LOS ANGELES (AP) — Once more it's going to be Southern California in the Rose Bowl. And hope springing eternal, a lot of folks out here think this is the West's best.

You may recall that in six starts against the Big Ten since the war, the Coast has yet to win. Locally, the matter is recalled as seldom as possible.

The Trojans, No. 4 team in the nation in last week's AP poll, knocked off No. 3 UCLA, 14-12, before 96,000 in Memorial Coliseum Saturday to win the Pacific Coast Conference title and their 11th trip to Pasadena on New Year's Day.

The Trojans will be on personal exhibition at South Bend this Saturday. There they meet Notre Dame in the traditional season-opening game. The Trojans' record of 11-1 straight and the school's first perfect record since 1932.

SC's opposition in the Rose Bowl narrowed down to a choice between Wisconsin and Purdue, against the Trojan record of six wins in the PCC, the Badgers and Boilermakers have marks of four wins, one loss and one tie in the Big Ten.

SC's Coach Jess Hill said it didn't make any difference to him whether Wisconsin or Purdue was picked. "It's the Coast's turn to win and we'll give 'em the battle of their lives."

To bolster the West's view that this is the year, the PCC's 6-2 record against the Big Ten.

DOESN'T COUNT
Michigan State's 17-14 win over Oregon State doesn't figure in this year's Big Ten football until next fall.

But the nation's No. 1 rated team needed two chances at a last-second field goal to beat OSC, which is the bottom team in the PCC standings.

No one scored more than one touchdown against Southern California all season, and Northwestern, Army, California and Washington were held scoreless.

Southern California's defense played also can be credited with setting up the touchdown that beat UCLA.

With the score 12-7 for the Bruins, the Trojans' Elmer Willard, a 210-pound defensive lineman, intercepted a pass on his own 25 and tagged it back to the UCLA eight before finally being downed.

Four plays later left half Jim Sears passed to right half Al Carmichael for the score, using a play devised just last week. Bad Sam Tsagolakis placed kicked his second conversion.

SPECTACULAR
His first followed a spectacular touchdown play in the second quarter. After gaining 10 yards, Carmichael lateraled to Sears who went 60 more to pay dirt.

In other conference engagements last week, California closed its season with a 26-10 win over its oldest rival, Stanford, in the 55th meeting between the two since 1892. A capacity throng of 83,000 saw the game at Berkeley.

Oregon State racked up a 22-19 upset of Oregon in their annual traditional clash.

One conference contest remains. Washington plays Washington State at Spokane this weekend. Washington State edged out Oklahoma A&M 9-7 last Saturday and Washington had an open date.

King Buck Wins Trials

WELDON SPRINGS, Mo. (AP) — The new king of the National Championship Retriever Trial is King Buck, a black Labrador owned by John Olin of Alton, Ill.

Pro Loop In Knots

NEW YORK (AP) — If you're

rooting for one of the 12 National League football teams, the odds are 7 to 5 your team is one of the leaders.

For with only three weeks of the NFL schedule remaining, four teams, San Francisco, Detroit, Green Bay and Los Angeles, are tied for the top position in the National Conference, each with six victories and three defeats.

And three clubs, Cleveland, New York and Philadelphia, are deadlocked for the No. 1 spot in the American Division, also with 6-3 records.

The four-way standoff in the National Conference is certain to last only a couple of days. Green Bay and Detroit are scheduled to clash on Thursday in the Lions' home den and the winner will sit down for turkey dinner with the undefeated lead.

RECOVER
The Rams climaxed a remarkable recovery from their early season impotency Sunday by vanquishing the 49ers, 35-9, in Los Angeles. A crowd of 77,968 jammed the Coliseum to see the defending champions easily record their fifth straight triumph.

Halfback Woody Lewis began the scoring with an 83-yard punt return in the second quarter.

Quarterback Norman Van Brocklin and end Elroy Hirsch manufactured the second touchdown in the third period on a 46-yard pass play. And with Bob Waterfield adding the extra points, they made it 21 to 0 in the fourth period when Rookie halfback Hugh McElhenny of San Francisco fumbled and Jack Dwyer picked up the ball and raced 34 yards across the goal.

The Rams added two more tallies on drives of 85 and 60 yards, with halfback V. T. Smith carrying the ball on the scoring plays.

