James Stewart 'Changed' After 3 Years Marriage

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — With three years of marriage clocked off, James Stewart is a changed man. Or so his friends and associates would have you believe. They claim that Jimmy, once Hollywood's most noted and eligible bachelor, is different from the fellow we knew a few years ago. For one thing, he talks. He had long been noted for such conversational gems as "Waal, shucks, I don't know about that." But when we had lunch together, he talked glowingly about his new family. It consists of his wife, Barbara, her two sons by a previous marriage, 6 and 8, and the twin Stewart daughters, 18 months. "You see, each of the boys said he wanted a baby sister," Jimmy explained. "So we had to arrange that for them. And you know something? It's amazing that each boy has claimed a sister for his own. We try to mix them up, but the boys insist on adopting one of the sisters' aunts!" I asked Jimmy if he thought marriage had changed his life. He said he wouldn't be the judge of that. "I had heard that after he was first married he would leave the house in the morning without saying goodby to anyone. 'Now that's a press agent's story if I ever heard one,' he replied indignantly. But after reflection, he added: 'I guess that did happen once. I got up and left the house without saying a word to anyone. When I got halfway to the studio, I realized what I had done. I had to stop and telephone home to make apologies.'"

"The Indiana, Pa., actor was really more at ease talking about his career, rather than his personal life. He was the pioneer in the split-profit picture deals which other stars have flocked to. That's the deal whereby the star works for no salary, but takes 50 per cent of the profits of his picture. It has reportedly brought Stewart payments of over a half-million dollars apiece for pictures like "Winchester 73" and "Bend

of the River." He is currently making "Thunder Bay" on the same basis. That's a story about tidelands oil, filmed largely at Morgan City, La.

Ship Captain Put on Beach

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — A chief officer who admitted his memory lapse led to the loss of a luxury liner on rocks in Alaskan waters Sept. 7 has been beached for six months. He is Charles W. Savage, who was chief officer aboard the Princess Kathleen when it grounded and later sank near Juneau. There were 300 passengers aboard the ship but all escaped the vessel before it slipped from the rocks into a watery grave.

Justice Sidney Smith yesterday ordered Savage's master's license suspended for one year, but recommended that he be given a ticket as a chief officer again after six months. Savage had a master's license at the time of the mishap but was acting as chief officer of the Princess Kathleen.

The seaman admitted through counsel that he was on watch on the bridge at the time of the accident. He admitted he had ordered the quartermaster to steer to a starboard course about 10 minutes before the look-out sighted land close at hand.

Then, he informed the justice, forgetting his previous order he ordered "hard to starboard" a few seconds before the ship slid high upon a rock.

Savage was commended by the government attorney for his candor.

Europe Irks Corn Husker

PARIS (AP) — World corn-husking champion Elmer Carlson left for the United States today with the parting observation that the governments of some European countries are "just plain stupid" about helping their farmers.

Elmer, a strapping, 43-year-old Audubon, Iowa, farmer, said European governments are "taking the easy way out. They put high taxes on gasoline, automobiles and farm machinery. The results are that European farmers are years behind the times in mechanized farming methods — they cannot afford machines and they could not afford to run them once they had them."

Elmer was brought to Europe in mid-September by the Mutual Security Agency to demonstrate to farmers of France, Holland and Italy how to husk corn with a husking hook — a hand tool used by American farmers to speed the job of ripping the dried husks from ears of corn.

Elmer hopes to persuade European farmers to adopt the hook method, enabling them to husk more in less time and thus cut costs.

The Iowa farmer said he was astonished to find husking hooks were not used in Europe, though they've been a common tool in America for half a century.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Northern California churchmen yesterday heard themselves blamed partially for the existence of gambling in the state.

Warren Olney III, University of California law professor and chief counsel for the State Commission on Organized Crime, said about the only organized lotteries in the state today are those operated by fraternal, charitable and church groups.

The evil, he told a conference on gambling, is not so much in the direct effect of such activities as in the air of respectability such sponsorship gives to gambling.

The conference was sponsored by the Commission on Legislation and Morals of the Northern California-Nevada Council of Churches.

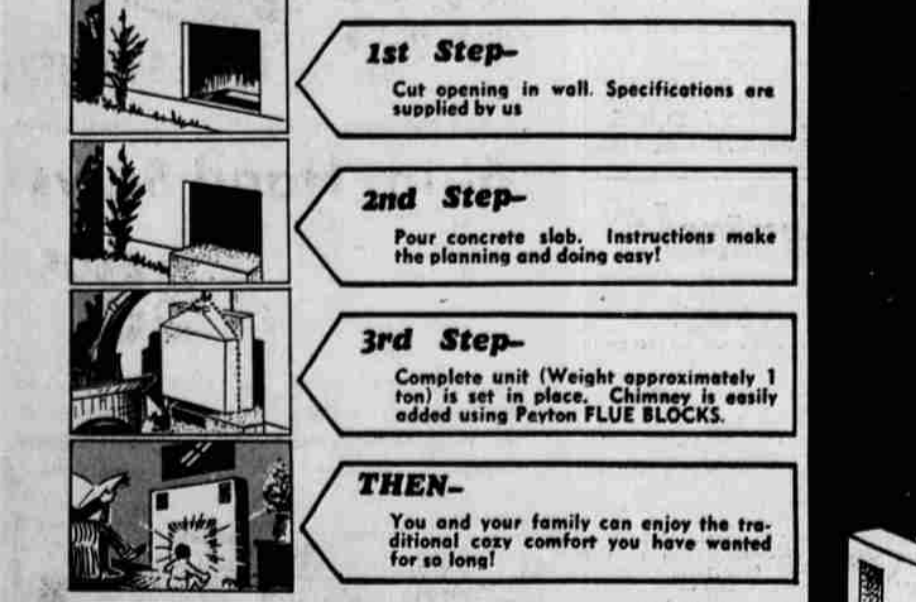
