 LONDON (AP) - Skillful darts players in the British capital today faced the shattering prospect of having to buy their own drinks - an idea that cast a pall of gloom over the city's pubs.  
 A dart board is standard equipment in virtually every British pub. Under a tradition of several generations standing, the house treats any player scoring a "100" (100 over) to a free pint of beer.  
 But the Licensed Victuallers Association advised pub proprietors yesterday this practice should be abandoned because of a slump in business.  
 "Top figures are down by a third or even more on the early postwar years," one proprietor said. "We have to consider every means of economy."

**Arkansas Faces Woes**  
 LITTLE ROCK (AP) - Francis Cherry says he'll take over as governor of Arkansas in January with only one obligation - "to give the people of the state the best possible administration."  
 Unfriendly persons will tell you that statement is just about as far as Cherry's program goes. They may add that Cherry is "politically naive."  
 Cherry - a Democrat, naturally in Arkansas - steps into the governor's office from a Chancery (civil) Court bench. It is his first statewide office.  
 But Cherry insists he does have a program although admittedly the manner of its presentation has been highly informal.  
 "I'm sure no other candidate for governor was ever probed so thoroughly for his views on every possible subject as I was last summer," he says.  
 He was referring to the radio "talkathon," a marathon question-and-answer period, which he used successfully in his campaign.  
 Cherry, stocky and white-haired at 44, confronts the same school, highway and tax problems that have faced a succession of Arkansas governors and legislatures.  
 Up to now no one has settled any of these problems permanently, and Cherry has promised no quick or easy solutions.  
 However, schools, highways and taxes all are under study by committees he has appointed.

**UNESCO Head Quits in Huff**  
 PARIS (AP) - Jaine Torres Bodet, director general of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, resigned today in protest against the refusal of UNESCO's seventh annual conference to approve the \$20,400,000 budget he asked for.  
 Delegates voted yesterday to set a budget ceiling of 18 million dollars for the 68-nation organization during 1953 and 1954.  
 French Delegate Rene Cassin made a last-minute effort to avert the crisis by saying that the ceiling figure was "quite primitive" and not enough.  
 Cassin declared he would propose a complementary budget, even though France was among the 29 nations that approved the 18 million dollar figure. Twenty-one nations opposed it and four abstained.  
 The ceiling was proposed by an 11-nation group, including the United States, after an earlier British proposal for a "no frills" budget of \$17,436,000 had been defeated.  
 Paulo de Berrado Carneiro, head of the Brazilian delegation and chairman of UNESCO's Executive Board, announced he would resign in sympathy with Torres Bodet.  
 The Mexican director general, speaking in an emotion-charged voice, recalled he offered his resignation during the organization's meeting in Florence two years ago because he wished to return to private life. At that time he was persuaded to withdraw his resignation.  
 In voting the budget ceiling, Torres Bodet said, UNESCO had made a material retreat from its potential solidarity with the principles of the San Francisco Charter of the United Nations.

**Three Killed In Flooding Stream**  
 FREDERICK, Md. (AP) - A farmhand and his two young children were apparently swept from their car and drowned in a rain-swollen creek, state police reported last night.  
 Other motorists at the scene told police the man evidently became confused as he tried to cross a bridge spanning Ballenger Creek two miles southwest of here. The car took a wrong turn, plunged into the stream and the three were presumed to be drowned.  
 Police identified them as Robert Fletcher Jr., 29, Clyde, 6, and Linda, 3.

**JAPANESE AID**  
 MANILA (AP) - President Elpidio Quirino has approved the formation of a Philippine aid development syndicate with Japanese financial and technical assistance. A team of Japanese experts is expected to arrive shortly.

## Hollywood Pays Tribute To Pioneer Louis Mayer

 HOLLYWOOD (AP) - This week Hollywood got around to a belated tribute to one of its pioneers, Louis B. Mayer.  
 The setting was the annual Milestone Dinner of the Screen Producers Guild. Nearly all of the film industry's high-powered executives were there, plus a scattering of low-powered ones. Also a large number of stars including such former Mayer employes as Esther Williams, Van Johnson, Stewart Granger and Norma Shearer.  
 Miss Shearer, one of Mayer's earliest and biggest stars and widow of his production genius, Irving Thalberg, spoke long and emotionally in praise of her former boss. She told of starting for Mayer on a guarantee of four weeks and lasting 18 years.  
 The lighter touch was offered by Jack Benny, George Jessel, George Burns and Bob Hope, who declared that Mayer's "heart is as big as his income tax." Hope added that the film bigwig "has done more for our business than dark balloons."  
 Conspicuously missing from the audience was Dore Schary, the man who supplanted Mayer as the studio chief of MGM. Also absent was Nicholas Schenck, MGM top man who reportedly eased Mayer out of the studio that bears his name. However, Schenck's brother Joseph was among the speakers extolling the guest of honor.  
 Mayer made no mention of his departure from MGM, but instead hailed his new enterprise, Cinecama. He compared the three-dimensional film device in impor-

... tance to the advent of sound.  
 The film pioneer told of his start in the movie business in 1907, in Haverhill, Mass., he took over a theater called the Gem, but nicknamed by the local citizens the "Gem." He cleaned up the place, renamed it the Orpheum and opened a hand-painted film version of the passion play. Added attractions were colored slides of hymns, and a soprano.
