## Lady Author Like Solitude

SEATTLE (AP)—A woman beach comber from the Grays Harbor County sand dunes is basking this week in the spotlight, the flowers and the congratulatory telegrams that come to a new author.

But Mrs. Sarah Berg, whose "Lady on the Beach" is fresh off the presses, said she was anxious to get back to her rain-pelted shack on the beach and "Old Sarge," her retired Marine sergeant spouse.

She was getting weary of swank hotel surroundings and her stylish borrowed wardrobe. She was longing to get back into her boots and logging shirt.

One of her disappointments in the finished book involves the King's English as used by "old Sarge."

To meet her publisher's desires, she finally had a New York writer collaborate on it. His first stroke was to clean up the book version of the Berg's language.

"That's the only thing I really don't like about the book," she told an interviewer. "Can you imagine a retired Marine sergeant like my husband exclaiming, 'My goodness!'"

"I wrote the book three times," she recalled. "I kept our shack warm with the pages I threw into the stove. But my publisher never was quite satisfied."

The Bergs left Seattle 10 years ago to stake out a life of isolation. They took up a life of Ocean City that kept them away from the city of Aberdeen for as long as two years at a stretch.

"We found peace and contentment," she explained. There were claims, driftwood, the breakers pounding on the beach, solitude.

Mrs. Berg got into the literary field by writing a salty letter to Time magazine four years ago about life in a world of driftwood.

The letter brought a flood of telegrams from book publishers. The result was "Lady on the Beach."

She has heard that Hollywood might be interested in it.

"If they do make a movie out of my book," she remarked, "I hope they don't pick a Jane Russell type to play me."

## Commercial Plane Speeds

HONOLULU (AP)—A Pan American Airways Stratocruiser rode "jet stream" winds for 3,950 non-stop miles across the Pacific Wednesday from Tokyo to Honolulu in 11 1/2 hours.

Because of the seven non-stop flights—nearly 50 hours shorter than those which stop at Wake—will become routine in early December.

Sidney M. Serebreny, Palo Alto, Calif., meteorologist, spent three years in research on the jet stream air currents. He was aboard on the pace-making flight.

The high speed currents flow west-to-east across the Pacific at certain altitudes about six months a year. The Stratocruiser, flying at altitude of 18,000 to 21,000 feet, was pushed along by tail winds which averaged 60 miles an hour.

Serebreny said the nonstop service will be possible only from Nov. 15 to April 15, the jet stream season.

## Crime Chief Wins Freedom

WASHINGTON (AP)—Tony Accardo, reputed chief of the crime syndicate founded by Al Capone who freed Thursday of contempt of Congress charges.

So was Joseph Scalfeat of Hattieson, Fla., described by the Senate Crime Investigating Committee as a racketeer.

Both Accardo and Scalfeat had been indicted for refusing to answer questions of the Senate Crime Investigating Committee.

Accardo was identified in testimony before the committee as the man who moved in an overlord of the Chicago rackets when Capone got out; Accardo also was said to have widespread interests in Florida.

## Hometown Reward for Hero

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP)—It's not every young bride and groom who get \$30,000 to start housekeeping on. But then, not every bridegroom is a Medal of Honor winner.

The couple will leave on a Mexican honeymoon arranged by Southern California Spanish-language newspapers. In Mexico they will be entertained by President Miguel Aleman.

When they return home Dec. 17, a citizens' committee intends to hand them a check for \$30,000. The "House for Chuck" campaign will swing into high gear after the wedding.

Rodriguez, now stationed at Norton Air Force Base here, won the Medal of Honor in Korea as a private first class. He was cited for "an incredible display of valor" in charging up a hill to wipe out five enemy gun positions, killing 15 Communists with hand grenades.

## Cash Returned To Card Loser

SALEM (AP)—Jack Putnam, who lost \$1,178 in a poker game three years ago, got his money back Wednesday in Marion County Circuit Court.

He lost the money to J. P. Schimberg, whom Putnam sued for \$2,356, or twice the loss.

Circuit Judge George Duncan issued a directed verdict for only the actual loss.

## Employment Hits Record

WASHINGTON (AP)—Riding a boom in consumer goods production, non-farm employment in mid-October stayed at a record 47,700,000, the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) reported Thursday.

This is 800,000 more workers than in October, 1951. Most of the expansion was linked for manufacturing industries, up 400,000 during the past year to 16,400,000.

Durable goods manufacturing employment, reflecting highest production levels in a year and a half, recorded a better-than-seasonal gain of 100,000 workers.

BLS said that, during the year, defense plants continued to add workers, employment in trade rose to a record 10,100,000 and federal government employment increased about 70,000 to 2,400,000.

## Farm Groups Want Trade

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two major farm organizations will try to sell the incoming Republican administration on the idea of revising government foreign trade policies to promote greater sale of American farm products abroad.

They are the American Farm Bureau Federation and the National Grange, which contend that present policies tend to force Western Europe to trade with Russia.

Both organizations will carry to Republican leaders in Congress and the State and Agriculture present policies would soon restrict farm markets and bring on rigid production controls.

In a statement issued Thursday outlining its position, the Farm Bureau said "an out-moded U.S. foreign economic policy is enabling Russia to gnaw away at Western European trade and steal the U. S. farm market bit by bit."

The bureau cited government reports showing declines in U.S. farm exports and an increase in Western European transactions with Russia.

The National Grange outlined a similar viewpoint in the current issue of its national monthly.

Both said Great Britain and other Western European countries are cutting down on American farm products because they don't have enough dollars.

They said these countries are not permitted to earn dollars in this country because of restrictive U. S. tariff and trade policies.
