CDA Meeting

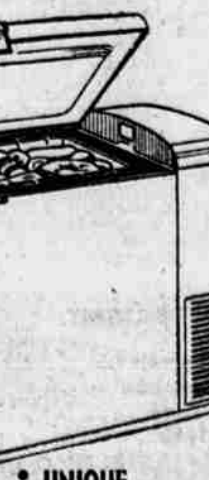
