are rotated each year in each school and include one program on general conservation with the movie "A Heritage We Guard," a second on big game animals with the movie "Heaven of the Wild," and a third on game fish with the movie "Trout Story."

Objective of the program is to acquaint students with Oregon wildlife, its recreational and economic value, and its management. Last year the programs were requested for assembly periods in 124 public high schools.

Lumber Ship In Distress
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The 25-foot lumber ship Barbara Olson was in distress early Friday in a Pacific storm off Southern Oregon. San Francisco Coast Guard rescue headquarters said the ship radioed at 10:55 Thursday night its deck load of lumber had shifted and it was listing 15 degrees. It was 123 miles north of Eureka, Calif. That would put it off Gold Beach, Ore.

The Barbara Olson's skipper said the vessel could ride out the trouble if the winds moderate as forecast. Cutters were standing by at Coos Bay, Ore., and Eureka, ready to shove off for the distressed ship as soon as the weather let up.

The Barbara Olson, owned by the Oliver J. Olson Lines of San Francisco, had sailed from Los Angeles Nov. 5 and was due next at the Oregon lumber port of Haddon. She carries a small crew.

Milk Group Names Leaver
ATLANTA (AP)—John Brandt of Minneapolis, Minn., was re-elected president of the National Milk Producers Federation Thursday.

Other officers re-elected are W. P. Davis of Boston, first vice president; W. J. Knutzen of Burlington, Wash., second vice president; George W. Slocum of Milton, Pa., treasurer; and Charles W. Holman of Washington, D. C., secretary. The convention adopted a resolution calling for removal of price controls on milk and other dairy products.

Other resolutions urged prohibition of industry-wide bargaining, called for application of anti-trust law provisions to labor unions, and asked for continued government price supports for dairy products.

ESPIONAGE VIA FISHING BOAT
TOKYO (AP)—Police suspect that Japanese Communists are using fishing boats and meeting Russian warships off Northern Japan to smuggle information and agents in and out of Japan. They have seized some boats and made a few arrests, but they report the traffic is hard to stop. The boats ply among the clusters of small Russian-held islands off Hokkaido.

SNOW SLIDES IN TYROL
VIENNA, Austria (AP)—Alpine avalanches are believed to have taken three lives in Austria's Tyrol. A hunter was reported missing in the Hintereis valley and two workers were buried by a huge snowslide at Fieberbrunn.

Overell Girl Gets Divorce
LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—Mrs. Barbara Louise Overell Cannon, 23, who with George Gollum was acquitted of slaying her parents in a yacht blast in 1947, has obtained a divorce from Robert Cannon, 31, former Los Angeles policeman and bar owner.

Cannon married three times before signed a consent to the divorce action and agreed to an out-of-court settlement. The couple was married in 1949. It was the first marriage for Miss Overell. She obtained custody of their 2-year-old son, Stephen.

Gollum, her fiance at the time of the trial, was given a one-year sentence in Savannah, Ga., in 1950 for car theft.

Ex-Slave, 100 Killed By Car
TOLEDO (AP)—John Taylor, reported to be a 100-year-old ex-slave, died last night of injuries suffered Oct. 22 when he was struck by an auto driven by an 84-year-old man.

Miss Mary J. Mason, with whom the victim lived, said Taylor was born in Cameron, S. C., "about 100 years ago." She said her father had known the man's family and had often talked about Taylor being born a slave.

The 84-year-old motorist is Curtis M. Van Brimer of Toledo, police said.

Strange Plane Flubs Test
SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP)—A wingless plane that made a forced landing in a plowed field on its maiden flight yesterday, is going to be tried again after its builder, William E. Horton, does some re-designing.

"Back to the drawing board," Horton quipped to newsmen. "I'm convinced the design is sound, but it needs a lot more improvements—a lot more development."

The strange-looking craft took off from Orange County Airport yesterday, flew low over the ground for about a mile, dipped dangerously near high tension lines, but landed without damage in an open field.

Horton, who has worked almost alone for the last 18 months on the experimental plane, had planned to be in the air for about an hour on the flight. Instead, he was aloft only two minutes.

The plane has stubby eight-foot control flaps on either side, is 23 feet wide and 40 feet long. The fuselage is virtually a wing in itself.

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FOREIGNERS SEE ART
VENICE (AP)—More than 30,000 Americans, 12,000 British, and 30,000 French visited the Biennial Art Exhibition here between June and October. The exhibition, which closed in October, was seen by over 200,000 people. About half were foreigners, officials said. The largest art exhibition in Europe, it displayed 3,439 art works. Some 250 art works were sold during the exhibition for a total of almost \$100,000.

NEWEST SHOE STORE OPENS

The store will carry popular priced lines of shoes for men, women and children, handbags and shoe accessories.

Howard Perrin, architect, planned the store interior, displays and fixtures. This completes the modernization of the building occupied by Rickys, Underwoods, and now, Reeve's.

YOUTH GUILTY IN MURDER
SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP)—Billy Rupp Jr., 18, Yorba Linda, keeper, has been convicted of first degree murder in the Aug. 8 slaying of 15-year-old baby sitter Ruby Ann Payne.

A jury of eight women and four men returned its verdict last night after 28 1/2 hours of deliberation. It made no recommendation, which means that if Rupp is found sane in his sanity trial next week, he must die in the San Quentin Prison gas chamber.

Rupp was accused of killing the Payne girl after she resisted his advances. She was caring for the three children of Rupp's employer.

Rupp's attorney based the defense almost solely on the contention that the youth had suffered a brain injury early in life and was unable to premeditate a crime.

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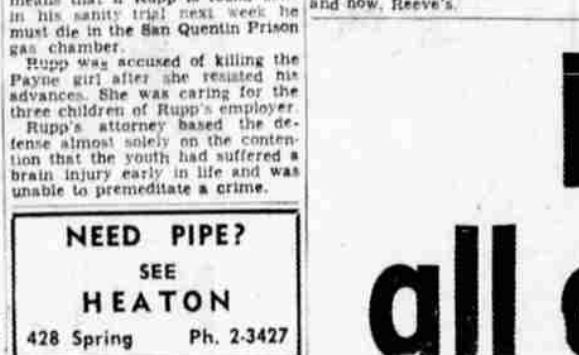
