OTI Eyes Won-Lost Record

The Oregon Tech Owls finish off their football season Saturday afternoon on Modoc Field—and they have a record in mind.

A victory over the Lower Columbia JC Red Devils of Longview, Wash., would give Oretch a 7-3 win-and-loss mark for the season, a new record on the campus.

Kickoff time is 2 p.m.

The Owls tied the school record last week when they drubbed Eastern Oregon, 41-19, to capture second place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

That gave the Hunsakerns a 6-3 record, the same mark they finished with last season.

Maryland Fixer Free On \$2500

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. (AP)—Louis J. Glickfield, 21, of Hyattsville, was free on \$2,500 bail Thursday on a charge of attempting to bribe a University of Maryland football player.

Glickfield, a junior at the University until he was expelled last month, surrendered to county authorities here Wednesday on the eve of an extradition hearing in Washington, where he had given himself up three weeks ago.

Glickfield is accused specifically of offering center Tom Cosgrove, Philadelphia senior, \$1,000 to "control the score" in the Maryland-Louisiana State football game on Oct. 25 at College Park.

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Video a Problem, but There's No Quarrel

NEW YORK (NEA)—The National Collegiate Athletic Association has been lambasted from here to breakfast for not permitting the televising of this football game as against that one.

Critics who prefer to do their cheering if any, at home, and for free, even yelled that Purdue and Illinois was a "nothing" game. It only gave the Boilermakers an opportunity to further establish themselves as potential Western Conference champions and the Big Ten's representatives in the Rose Bowl.

The colleges have no argument with television as a medium. They are sure as blazes can't outlaw TV. They are only endeavoring to find a way to live with it.

Everybody realizes that they can't give their football games away for 11 short Saturdays, and expect to be paid for them, via the gate, through the other.

All hands also know what's happened to boxing, as well as baseball, since the earthquake of video. In prize fighting, even Madison Square Garden has been TV haunted, while the smaller clubs, the source of talent supply, wear crepe in baseball, minor leagues have gone to pot, while Walter Francis O'Malley, to point out one major-league owner, wonders out loud what's going to do in light of \$80,000 less sold seats for Brooklyn's 1952 home games and for a pennant winner at that.

If the National Broadcasting Co. were permitted to attempt to select each week's game on the basis of all-winning teams off the previous Saturday, it would have been playing

ring around the rose with just seven major outfits, as of Nov. 1, rather than a representative geographic distribution of contests.

The one-time-only clause would have to be junked, and that, my friends, would put pressure on turning out all-conquering squads—for television—that would, in no time at all, make Amateur Athletic Union expense accounts out of recruiting and subsidization as it has existed to date.

The NCAA, NBC and General Motors deserve credit for standing by the one-time-only rule.

Meanwhile, the public is seeing a pretty good brand of football each week. Certainly, no one can object to the way the program closes: Oklahoma and Notre Dame, Nov. 8; Georgia Tech and Alabama, Nov. 15; Southern California and UCLA, Nov. 22; and Army and Navy, Nov. 29.

It has been thoroughly demonstrated that one game on a national network does not harm the live gates of some 116 other college engagements as much as four or five big-time regional attractions over regional networks. At least the non-televized schools are competing against one game instead of several, and to date that fact has made a noticeable difference for the better.

Throughout the years a system of economics has been allowed to develop which at many institutions has made football the provider and budget-balancer for most of the sports on the calendar. Smaller colleges had to be considered.

The NCAA plan, an honest and sincere declaration, may be the cornerstone for the ultimate stand by baseball, boxing and all other gate-attraction sports concerning television.

Sauer National's 'Most Valuable'

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Sauer, the rags to riches outfielder of the Chicago Cubs, today was named the Most Valuable Player in the National League for the 1952 by the Baseball Writers Association of America.

The selection of the 33-year-old Chicago slugger came as a surprise to many as Sauer slumped badly during the last month of the season following the brilliant start.

