### Milk Price Hearings Set

**PORTLAND** (AP)—The State Milk Marketing Administration will hold a series of milk price hearings, starting this week, to bring its listed prices up to date before an OPS order sets a ceiling price.

The OPS order, which goes into effect Dec. 15, will set the ceiling at state-fixed minimum milk prices.

Officials said hearings would be held in areas where prices have risen above the minimums approved by the Milk Marketing Administration.

The schedule includes: Nov. 28, Albany, for Linn and Benton Counties; Nov. 28, Eugene, Lane County; Nov. 29, McMinnville, Yamhill County; Nov. 29, Sisters, for Marion and Polk Counties; Dec. 2, Roseburg, Douglas County; Dec. 2, Coos Bay, for Coos and Western Douglas Counties; Dec. 3, Klamath Falls, Klamath County; Dec. 3, Lakeview, Lake County; Dec. 5, Pendleton, Umatilla, Morrow and Gilliam Counties.

### Student Finds Ancient Skull

**DELAWARE, O.** (AP)—An Ohio Wesleyan University co-ed has found part of the skull of a fish that scientists believe may be 250 million years old.

Theina Cook, Washington, D. C. senior majoring in zoology and botany, found the skull plate imbedded in a 60-pound boulder while on a geology field trip in a nearby gravel pit.

The fish, *Macropetalichthys*, sometimes grew to lengths of 30 feet. It was heavily armored on the outside and had no bones on the inside.

Miss Cook's discovery is considered particularly important because it is a complete skull plate. Few of these have been found.

**PORCUPINES KILL TREES**

**DENVER** (AP)—You can include the U. S. Forest Service among those that don't like porcupines. They are unselective critters with all those quills and, besides, they're "murder" on trees. Arthur L. Nelson, assistant regional forester here, says porcupine damage to timber in the Rocky Mountain area is getting serious. A single porcupine can damage or kill as many as 100 trees in a winter. They like to climb up a tree and eat the bark away in a complete circle, thus smothering off the flow of sap.

### Orlando Has Heart Attack

**ROME** (AP)—Vittorio Emanuele Orlando, last survivor of the Big Four, who led the forging of the World War I peace treaty, suffered a heart attack Wednesday night and is seriously ill, a member of his family said Thursday.

Two doctors who have been treating the 92-year-old statesman said his worsened condition is causing "Koreans concern."

Orlando became premier during the World War I and as the head of Italy's delegation to the Paris conference formed the dominant group that also included President Woodrow Wilson, Britain's Lloyd George and France's Georges Clemenceau.

**DALLAS** (AP)—It was Thanksgiving Day and Garland Dee Urquhart's old sedan had stalled in downtown Dallas.

### Germans OK RFE Program

**BONN, Germany** (AP)—A West German government spokesman said Thursday Radio Free Europe would be permitted to continue operation when West Germany regains its sovereignty, but it will have to be careful not to "damage German interests."

Radio Free Europe (RFE) is the powerful American station which broadcasts to Iron Curtain countries from Munich.

It is financed by private contributions, not U. S. Government subsidy.

Herbert Blankenhorn, a govern-

ment spokesman, told parliament that RFE, which now operates under a U. S. occupation license, would be granted a German license when the occupation ends.

However, Blankenhorn added, the Germans already had found some of RFE's broadcasts objectionable, and they will watch them closer in the future.

The Bonn government will reserve the right to revoke its license if RFE should persistently violate German interests.
