

### Oklahoma! To Appear Here

The Theatre Guild National Company in their musical hit, "Oklahoma!" comes to the Pelican Theater Wednesday, Dec. 10, for Matinee and evening performances. Prior to its Annual Coast to Coast tour.

The Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein 2nd musical, one of the legendary successes of the modern theater, is now in its ninth year, still leading the field as the theater's outstanding attraction. ### Denmark OKs U.S. Bases

**COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP)—**Danish government sources said last night that Denmark has given the United States permission to set up at least four more air bases in strategic Greenland but the report immediately ran into a flock of high-level denials.

A U. S. State Department spokesman, Danish Foreign Minister Ole Bjorn Kraft and Finn Nielsen, acting chief of Denmark's Greenland Department, all said they knew nothing about it.

### Kidnapers Get Prison Terms

**CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP)—**A kidnap-robbery spree led by a man who described himself as a knight in golden armor brought federal sentences yesterday to a former private investigator and a 15-year-old companion.

The teenager, Virgil Lemay, was sentenced to five years on a kidnaping charge and a year and a day for car theft.

The onetime boxer, Charles Hopkins, 20, Jacksonville, Fla., was given sentences totaling 17 years—15 for kidnaping and two for interstate transportation of a stolen motor car. The sentences were ordered to run consecutively.

James Francis Hill, an ex-convict who led the crime spree last month in Tennessee and Georgia, was found mentally incompetent and ordered committed to an institution.

Hill placed a nine-page "life-story" in court records in which he said he was Robin Hood and stole from the rich to give to the poor.

A psychiatrist told the court Hill had a "warped mind" beyond cure.

### Oakridge Man Jailed Here

Frank Leonard Ward, 24, of Oakridge, is serving a 60-day term in the County Jail for giving liquor to minors.

He was sentenced yesterday by Walter Zimmerman, justice of the peace at Chiloquin. A fine of \$100 also was assessed.

### Six Held On Dope Charge

**NEW YORK (AP)—**Six persons were held on narcotics charges today after dawn-to-dusk raids in East Harlem which federal agents and city detectives said led to seizure of 1 1/2 million dollars worth of heroin.

The raiding officers said the racketeers had branched to Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit and Cincinnati. No details on the out-of-town connections were given by authorities.

### C-119 Crash Kills 8; Toll Now At 91

**BILLINGS, Mont. (AP)—**The fourth crash in 11 days of an Air Force C-119 Flying Boxcar claimed eight lives yesterday when one of the huge transport crashed and burned in a muddy field 12 miles east of this South-Central Montana city.

The eight deaths raised to 91 the number of servicemen killed in Boxcar crashes since Nov. 7.

Four of the dead in the Montana crash burned to death when the two-engine craft plowed into the ground while attempting to make an emergency landing. Four died of injuries.

Eight others, including the pilot and co-pilot, were rushed to two Billings hospitals. Attendants said two were in critical condition.

The Air Force withheld identification of the dead.

Bound from Edmonton, Alta., Canada, to Denver, the plane crashed in cloudy weather but visibility was good.

**PROPELLOR**

Two Royal Air Force officers, Dudley Mills and John Downs, both 21, were among the survivors. The two English officers, who were hitching a ride to Denver on their way to spend leaves in Los Angeles, escaped from the flaming wreckage and walked to a nearby highway within minutes after the crash.

They said in a hospital interview that "something went bang at about 6,000 feet." Mills added: "It was the left port engine. It tore completely away."

Civil Aeronautics Administration investigators said propeller trouble apparently caused one motor of the transport to shake loose.

The Air Force in Washington said it has no intention of grounding the C-119s "unless a pattern of mechanical failure is established by accident investigations."

A reserve officer said reports for Arctic operations have been on file with the Air Force since last April.

Mal. William H. Jay, former commander of the 65th Troop Carrier Squadron, said he and another squadron commander filed the reports. Now a commercial airline pilot, Jay said the reports recommended the Boxcars be replaced by C-94s and C-124s.
