NEW YORK (AP)—Actress Hedy Lamarr says her former husband, actor John Loder, owes her \$19,200 for support and maintenance of their three children. Miss Lamarr filed suit yesterday in State Supreme Court to collect the amount.

She said in her complaint that by the terms of a California divorce decree which became final in 1946 Loder was obligated to pay \$300 a month for the children's maintenance plus medical and dental expenses. The total of such costs is \$23,500 and Loder has paid only \$4,200.

Rail Stock Said Stable

Rolling stock service by one of the railroads serving Klamath Falls should remain stable in the near future, according to an announcement received here yesterday by Southern Pacific Dist. Agent George Morgan.

The Southern Pacific is asking for bids on another 2,000 new freight cars, although 6,300 cars are still to be delivered on previous orders, Southern Pacific Pres. D. J. Russell has announced. The new orders will raise to about 40,000 the number of cars acquired or ordered by the Southern Pacific since the end of World War II. Since 1946, the release said, capacity of Southern Pacific's freight car fleet has increased 31 per cent, contrasted with a national gain of only about four per cent.

The new orders include mostly open gondolas and open and covered hopper cars. Although costs of the newest cars won't be known until the bids are in, it is estimated they will raise to more than \$440,000,000 the railroad's appropriations for postwar equipment.

This includes the Southern Pacific's share in some 10,200 new refrigerator cars for the jointly owned Pacific Fruit Express Company.
