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## TV, Films See Reconciliation

HOLLYWOOD — (NEA)—Exclusive: Yours. Hollywood and television may be reconciled in Palm Springs, Calif., Feb. 1—without benefit of a shotgun.

Plans for the wedding are still indefinite and hush-hush. But there is an eye-opening possibility that in the first test of tele-telemeter combined TV the same new Hollywood films will be playing simultaneously on home screens and at one of the town's two movie theaters.

In an unprecedented situation to be approved by the film industry, the 30,000 writer residents of Palm Springs will have a choice of buying tickets at the theater boxoffice or dropping coins in a slot attached to their home TV sets to see the same movie.

"That's the idea right now," Carl Lesserman, vice president of Telemeter, told me. "The films will be bought and booked by Earl Strebe, owner of the town's two theaters, who has joined our organization for the test. But nothing is definite. It will all be on a trial basis."

Lesserman predicts all major Hollywood studios will lease new films for the February test "with the possible exception of Fox" (currently plugging big-screen theater TV) and he expects an initial 1000-home audience.

A TV transmitter is being erected in Palm Springs, but the test is to be conducted on a closed-circuit Telemeter wire strung on utility poles. Telemeter, a picture unscrambling device operates either by wire or through the air.

A similar test made two years ago in Chicago via Zenith & Phonovision — the telephone company bills you for the films you see — was a success economically, but failed to impress Hollywood, which pegged only 300 TV sets were used in a town of five million people.

It's difficult to think of Audie Murphy as being temperamental, but his co-workers in U-F's "The Durango Kid" are buzzing about his flare-ups.

Andy McIntyre, who will be Marilyn Maxwell's ex this month, is admitting plans to marry with singer Helen O'Connell. "It's definite," Andy told me. "But there are a number of things we have to work out first."

Mercedes McCambridge, who couldn't escape the curse of an Oscar, has given up her Hollywood home and will live permanently in New York with hubby Fletcher Markle, new director of TV's "Studio One." She will do her radio show, "Defense Attorney" and the TV version of it, from Manhattan.

Red Skelton's near-future switch to situation comedy on TV was decided upon after a long hassle with his sponsors over the poor quality of his telefilms. If the story-line comedy doesn't click, Red will test a variety-show format.

Esther Williams and Mike Todd have made a date in January to further discuss plans for a sequel starring Esther to be staged next summer at Jones Beach. They'll meet at Cypress Garden's Fla., where the movie mermaid will be on location with "Easy to Love."

All plans for filming of "The Flying Enterprise," based on Capt. Kurt Carlson's heroic fight to save his ship in the Atlantic, have been shelved. Announced reason: Failure to obtain the necessary clearances.

Short Takes: Margaret Whiting and hubby Lou Busch are straining at the marriage ties. Maurice O'Hara is doing some secret testing—miles away from the Hollywood glitter dens where gossip-mongers hang out. . . ## U.S. Film Star Refutes Story of British Coolness

HOLLYWOOD — Despite the raps he received on his arrival in England, Rock Hudson has nothing but kind words about his stay there. He even gives a boost to English women, which he says is to be expected.

The husky Hollywood heartbeater recently tied to England to appear in "The Sea Devil" with Yvonne DeCarlo. Upon his arrival, he was blasted by British Equity, the actors' union, for taking a role which is to be played by an English actor. Hudson and Jeffrey Hunter, another American who was playing in a picture made over there, were both criticized for their invasion of the Isles.

"They made their protest and that's all there was to it," remarked Hudson. "There was nothing more they could do about it. I didn't mind at all. It was good publicity for me."

Aside from Equity, there was no other unpleasantness. The people I worked with and the English in general couldn't have been nicer."

He did quite a bit of dating, mostly with girls in the picture business. He refused the American impression that English women are a cool lot.

"They're not," he remarked. "They're a lot nicer to date than American girls. A guy doesn't get the intrigue that women over here insist on handing out. If an English girl is interested in romance, she lets you know about it. She also lets you know if she isn't interested. She never keeps you in doubt, as American women do."

"By American standards, the English women aren't as beautiful as Americans. Nor do they have as attractive figures, that's because of the diet they are subjected to. But their skin is the most beautiful I have ever seen."

Hudson found movie making entirely different from the way it is done in Hollywood. His film required 10 weeks of shooting, about half of which was spent on the island of Jersey in the English Channel.

"That's more than twice as long as any other picture I've ever worked on here," said the big boy from Winnetka, Ill. The English picture was his first loan-out; all his other films have been made at economy-minded Universal-International.

Hudson is back on the old lot, this time going through another Oriental exercise called "The Golden Blade." The crux of the story of the picture is the sword of Damocles.

Hudson and I leaned back and watched while his double wielded the sword against an onslaught of villainous soldiers. Then something embarrassing happened. The invincible golden blade snapped off at the handle. Luckily, the prop department was standing by with another.

The Conservative party in the Stroud and Thornbury district wrote him it could not recommend him over 40. The incumbent, Tory is 49 but does not plan to seek office again.

"An extraordinary decision," was all Grant-Ferris could say.

## British Mull Otter Coats

LONDON — Customs today held temporarily eight new fur coats that eight British women, including the wife of Britain's Communist party chief Harry Pollitt, brought back from Red China.

The furs, described as land otters, were gifts of the mayor of Peiping. Customs officials on duty, who said the fur was a new one for them, were stymied in trying to value them for import duty purposes when the women arrived with them yesterday. So the coats were impounded for a check by experts.

## New Maine Governor Never Lost An Election

AUGUSTA, Me. (AP)—Respected Horist—mild-mannered but determined enough to win every election in his 18 years of campaigning — will become Maine's governor in January.

It wasn't until he was 31 that Republican Burton M. Cross, now 49, decided to go into politics. His ambition as a youth was to become a lawyer. When family finances prevented that, he decided to help make laws.

Cross, who defeated Democrat James G. Oliver in Maine's September election, would like to be at least "level of the trend toward centralization of government."

"If we follow a trend of turning back services from the federal government to the states and from state government to the towns," he has said, "local government once again would mean a lot more than it does now."

"Many problems can best be handled at the town level, where a closer supervision and a more thorough knowledge of local conditions may result in a better taxpayer's value for his dollar."

Cross' father died when he was 8. The boy was driving a pair of horses on the family farm here when he was 12. A track enthusiast, young Burt was a familiar sight running in Augusta's outskirts or practicing field games.

When he was 31 he ran for the City Council and was elected, subsequently he served as president of both the Council and Board of Aldermen. The Legislature was the next step.

Cross sat two years in the House and four in the Senate, where he was president in 1949 and 1951. As presiding officer, he seldom if ever became ruffled or spurred in parliamentary tangles. He ruled with impressive fairness.

The governor-elect enjoys fishing but doesn't go very often. Reports that he hauled a 61-pound salmon from Sebago Lake are "somewhat magnified," he said. It was a 21-pounder.

Mrs. Cross was Olena R. Manton of New Hampshire. She Cross met while she was a teacher's grandparents in Vassalboro. They have three daughters and two grandchildren.

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP)—A circus lion is back in his cage here today after a night on the town.

While being changed from one cage to another, the beast escaped and headed for a farm shed housing pigs. He killed a sow and two young pigs before police and members of the circus recaptured him by tricking him into running into a cage.
