Plenty Of Food Listed For Holiday

Pork and pork products, turkeys and raisins will head the list of plentiful foods, during December. Pork continues to be a good meat buy, partly because it is running into competition with large sup-

plies of beef coming on the market. Retail pork prices have declined recently.

There will be plenty of turkeys for both Thanksgiving and Christmas, but they may be slightly higher in December. Prices, however, are expected to be lower than a year ago.

The raisin crop this year is estimated at 295 thousand tons—20 percent above average, and enough to furnish every person in the U.S. with about 3 pounds apiece. A favorite holiday fruit, raisins are especially good for pork or poultry stuffing and for sauce with smoked pork.

A tasty sauce to serve with ham or other smoked pork has been developed by cookery experts. To make: Mix 1/4 cup sugar, 1 tablespoon cornstarch and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add 1 cup cider and 1/2 cup seedless raisins. Put in 4 small pieces of stick cinnamon and 8 whole cloves (tie in cheesecloth to remove). Boil mixture about 10 minutes and remove spices. Serve hot over the meat. If desired, the sauce may be made with pineapple juice instead of cider.

Besides raisins, plentiful fruits

for December include: oranges, grapefruit, table grapes, domestic dried figs, and California dates. This year's orange crop is expected to be of record size—perhaps 20 percent above average.

Among the vegetables on the December list are: fresh carrots and dry baby lima beans.

Among the nuts, the most plentiful will be almonds, filberts and walnuts.

Fats and oils for frying, shortening and salad dressing will be in large supply generally at reasonable prices.

As for dairy products, dry skim milk, cottage cheese and butter-milk are expected to be reasonable in price because of large supplies on hand.

PRETTY PEARS

The winter pears on the market now look like blue ribbon winners at a county fair. We are especially impressed with Comice pears this year because they are so well shaped and beautiful to look at—rosy cheeked against a soft green. Their good looks don't betray their flavor, which is unquestionably excellent.

Helpful Hints

Be sure to rinse out all bleach thoroughly before rinsing out clothes. Otherwise there may be a delayed bleach-attack which will weaken the cloth.

The nap of your sueded and velvets can be restored with a vapor-steam iron. Brush with the nap before the article is completely dry.

If your vacuum cleaner is not picking up properly, check the cleanliness of the bag. After it is empty, turn it inside out and brush thoroughly. Never wash the bag.

If you haven't time to iron immediately, you can keep the laundry damp indefinitely without mildew. Store it in your refrigerator or refrigerator in wax paper.

A good mixture for cleaning copper can be made from the following recipe: 1 pint hot water, 1/2 cup soap flakes, 3 tablespoons whitening and 2 tablespoons vinegar.

Before buying perfume try it on your own skin. The chemistry of your body slightly changes the scent. If it still smells delicious to you after a number of hours, you can safely buy it.

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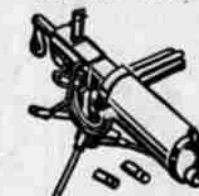
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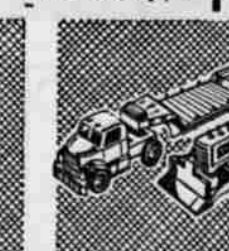


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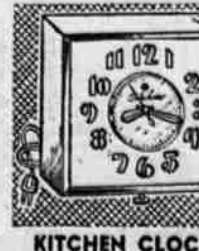
