trips of 80 miles each between Hong Kong and Macau and 19 days in drydock.

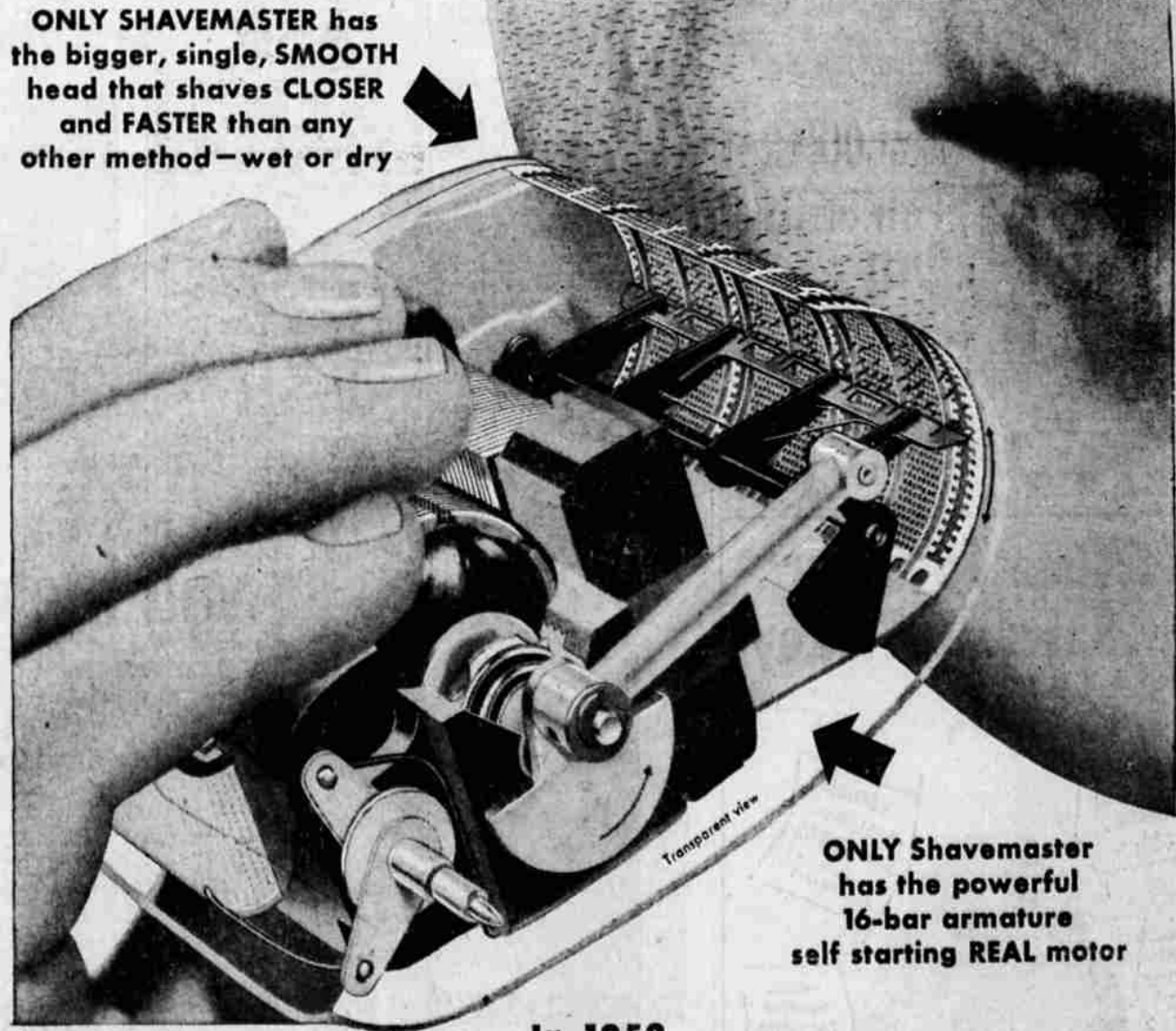
The perpetual passenger says he is an American. The U. S. State Department says he isn't. Friends are trying to get him cleared for South America.
