Taylor, DiNucci Benched

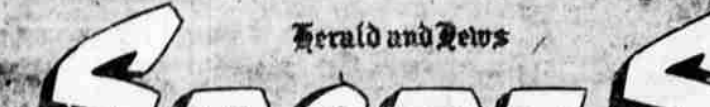
PORTLAND (AP) — Benson Tech and Central Catholic both reported Wednesday that players were being benched for their Saturday afternoon game. Benson Tech's offensive line, which was the mainstay of the team's success in the Clatsop County championship game, was benched. One of the team's mainstays, Jim DiNucci, who plays tackle on both offensive and defensive ends, and Jack Taylor, offensive guard, both suffered fractures in Saturday's game against Jefferson and each has a leg in a cast.

Coach Harry Schmitt said Vic Schneider, a defensive regular, could play on offense, too, filling in for Taylor. DiNucci's spot will be taken by Roger Marion on offense and Jack Fazio on defense. Benson is having a little trouble, too. Bob Clark, a former first-teamer in the Marshfield game. He will be able to play, Coach Ralph Herper said, but the bruise caused him some trouble. His brother, Jerry Clark, also was hurt—a hip bone injury—in the Marshfield game and is limping at practices.

Clell Hobson Named Back Of the Week

NEW YORK (AP) — Clell Hobson, quarterback of Alabama's Orange Bowl bound Crimson Tide, was named Associated Press back of the week Wednesday.

Hobson, who switched from left half to signal calling late in 1950, played a big role in Alabama's surprise 27-7 trouncing of Maryland last Saturday. The youngster from Tuscaloosa, Ala., a pro baseball prospect, crossed up Maryland with a fine running game. Hobson is better known for his passing. High up on the list were right halfback Al Carmichael and left halfback Jimmy Sears who sparked unbeaten Southern California to a bruising 14-12 triumph over U.C.L.A. and into the Rose Bowl. Sears scored the first touchdown, racing 60 yards after taking a lateral from Carmichael. Then in the third period, with Southern Cal trailing 12-7, Sears and Carmichael combined to score the winning six points after the TD was set up by a 72-yard run of an intercepted pass by Elmer Willhoite. Four plays after the spectacular run, Sears flipped a four-yard scoring pass to Carmichael and Southern Cal was in the Rose Bowl. Other backs who were in the running were Billy Vessels and Eddie Crowder of Oklahoma's powerful Sooners. Hero Hunt of Kentucky and Paul Giel of Minnesota.

Heisman Trophy Goes To Sooners' Vessels

NEW YORK (AP) — Billy Vessels, senior halfback of the powerful Oklahoma Sooners, is the first player of a Big Seven Conference team to win the coveted Heisman Memorial Trophy.

Vessels won the trophy awarded annually since 1935 by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York to the "Outstanding College Football Player in the Country." In a handsome suit, Vessels, a sophomore, was the star Sooner back who gained honorable mention on the Associated Press 1950 All-America team, gained 525 points from the 1,322 electors from coast to coast. Jack Seabath, quarterback of Maryland, finished second with 37 points and Paul Giel of Minnesota, third with 32. Don Heinrich of the University of Washington was ninth, with 153 points. Ahead of him in the balloting were Don Moorman, UCLA; Jack Lattner, Notre Dame; Paul Cameron, UCLA; Jim Sears, Southern California; and Don McAuliffe, Michigan State.

Rote Passes Van Brocklin

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Tobin Rote of the Green Bay Packers, and Norman Van Brocklin, of the Los Angeles Rams, are waiting a dinner here on Dec. 2. ROOKIE LIFTS GIANTS

NEW YORK (AP) — The hottest topic of conversation among this town's football fans in recent days is the manner in which Freddie Benner, the former Southern Methodist passing ace, has suddenly lifted the New York Giants up by the slack of their pants and pitched them into the thick of the race for the professional championship.

The tall, rangy rookie had been sitting on the bench and picking up nothing but hip bunnions during the Giants' first eight games, in which they had posted the not impressive win-loss record of 5-3.

After a fine start, the club's regular quarterback and passer, Charlie Conerly, had lost the knack of hitting his receivers.

As far as three games back, the city had gone up for Coach Steve Owen to forget his loyalty to Conerly and at least give Benner a shot at the job.

"Do you want me to shoot Conerly just because he has a bad game or two?" Owen demanded. "Anyways, Benner is too fine a prospect to be thrown in there and ruined before he has learned the T-formation thoroughly. He never worked from anything but the spread formation in college. I won't put him on such a spot until I know he's ready."

And that was how matters stood when Sunday's game began against the Redskins. It was taken for granted that if the Polo Grounders lost that one they would be out of the running for the title in their division. There was Conerly still crouched behind center, and the discontent among the Harlem alumni was vast.

BENNER IN
Before one quite knew what had happened, Washington was tripping the Giants to run up a 10-0 lead. The end of the first period marked the seventh straight in which the Giants under Conerly's direction had not scored a touchdown. About midway of the second quarter, Benner finally made up his mind that Conerly had a sore arm and flagged Benner in.

The reaction of the Giants was somewhat electrifying. The kid looked as though he had been washed on the T-formation. In 11 plays, mixing his tactics skillfully, he drove his club 77 yards to a touchdown, then he went 48 yards in seven plays for the winner. Another long march in the fourth period was broken up by a fumble near the goal line. In the course of turning an apparent rout into a vital 14-10 victory, Benner hit on eight of 13 passes for 113 yards.
