

### Women to Handle Money In Ike's Administration

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration will be staffed by women in one way—women will handle much of the money.

Mrs. Cecilia Culp Hobby has been named head of a federal agency which includes the world's largest insurance agency, and Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest will be signing the paper currency—the nation's folding money.

President-elect Eisenhower has named Mrs. Hobby of Houston, Tex., as administrator of the Federal Security Agency and Mrs. Priest of Bountiful, Utah, as treasurer of the United States. Both are 47.

Eisenhower, in announcing Mrs. Hobby's designation to succeed Oscar Ewing, said she would attend Cabinet meetings because of the importance of her post. Ewing on occasion was invited to such meetings by President Truman,

but he did not attend regularly.

Mrs. Priest as treasurer will succeed Mrs. Georgia Neese Clark of Richmond, Kan., the first woman to be Uncle Sam's purse-string custodian. She will be charged with the receipt, disbursement and accounting of public moneys. Her signature will appear on all green-

backs from \$1 up.

Eisenhower's inclusion of Mrs. Hobby at Cabinet meetings gave rise to renewed speculation that the Republicans may be planning

to push the Hoover Commission recommendation that a new Cabinet post be created to include the variety of activities now in the Federal Security Agency.

### War Criminals See Ball Game

TOKYO (AP)—This was a big day for Japan's 640 war criminals from Sugamo Prison.

They saw — for the first time since their convictions at the end of the war—Tokyo's colorful streets and a professional ballgame.

They saw, too, families and friends who crowded near their

section of the stands at Korakuen Stadium.

Officially they were not permitted to talk to or have any contact with relatives. But their guards frequently were very busy watching the Daiet Stars beat the Tokyo Whales, 6-1.

At one of those times a girl, 7 or 8 years old and clad in a red dress, accented by a pink hair ribbon, slid past guards and threw her arms around her father.

He hungrily returned her embrace before she was hustled away.

The guards turned away as a flashbulb popped. Pictures had been forbidden. Newsmen were not allowed to approach the prisoners.

The outing was arranged by the Justice Department and the baseball teams.

### AP Reporter Wins Medal

HANOI, Indochina (AP)—The high command today awarded the Croix de Guerre with Bronze Star to Larry Allen, veteran Associated Press foreign correspondent, in recognition of his front-line coverage of the Indochinese war against the Communist-led Vietminh rebels.

Gen. Gonzalez de Linages, French commander of Northern Viet Nam, in presenting the decoration said it was for Allen's reporting of the war "without fear of danger" and in recognition of his "scrupulous concern for objectivity which contributed to giving a vivid and exact picture of the severe combat delivered by the French-Viet Namese Army against the Vietminh Communists."

Allen, 44, who won the Pulitzer Prize in 1941 for his wartime reports from the British Mediterranean Fleet, has been in Indochina for 14 months. He has been a foreign correspondent for the Associated Press since 1938.

Born at Mt. Savage, Md., Allen started as a reporter on the Baltimore News and later worked on newspapers in Washington, D. C., Portsmouth, Q., and Huntington, W. Va., before joining the Associated Press at Charleston, W. Va., in 1933.

### Oldster To Show Sheep

CHICAGO (AP)—A 71-year-old Texas woman, dressed in cowboy attire, arrived in Chicago yesterday with 15 Hampshire sheep which she hopes will win a championship at the International Live Stock exposition.

"Hope to take home a championship," Mrs. Ammie E. Wilson of Plano, Tex., said at the International Amphitheater at the stock yards, where the exposition opens Saturday for eight days.

"Age doesn't mean a thing if you feel good and keep busy," the spry and smiling Mrs. Wilson said. "Rode all the way up here in a truck with my shepherd, Bill Raiden, and the sheep, and I feel fine."

Sheep raising is her hobby. She took it up in 1941 "to keep my mind busy" after the death of her son.

TOKYO (AP)—The U. S. Army—with its wholesale connections—will give American troops in Japan and Korea a Thanksgiving Day Turkey dinner at a cost of \$1.50 each.