Sauer won his circuit's highest honor by a narrow margin over Robin Roberts, the graceful right-hander of the Philadelphia Phillies, and Joe Black, the rookie relief expert of the pennant-winning Brooklyn Dodgers.

CLIMB

The Chicago star, whose climb to major league stardom was a tortuous path, collected 226 points out of a possible 336. Roberts, who won more games than any other pitcher, 23, finished second with 211 points. Black, who made Brooklyn's entry into the World Series possible, was third with 208.

Sauer, a 6-foot-4, 200-pound bruiser, ran into a terrible slump in September. He hit only three homers, drove in seven runs and collected 16 hits in 75 times at bat.

Despite this poor showing the Cub cleanup hitter wound up tied for league home run honors with Pittsburgh's perennial champion, Ralph Kiner, at 37 each. He also led the loop in runs batted in with 121, the highest of his major league career, and batted .270.

Three writers from each major league city participated in the balloting. Points were awarded on 14 for a first-place vote, nine for second, eight for third and so on down the line.

100 VOTE

Only other players to poll 100 or more votes were Hoyt Wilhelm, the rookie relief specialist of the New York Giants, and Stan Musial, the six-time batting champion of the St. Louis Cardinals. Wilhelm placed fourth with 133 points and the \$55,000-a-year Musial fifth, with 127.

Rounding out the top 10 were: Enos Slaughter, St. Louis, 92 points; Jackie Robinson, Brooklyn, 31 points; Pre Wee Reese and Duke Snider, Brooklyn, 29 points each; and Roy Campanella, Brooklyn, and Red Schoendienst, St. Louis, 25 points each.

Sonja Denies Ice Challenge

Holman To Fight Charges

MADRID, Spain (AP)—"Incensed and infuriated" at the charges which led to his suspension as City College of New York basketball coach, Nat Holman is going home to fight the accusations.

Holman, whose 34-year coaching career was capped by an unprecedented "double" in winning both the NCAA and NIT tournaments in 1950, said in a telephone interview Wednesday he would "return home as soon as possible to contest vigorously what I consider an unjust victimization" of himself and two other college officials suspended Monday night.

SCAPEGOAT

Interrupting a sightseeing tour in Seville during a sabbatical leave from the college, Holman asserted he was being used as a "scapegoat" by the New York Board of Higher Education's committee on intercollegiate basketball.

The committee, after an investigation of the 1951 basketball "fix" scandals that rocked the sports world, charged Holman, Prof. Frank S. Lloyd, chairman of the faculty committee, and assistant Coach Harry (Bobby) Sand with unbecoming conduct.

"I have a strong personal conviction that I have been used as a scapegoat in view of the fact that the committee was completely unsuccessful in uncovering the individuals who were responsible in tampering with the scholarship records of involved players," Holman said in a statement from Seville.

ANSWER

This was in answer to committee charges that the scholastic records of 14 basketball players had been fraudulently changed from 1945 to 1951 to give them high enough averages for admission.

The "fix" scandals revolved about bribes to players to either "dum" the game, i.e. lose deliberately, or else go under the gamblers' point spread on the game. Either way would ensure a gambling coup by those who knew what the players were trying to do.

Pep Wins Nod From Chavez

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A confident, crafty Willie Pep, his latest "comeback" opponent listed as a victim, says he'll fight anyone, anytime to gain another crack at winning back his featherweight crown from Sandy Saddler.

The bobbing veteran put on his usual show Wednesday night to win a unanimous, 10-round decision from Fabella Chavez, a youngster from Hollywood, Calif. Both weighed 129 pounds.

It was just a matter of Pep crattiness—with some nice help from a jabbing left and a head-snapping right—that gave the Hartford, Conn., ex-champ the clear-cut victory.

A crowd of 2,491, just a drop in the 15,000-seat arena bucket, paid a bare \$5,593.50 to see the nationally and locally televised bout in person.
