

Owls Finish With Record 7-3 Mark

Devils Drubbed, 48 to 0

Oregon Tech, a team that missed the Oregon Collegiate Conference title and possibly a bowl bid by two slim after-touchdown points, owns at least a new record today after a frisky closing football performance Saturday on Modoc Field.

The Owls' 48-0 victory over Lower Columbia Junior College gives Orectech a 7-3 record for the season. Last season it was 6-3.

The Hilltop lads played like they meant it Saturday. The Red Devils of Longview, Wash., were never in the ball game except for one march in the third quarter that fizzled on Oregon Tech's 18.

Don Foreman was superb. Dancin' Don, playing his last game for the Owls, scored three touchdowns the first four times he carried the ball from scrimmage; he carried 11 times in all for 126 yards, a neat 12.30 average.

BROWN BUSY
Jack Brown threw three touchdowns passes and caught one himself from Len Genetin for a score.

Dick Flanigan caught two of Brown's tally tosses, Jim Prayac one.

Foreman skipped over from the 15 in the first quarter after Everett Calaway got off a bad punt. On the second play of the second quarter, Foreman cut off tackle, danced into the secondary and went 64 yards for the second score.

Bill Buckingham set up Foreman's next score when he returned a punt from Columbia's 45 to the 10. Foreman circled end to the third touchdown three plays later from the seven-yard line.

FOURTH
Brown pitched to Flanigan for the fourth touchdown, a play that covered 12 yards. Flanigan caught the ball on the seven and went the rest of the way. Genetin's kick was good to give the Owls a 27-0 intermission lead.

In the third quarter, the Owls covered 82 yards in five plays. The Brown to Flanigan team accounted for 39 yards. Brown bootlegged to the 15, then gathered in a pass from Genetin for the score.

TWO MORE
Brown pitched two more touchdowns passes in the fourth quarter. His first to Flanigan spanned 25 yards. With just 25 seconds to go, Brown hit Prayac in the flat as the linebacker who relieved Larry Jeter at fullback skipped 32 yards down the sidelines to the last Orectech touchdown.

Genetin kicked five of six extra points. Gino Lelli one.

Two of Orectech's three losses were by one point. A 13-14 loss to Boise JC may have cost the Owls a bowl bid. The Owls blew the Oregon Collegiate Conference title in a 12-13 loss to the Wolves of Oregon College.

Cordial's Field Goal Margin of Beaver Win

PORTLAND (AP) — A second quarter field goal by Captain Jim Cordial proved the winning margin Saturday as Oregon State defeated its traditional rival, Oregon, 22-19, in the final football game of the season for both teams.

The victory was the only Pacific Coast Conference win in seven starts for Oregon State. Oregon ended the conference season with two wins and five defeats.

Besides kicking the game-winning field goal, Cordial was outstanding as a pass defender and as a pass catching end on offense. He beat back an Oregon scoring threat in the final minutes of the game with a spectacular pass catch that kept the ball for the States until the game ended.

Passing was the key factor in Oregon's scoring. In the first period Quarterback Hal Dunham took to the air for most of a 68-yard drive down the field. Fullback Tom Novikoff plunged over from one yard out.

Oregon State tied it up 6-6 in the second quarter when Fullback Sam Baker scored after a 42-yard march. Cordial's field goal made it 9-6 in favor of Oregon State at halftime.

In the third quarter Dunham passed Oregon 60 yards and Fullback Cecil Hodges cracked the line to put Oregon in the lead again.

But Cordial intercepted another pass and several plays later Fullback Wally Jackson scored. Within a few minutes Baker had scored again for Oregon State to put his team in the lead, 22-12.

Oregon's final touchdown was scored by End Ron Lyman who caught a pass from Quarterback Barney Holland in the end zone.

Central Catholic, showing strength in every department, whipped Jefferson, the Portland city league finalist, 28-7, Saturday night to win the right to play Benson for the Oregon high school football championship.

The all-Portland Class A-1 title game is scheduled for Saturday afternoon in Multnomah Stadium in Portland.

Prineville won its way into the Class A-2 finals by defeating Ashland, 26-13. It will meet St. Helens next week-end for the title.

Wallowa will defend its Class B championship against Drain next week-end. Wallowa won its 25th consecutive victory by flattening Maupin, 40-0, Saturday, while Drain was shading Jefferson, 7-6.

MEET MONDAY
The Oregon School Activities Association was to meet Monday to determine dates and sites of the Prineville-St. Helens and Wallowa-Drain games.

Coburg captured its second successive six-man title by downing Cascade Locks, 36-14, Saturday night.

Central Catholic's victory over Jefferson—its 10th in a row—wasn't an upset, but its decisive margin was surprising. Jefferson, ranked No. 2 in the final Associated Press Oregon prep football poll, had been unbeaten and tied only once in competition considered tougher than Central had faced.

But Central showed its superiority from the start. The alert Rams turned a first period Jeff fumble into a touchdown, beat back two Jeff scoring threats in the second quarter and then threatened to three more touchdowns in the last half.

Jefferson could manage only one scoring drive. It came late in the third period after the Rams had taken a 14-0 lead. The Democrats never threatened again.

This is the second state athletic play-off the Portland Catholic school has reached in 1932. Central Catholic was a finalist in the basketball tournament at Eugene last March, losing to Lincoln of Portland.

BROTHER
Bob Allenhofen, a three-time all-state choice, led the Rams into the hoop finals. Now it is his younger brother Vince, who has spared the Central football team through the season and the play-offs.
