Weekend Grid Menu May Round Out Bowls

NEW YORK (AP)—All the hopes and frustrations, triumphs and failures of the college football season come to an end for most of the college football teams this week with traditional—and important—games scheduled around the country.

With two of the major bowls—the Cotton and Sugar—already set for their New Year's Day games, attention will be focused on the out-lets that have a chance to go to the other big ones—the Rose and Orange.

The Western representative of the Rose bowl will be decided before a crowd of 100,000 in Los Angeles when two of the most powerful eleven in the nation, UCLA and Southern California, come to grips.

THREATEN
Both are undefeated and united and have smothered all opposition with their near-impenetrable defenses.

Against a total of 16 opponents they have given up just 47 points, or about four a game. There's no doubt that it will be a low scoring game, but the question is: Which can score? Possibly one touchdown will settle it.

This will be the NCAA national television game of the week.

As for the other half of the Rose Bowl entry, the Big Ten championship remains very much up in the air.

TIED
Michigan and Wisconsin are tied for the lead. This week, the Wol-

verines have the tougher assignment, facing Ohio State, while Wisconsin goes up against Minnesota. The Orange Bowl promoters, who are sitting back biding their time, will have their eyes on Alabama, Syracuse and Pitt, the three major possibilities.

Alabama puts up a good show against Maryland—it's too much to expect the Terrapins to lose two in a row—the Crimson Tide should clinch one of the spots.

Bama lost to Georgia Tech Saturday, but it was by an eyelash, 7-3. Maryland, meanwhile, was being jumped out of the unbeaten class by Mississippi, 21-11.

NO PROBLEM
Syracuse should have no problem in Fordham, but Pitt, one of the surprises of the season, will have no picnic against Penn State.

Georgia Tech, which meets Mississippi in the Sugar Bowl figures to roll right along.

The Engineers, with eight straight victories this season and 23 games without a defeat, enter late Florida State, Ole Miss, the terror of the football world since beating Maryland, is idle.

Tennessee, Texas' opponent in the Cotton Bowl, plays Kentucky, which should prove no problem. Texas clinched the Southwest Conference title by turning back Texas Christian, 14-7.

Meanwhile, most of the top teams came through last Saturday's action unscathed.

The No. 1 outfit, Michigan State, defeated Notre Dame, 21-3. Southern Cal blanketed Washington while UCLA was idle.

Tennessee clouted Florida, 26-12, and Oklahoma, which only has to beat Nebraska this week to win the Big Seven crown, submerged Missouri, 47-7.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Southern California's Trojans and the UCLA Bruins battle it out this week-end for the Pacific Coast Conference championship and the right to enter the Rose Bowl, come New Year's Day.

The undefeated titans of the league will meet before a probable capacity crowd of more than 100,000 in the Los Angeles Coliseum. Millions more will view the nationally televised game of the week.

Southern California clinched its chance to bid for the title Saturday with a devastating 33-0 rout of Washington.

While the Trojans were annexing their fifth conference win and eighth triumph of the schedule, their UCLA rivals had an open date last week-end. The Bruins also possess a 5-0 PCC standing and an overall eight win record.

Lowly Oregon manufactured the week's big upset by knocking out Stanford 21-20. Stanford was a two-touchdown favorite but that didn't impress the six-times beaten Ducks. They turned two fumbles by Stanford fullback Bob Mathias into as many touchdowns.

California's Bears broke up a three-game losing streak by taking the measure of Washington State, 28-13.

The Bears will be favored to dump their oldest rival, Stanford, when the two close out the season this Saturday in Berkeley before a sellout crowd of more than 81,000.

Resurgent Oregon, likewise, will be the choice to beat its keenest rival, Oregon State, in their game at Portland. Oregon State was walloped 27-6 by an Idaho club that Oregon defeated, 20-14, earlier in the schedule.

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Webfoots Cash in on Stanford Fumbles for 21-20 Upset Win

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP)—The Oregon Webfoots, cashing in on Stanford fumbles for two of three touchdowns, scraped past the Indians 21-20 Saturday for their second 1952 football victory in the Pacific Coast Conference.

It tied the Ducks and the Indians in sixth place in the standings, behind California.

Three successful conversions gave Oregon the winning margin. Stanford opened the scoring early in the first period, fullback Bob Mathias crashing over from 23 yards out after Chuck Essegian intercepted an Oregon pass.

But the Ducks came right back to even the tally. Tackle Len Harrie recovered a Mathias fumble on the Stanford three and fullback Tom Novikoff put it over in two line backs.

After a scoreless second quarter, Oregon pulled ahead at the start of the third period when guard Jim Jacques recovered Mathias' second fumble, and Novikoff again plunged into the end zone.

Stanford tied the game on Jack Gebert's touchdown pass to Sam Morley but Oregon moved out in front again before the period ended, scoring after driving 67 yards in seven plays.

Stanford's final rally came in the closing minutes of the game. The Indians drove 54 yards in five plays and Gebert passed to Morley for nine yards and a touchdown. Gebert's try for point was low, clinching the game for the Webfoots.
