## Rosemary Clooney Draws Hollywood's A Treatment

**HOLLYWOOD** — Rosemary Clooney is getting what Hollywood calls "the A treatment."  
 The A treatment can be associated with brass bands and red carpets. It is the care that is handed out when a studio uncovers a nugget that might turn into a gold mine.  
 Paramount has high hopes for Clooney. Thus you are seeing her pert face on covers of numerous national magazines. She is getting a publicity blast in all media possible. The directors of her first two

pictures proclaim that she is their closest thing to Carole Lombard since that vivacious actress left the Hollywood scene.  
 Clooney has been established in the fancy dressing room since she quipped over by Paulette Goddard. Scripts that were once tailored to Betty Hutton's measurements are now being made to fit Clooney. Having won preview audiences in "The Stars Are Singing," she is currently headlining with Bob Hope, Ariane Dahl and Tony Martin in "Here Come the Girls."  
 But the blonde whirlwind from Mayville, Ky., seems as though she has changed little from the days when she was singing with Tony Pastor's band. She is sure of herself, but not cocky. She has not been overglorified by Hollywood. She is no raving beauty, but she has a wholesome, inguistic face that is more interesting than a flock of glamor girls.

## McKay To Keep Hand in State

**WASHINGTON** — When Gov. Douglas McKay goes to Washington, D. C., to become secretary of the interior, he still will have much to do with Oregon.  
 The interior department, which he will head, includes a number of agencies important in Oregon daily life.  
 There is the giant Bonneville Administration and the Bureau of Land Management, which administers the O&C land forests in Western Oregon and much grazing land in Eastern Oregon.  
 In that department also are the Fish and Wildlife Service, the Geological Survey, the National Park Service, the Bureau of Mines, the Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Office of Territories.  
 The department employs about 65,000 persons. Recently it has spent more than half a billion dollars annually.

## Community Colleges Urged

**PORTLAND** — A college president urged Oregon counties Thursday to begin considering a plan that could solve problems of an anticipated boom in college enrollment by 1960.  
 The plan is for community colleges, Dr. Morgan S. Odell, president of Lewis and Clark College, told the 47th annual convention of the Association of Oregon Counties. The crop of war babies will begin reaching the colleges in 1960, and enrollment will increase 75 to 100 per cent—of from 19,000 at present to 40,000 students—he said.  
 Community colleges, authorized by the state and already tried at Bend and Klamath Falls, could help carry the load, he said.  
 He also said he favored making Portland State College a four-year, til about 1960.  
 The association decided to ask the Legislature for laws safeguarding the counties' authority to regulate traffic and prevent damage on county roads.  
 The group also proposed to make permanent the Good Roads Alliance, an organization that opposed some trucking firms on tax measures in the recent election.  
 The convention closes Friday after election of officers.

## Leper Gets Prison Term

**CARVILLE, La.** — A 35-year-old male victim of Hansen's Disease (leprosy) was sentenced yesterday to three years imprisonment for manslaughter in the fatal stabbing of a woman patient in her private room.  
 Sidney J. Gallardo entered a plea of guilty before U. S. District Judge Herbert Christenberry. The hearing was held in an auditorium at the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital where both were patients.  
 Gallardo and Candelaria Hernandez, 38, were found in the woman's private room Aug. 30 suffering with stab wounds.  
 Federal authorities did not disclose any details of the slaying at the time.  
 Gallardo's sentence poses a problem for federal authorities. Hansen's Disease patients are prohibited by federal law from leaving the hospital area.  
 The institution is the only hospital for treatment of leprosy in the United States.  
 A small jail cell is located on the hospital grounds. It was built in 1927 when a Negro was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment in the slaying of another patient. The Hernandez slaying was the second in the hospital's history.  
 The Negro served nine of his 10 years before dying of the disease.  
 Carville is located in an isolated section of Louisiana on the Mississippi River about 20 miles south of Baton Rouge, the capital city.  
 About 400 patients are in the hospital, which was opened by the state in 1894 and taken over by the federal government in 1921.

## Byrnes Vetoes Federal Job

**COLUMBIA, S. C.** — Gov. James F. Byrnes of South Carolina says he would "under no circumstances" accept any appointment in the federal government.  
 Byrnes made the statement in answer to reports he might get a cabinet post under Republican President-elect Eisenhower.  
 Byrnes, a Democrat, was an Eisenhower supporter during the presidential campaign.  
 The governor said he had not been asked by Gen. Eisenhower to accept any cabinet appointment. He told the conference he planned to finish his four-year term as governor in accordance with a promise made to the people of South Carolina when he was elected.
