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Don Cossacks Sing Tonight

Cossacks from the Don River country of Southern Russia invade Klamath Falls and the Pelican Theater tonight with a YMCA benefit show slated to start at 8 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Klamath Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The group is the famous Plat-off Don Cossack chorus and dancers, who plan to bring music, song and dance peculiar to their homeland to the theater stage.

Tickets have been on sale for several weeks, and Jaycee Pres. Carl Osborn reported late this morning sales have been good, though there enough remaining that box office sales are slated for 7 o'clock at the theater.

The "YMCA" basement handicraft department is to receive the benefit of proceeds from tonight's show—the only one scheduled. No reserved seats are being sold.

The Don Cossacks are refugees of the Russian Revolution who banded together in Europe more than 30 years ago, and have since toured the world as a chorus. This is their 14th annual tour of the United States, and perhaps the most concerted in their 1700th in the nation. Somewhere along the circuit they are to pass that number.

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Governor In Quick Airlift

LEWISTON, Idaho (AP)—It took a hastily improvised airlift to get Oregon's Gov. Douglas McKay and an Army general out of the rugged Snake River canyon south of here Thursday morning.

McKay and Brig. Gen. C. H. Chorprening of the Army Corps of Engineers had traveled up the Snake river from Lewiston Wednesday in a motor boat with a number of others to attend an outdoor meeting of the Columbia Basin Interagency Committee.

The boat's propellers struck rocks while chugging through Cottonwood Rapids, en route to the meeting, and its passengers were taken off by two other craft and carried to the meeting place at Johnson Bar, some 90 miles above Lewiston.

Thursday, after an overnight stay in the Snake River canyon, the governor and the general hiked two and a half miles to an airstrip where they were picked up by a light plane and flown to Lewiston.

They arrived here in time to attend a convention of the Inland Empire Waterways Association.

Other stranded passengers were taken out in a later plane trip or in a second boat.

Despite the trouble, everybody said it was the best meeting the committee ever had.

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
