

Heinrich Called By Army

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Southern California's football machine, which has gained momentum as the season progressed, is a strong 13-point favorite to roll on over Washington Saturday in the top game in the Pacific Coast Conference.

A victory for the unbeaten Trojans will set the stage for a truly great game next week against the other undefeated giant in the Coast Rose Bowl race, UCLA.

A Washington triumph would give the Huskies a chance to tie up the title chase, in the event they go on to whip Washington State Nov. 29 and SC triumph UCLA. And a win over SC would be a fine going away present for pass artist Don Heinrich, who is Army bound.

The odds say the Huskies could do it. The tremendous Trojan defense, featuring such belligerent gentlemen as Elmer Wilhoit, Bob Doren and Bob Hooks, looks strong enough to belt the foe's offense into submission.

Underestimate it is no underestimating the chances around Troy. They were beaten badly in one conference setback by 40-0 and took another drubbing week later, 35-0. The Trojans' 10-0 record over opponents, including a 35-0 rout over a still capable team last week over California mightily Golden Bears.

Man for Washington is who got his notice. But report to the Bremerton for possible induction Heinrich, 1950 All-America and currently the leading passer in the college ranks, may not get to perform against the State. He missed all of 1951 season because of a shoulder injury.

Ready to help Heinrich, via air ground, will be the leading pass catcher in the league, George Black; two Jacks, Kyrill and Nugent, Bill Earley and Frank Lariza.

If nothing else, SC just figures to have too many people to draw. The similarly undefeated UCLA Bruins, sharing the conference lead, will be idle this weekend. They are preparing for the probable championship and Rose Bowl deciding contest with USC Nov. 22.

Washington State's Cougars, in a three-game winning streak after a disastrous start, take on the beleaguered California Bears. In spite of three successive losses, that knocked them out of the title running, the Bears have been installed mild favorites on their Berkeley field.

Oregon, loser of six of its eight engagements, will face Palo Alto for a try at Stanford's Indians. The odds-makers think the Indians will bounce back to win by three touchdowns but they will have to stop a proven aerial attack of Oregon.

Another encounter of also-rans will bring together Idaho and Oregon State at Corvallis.

Idaho picked up a snappy 27-0 victory over Montana last week while Oregon State was being pole axed 57-0 by UCLA but OSC is favored.

Conley Pens Cage Pact

BOSTON (AP)—After a two weeks tryout, Gene Conley, the Boston Braves' six-foot-eight pitching prospect, has convinced President Walter Brown of the Boston Celtics that he can play major league basketball.

Conley has been signed to a National Basketball Association contract and will make his bow with the Celtics against the Rochester Royals here Sunday. The young giant played basketball at Washington State College.

Conley will be used as a substitute for high-scoring Easy Ed Macauley. According to Coach Red Auerbach, the huge pitcher has a sound one-hand pop-shot from outside and can handle rebounds effectively playing under the basket.

The Braves management at first frowned on Conley's basketball ambitions.

"We relented when Conley told us he would play semi-pro basketball back home in Washington if we refused him permission to play with the Celtics," general manager explained. "So we decided it would be much less risky to have him playing against highly polished major leaguers."

'Valuable' Nod Goes To Shantz

NEW YORK (AP)—Pint-sized Bobby Shantz, fortified by the American League's Most Valuable Player Award for 1952, is going to demand a giant-sized increase in his pay check when he sits across the table from General Manager Art Ebers of the Philadelphia Athletics Monday.

The wee left-hander is expected to ask for \$35,000, an increase of almost 200 per cent over what he received during the past season for winning 24 games while dropping only seven for the fourth place Athletics.

Shantz's 1952 salary was only \$12,000 as he topped the American League pitchers in games won and finished high in the earned-run average column.

Bobby sought to talk contract with Ebers last week but the A's general manager told the little hurler:

"Let's not talk contract now. I've got to see X-rays of your broken wrist first. I don't want to sign a pitcher without an arm."

Shantz's refusal to talk contract at that time probably will cost the Athletics several thousand dollars. For since then the 27-year-old southpaw has received the league's highest honor—the first time a non-championship club player has won the award since Ted Williams of Boston in 1949. The last Philadelphia to be honored was Jimmy Fox in 1933.

Shantz received 16 of the possible 24 first place votes cast by two dozen members of the Baseball Writers Association of America. He rolled up a total of 280 votes for a wide margin over Alie Reynolds, ace of the New York Yankees' pitching staff.

