

Censor Faces Court Martial

PT. MEADE, Md. (AP)—Lt. Col. Melvin B. Voorhees, Army censor in Korea accused of writing a book that wasn't censored, will be court-martialed here.

Second Army headquarters announced yesterday that it would push charges against Voorhees for his book, "Korean Tales," which, in his own words, "took a slap at a large part of the correspondents corps, which I felt was violating security and endangering lives."

Voorhees is charged with failing to submit a manuscript of his book to the Department of Army for

review and disregarding the order of his commanding officer to withdraw the book from publication.

The charges were filed by Gen. Joseph Swing, commander of the Sixth Army on the West Coast but the investigation was switched here so Gen. Swing would not have to act as both prosecutor and judge.

Voorhees said his book, published Armistice Day, ran into a "one-general barrier" in the person of Brig. Gen. Frank Dorn, deputy information officer at the Pentagon in Washington. Voorhees contends Dorn opposed the book because "he said I had no right to write a story which reflected against Gen. MacArthur."

Gen. Dorn denied this. He and his staff spent three days going over the book with Voorhees and ordering changes in "certain parts that were not suitable," Dorn said.

No date has been set for the court martial but it will be held "in the near future."

Voorhees is a former editor of the Tacoma, Wash., Times and has served with the Army 10 years as a reserve officer. During the period covered by his book he was chief censor for the Eighth Army in Korea.

Leaders Up in Pan-Am Races

OAXACA, Mexico (AP)—Ninety stock cars and flashy sports automobiles headed into the rugged part of the Pan-American road race Thursday with Walter Faulkner of Long Beach, Calif., and France's Jean Behra leading the way.

With Thursday's two laps of the 1,934-mile race taking the racers as far as the rugged mountains surrounding Mexico City, Faulkner had the fastest time in the stock car division and Behra led the sports car drivers.

Faulkner covered the 330 miles of the first lap Wednesday from Tuxtla Gutierrez to here in an official time of four hours, nine minutes and 49 seconds. He was piloting a Lincoln.

The stock cars, unmodified after leaving factory assembly lines, trailed the specially built sports models on a time basis. Behra guided his Gordini, a new road

racing car, over the treacherous roads in three hours, 41 minutes and 44 seconds, nearly half an hour faster than Faulkner's time. The daring French driver averaged 88.00 miles per hour.

Frank L. Horn, Renton, Wash., driving a Jaguar, was 18th in the sports class. His time was 5:08:57.

The 1950 stock car winner, Herschel McGriff of Portland, Ore., was 16th Wednesday with time of 4:25:23.

Bob Christie, Grants Pass, Ore., driving a Nash, was 51st. He was timed at 5:40:35.

Lumber Mill Hit By Fire

SCOTIA, Calif. (AP)—Fire broke out Wednesday night at the Pacific Lumber Co. mill here, the world's largest redwood mill, but was brought under control before it spread far.

One building was destroyed. It housed an experimental unit for stacking lumber, and was valued at over \$100,000 by Fire Chief Jack Woods.

The company's fire department called for assistance from volunteer organizations. U. S. Forest Service equipment was dispatched, and loggers from the company-owned town of 1,400 pitched in to quell the blaze.