FOUR STRAIGHT
At Green Bay, the surprising Packers picked up their fourth straight victory at the expense of the Dallas Texans, 42-14. The Detroit Lions, tied for the lead with San Francisco last week, came a cropper against the Chicago Bears 24-23 in a Windy City thriller.

At Cleveland, the Eagles came from behind with two fourth-quarter scores to upset the Browns 28-20. The New York Giants, who went without a touchdown against Green Bay last week, were held scoreless by Washington for almost three periods but finally overcame a 10-0 Redskins lead to win 14-10.

The improving Pittsburgh Steelers, playing at home, edged the Chicago Cardinals, 17-14.

Big 10 Votes on Wisconsin, Purdue; Navy Eyed For Orange Bowl

NEW YORK (AP) — Only two major bowl spots remained unfilled today and both teams were expected to be filled before nightfall.

The Big Ten representative for the Rose Bowl will be either Wisconsin or Purdue while Alabama's opponent in the Orange Bowl probably will be Navy or Syracuse.

All the others are filled. Southern California clinched the Pacific Coast nod in the Rose Bowl with a 14-12 victory over UCLA Saturday, while Georgia Tech and Mississippi will meet in the Sugar Bowl and Texas will play Tennessee in the Cotton Bowl.

Big Ten athletic directors were being polled for their choice for the West Coast assignment, and although the voting was in strictest secrecy, the chances were that Wisconsin would get the assignment because:

1. The Badgers have a better overall record than Purdue.

2. Wisconsin has not won the league championship since 1912.

Whichever team goes, though, will face an unenviable task because Southern California will rule the heavy favorite as it would over almost any team in the country with one or two possible exceptions.

The fact that Wisconsin has a chance of being left out is the Badgers' own fault. All they had to do Saturday was beat Minnesota, a team beaten three times and tied once. But the Badgers were held to a 21-21 tie, while Purdue was eking out a 21-16 victory over six-times-beaten Indiana. The Boilermakers, in fact, were saved by the clock running out and a five-yard penalty to Indiana on the Purdue 1-yard line.

Both Wisconsin and Purdue obviously were somewhat nervous as was Michigan, which was whipped

by Ohio State, 27-7. Had the Wol-

verines won as expected, they would have had it. Now they're just among the also rans.

Until yesterday, the Orange Bowl was sitting back just watching and waiting. But Alabama's beautifully contrived 27-7 triumph over Maryland made the selectors jump for the Crimson Tide. Although beaten twice, Alabama played a murderous schedule, and still has one game to go, this Saturday against Auburn.

Navy, beaten only by Maryland and Notre Dame, popped into the speculation late last night. The Middles have played in only one bowl game before—in 1924 in the Rose Bowl, when they tied Washington, 14-14. What set off the speculation of Navy making the trip south was an unusual Sunday conference among high academic brass, coach Eddie Erdelatz and Athletic Director Ian Eddy.

The Middles, idle Saturday, wind

up their affairs against Army in Philadelphia this week.

Syracuse, probably the class of the East, got beaten by one point in its season opener against Bowling Air Force Base, then roared through seven opponents, winding up with a 36-13 victory over Fordham Saturday. Along the way, the Orange took its only bad plastering—a 46-7 loss to Michigan State.

Pitt, another team that was rated high on the list of Orange Bowl eligibles, saw its chances go up in the smoke of a 17-6 whitewashing at the hands of Penn State.

Otherwise, you can just about write this in for the 1952 campaign. There are a few more games on tap the most important of which is the Cornell-Penn affair "Thanksgiving Day. If Penn wins it, as it should, the Quakers will take the Ivy League title.

Texas A & M plays Texas the same day, while on Saturday, Boston College goes against Holy Cross. Georgia Tech tackles Georgia. Tennessee meets Vanderbilt and Southern California visits Notre Dame.

closing seconds of the same period, halfback Bobbie Green racing 65 yards to a touchdown after sharing quarterback Don Bobbers' pass. Barker's field goal with three minutes left in the third period put the Cougars out in front to stay.

The Aggies gained only 39 yards rushing against the Cougars' line and picked up 132 yards through the air.

Campbell completed 16 of 29 passes for 189 yards via the air and 223 yards on the ground.