Reynolds, third last year, polled 183 points. He was followed by two of his teammates—Mickey Maris and Yogi Berra. Early Wynn of Cleveland, Ferris Fain of the Athletics, Nelly Fox of Chicago and a trio of Cleveland players—Bob Lemon, Mike Garcia and Al Rosen—round out the first 10.

"I don't want to be unreasonable but I think I am entitled to a pretty good increase," said Shantz. "I realize that the Athletics don't draw as many people as, for instance, the Yankees and Indians, and probably can't afford to pay as much money as I feel I am worth. But taking everything into consideration I don't think I am asking for too much."

Bobby said his arm feels sound again and he is certain he can pick up where he left off when he was hit by a ball thrown by Walt Masterson of Washington while at bat.

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Spartans, Irish Hold Gridiron Center Ring

NEW YORK (AP)—The 1952 college football season, an extravagant production from the opening curtain, moves toward the closing scenes tomorrow with the current bowl game contenders in supporting roles and two non-bowl teams taking over the center of the stage.

Conference crowns and roles in the Jan. 1 bowl extravaganzas will be awarded the winners of several key games, but all must give way to Notre Dame-Michigan State clash at East Lansing, Mich., as the day's top attraction, Notre Dame pulled the upset of the week last Saturday in topping Oklahoma, and the big question now is can the Fighting Irish do it again against the nation's No. 1 team.

OTHER REASONS
Knocking off the nation's best and ending a 22-game winning streak are not the only incentives for Notre Dame, however. State's hard-running stable of backs ran up a 35-0 score on the Irish last year, and that's the worst drubbing ever handed a Frank Leahy team. Notre Dame could skyrocket its present sixth-ranking with a victory.

For the second straight week, football fans who like to watch from their living room instead of a stadium seat will see a top-notch contest. After watching Notre Dame and Oklahoma last week, the stay-at-home will see Sugar Bowl-bound Georgia Tech against Alabama. "Bama, the last team to defeat Georgia Tech, 22 games ago in 1950, has not been in a bowl game since 1948, but a victory over the nation's second-ranked team would give the team something to do next New Year's Day.

Two other games that have a direct bearing on the eventual bowl line-up are slated for the Southland. Maryland, No. 3 in the country, meets an undefeated but twice-bled Mississippi team anxious to become the school's first bowl representative since 1936. Maryland, barred from the bowls by a South-

ern Conference edict, is a two-touchdown favorite, Tennessee, No. 7 in the AP poll, takes on Florida, which has never been in a New Year's Day game. Tennessee is talked of as a favorite for the Cotton Bowl and Florida would be a natural for the Orange Bowl.

Out on the Pacific Coast, Southern California must get by Washington to keep its record perfect for the big clash next week with UCLA. If Southern Cal lives up to its fifth place ranking tomorrow, the game with fourth-rated UCLA will determine the coast entry in the Rose Bowl, grand-daddy of the bowl classics. UCLA has an open date tomorrow.

CLIMAX GAME
The other entry likely will be determined tomorrow at Ann Arbor, Mich., where Purdue, No. 10 in the poll, invades Michigan in the Big 10's climax game. Purdue is 4-0 in the conference and Michigan 3-1. Wisconsin, also 3-1, is heavily favored over Indiana.

The Cotton Bowl host, an automatic reservation for the Southwestern Conference champion, will be Texas if the league leaders can get past old rival Texas Christian. But TCU has beaten Texas in upsets before and could do it again. Texas is No. 9 in the poll.

Another conference championship due to be settled, although the winner won't be eligible for bowls, is that in the Big Seven, Missouri, which has won four league games in a row, is a three-touchdown underdog tovengeful Oklahoma. Winner of three straight conference games after the opening tie with Colorado, Oklahoma is No. 8 in the poll.

The Merrill Huskies, Klamath County and Dist. 5 Class B football champions, landed four players on the All-County team, a consensus of votes from all-opponent teams in the league revealed.

Coaches of the six schools in the league compiled the votes in a Wednesday night meeting.

Chiloquin, a team that could land no better than a tie for second—with Henley—but one that threw scares into the leaders, also placed four players.

Chiloquin placed ends Gene Gentry and Jarold Oates, tackle David Kircher and back Jo Jo George.

Malin, ending with a 4-1 league record as did Merrill but out-voted for district play, landed back Andy Travis and guard Ron Ruppel.

Henley's all-star player was center Delbert Dehlinger.

Bonanza and Sacred Heart failed to place a man on the first team.
