

CI Club Meeting

Somehow Mrs. Vaden managed to escape the infuriated calf, without incurring more serious injury than severe bruises. This display of erratic temperament in the intended show calf was his undoing, for instead of leading a pampered existence for several months before the 4-H fair in Klamath Falls, the animal was soon sold for beef to Fred Pope. However, Anita is trying again this year to raise a calf for next 4-H county fair, and has a nice animal with a gentle disposition, she said.

4-H "Friendship Song" and "Sing Your Way Home" were sung by the group of girls, after which Mrs. Loosley introduced 4-H country singer, Mrs. John McCorrack, who, she complimented the local girls on the five record made at the county and state fairs, their showing placing the group in the 100 per cent category in Klamath County.
