**Today's Women**

Never underestimate a woman with a broom.

U. S. women, voting in the greatest numbers in history, held the balance of power in the recent election. For the first time, women outnumbered men on voting registers.

Old-time politicians, analyzing the results of one of the greatest election sweeps in generations, agreed on one point—keep an eye on the girls from now on.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower predicted on the eve of election that "morally indignant women" would sweep the Republican party to victory. Through television, they sat in at the political conventions last summer, chose up sides, rolled up their sleeves and went to work.

You've been seeing them and hearing them for the last few weeks as they handed out campaign buttons and literature, rang doorbells, conducted telephone campaigns, organized local clubs and threw their full efforts into getting out the vote. The cry of most of them was: "Vote as you please, but please vote!"

The activities of the majority of U. S. women who registered their power at the polls transcended party lines. Non-partisan organizations such as the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the Business and Professional Women's Clubs, the DAR and even the Girl Scouts and Campfire Girls threw the weight of their membership of millions into the drive to awaken the responsibilities of citizenship.

Among the women of widely different political background who took part in the campaign were such divergent personalities as Mrs. Wendell Willkie, widow of the Republican standard bearer of 1940; Oveta Culp Hobby, wartime head of the WAC; Mrs. Fiorella LaGuardia, widow of New York's long-time mayor; Mrs. Robert Patterson, widow of the former secretary of war; Sara Delano Roosevelt, young granddaughter of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Another woman whose power was felt in the campaign—in a different way—was quiet, smiling Mamie Eisenhower, who knew how to exchange homey woman-talk with feminine constituents across the country. She made no campaign speeches but won the hearts of many of her countrywomen simply by being at her husband's side, as a good wife should.

**How To Roast Festive Bird For Perfection**

Follow these fundamentals of turkey roasting to prepare a holiday dinner you and your family can be proud of.

Stuff the turkey just before roasting—Dry ingredients can be measured ahead of time. Liquid ingredients, measured in advance, must be refrigerated. Any meat added must be thoroughly cooked before combining with the other ingredients. Fill the cavities with a light hand—the neck pocket first. Then bring neck skin over and skewer it to the back.

For filling body cavity, place turkey into a deep bowl, neck end down. Fill with stuffing, shaking the bird gently to settle the stuffing, but not pack it. Packed stuffing may emerge after roasting in a solid compact mass. Close the opening by placing skewers across the opening and lace it shut with cord.

Proper trussing gives a compact shape, uniform cooking and browning and aids carving. To truss, bend wing tips toward breast and then back, "hooking" them under the shoulder joints with tips over the neck skin—"skimbo" style. The drumstick ends securely to tail.

Some retailers draw the bird in a way as to leave a bridge of skin across the abdominal opening. In this case, omit skewers and cord. Push drumstick through top opening, then under this bridge of skin with the drumstick protruding slightly through the bottom opening.

Grease turkey on all sides with softened or melted fat. Over the bird place a piece of cheesecloth well-moistened, but not dripping, with melted cooking fat. The cheesecloth should be large enough to drape down the sides. This fat-moistened cloth keeps the bird greased and does away with the necessity for basting.

Roasting the turkey—Roast in shallow open pan with rack, no cover and no water. Basting is unnecessary.

The oven temperature—"Low and slow" is the rule. Low temperature means less shrinkage and loss of juices, better flavor and appearance. At a constant low temperature of 325 degrees F. the turkey needs little or no attention. If the cheesecloth dries, spoon fat over it from bottom of roasting pan or remove and moisten with melted fat.

Remove the cloth toward the end of the roasting time, should more browning be desired. If the cloth becomes over-brown or the drippings burn or dry up before the turkey is done it is a sure sign
