### Kittle Steps Up

Hub (The Guss) Kittle took another step up the baseball ladder yesterday.

The tobacco-chewing ex-manager of the Klamath Falls Gems of the now-defunct Class D Far West League was appointed yesterday to skipper Terre Haute of the Three I League, a Class B club belonging to the Philadelphia Phils, whose home is Yakima, Wash., has been with the Phillies organization four years, winning two championships.

Kittle managed the Gems in 1949 and 1950, capturing the title his last year here.

In 1951 the Salt Lake City Bees of the Class C Pioneer League won the pennant under Kittle's guidance. In 1950 the Gems finished second in the Far West League.

The announcement of Kittle's graduation to Class B baseball ranks was given to the Associated Press by Joe Rector, director of the Philadelphia National League club's farm organizations.

Kittle, 36, will replace Lamar (Sneezy) Newsome, who has been transferred to the Schenectady, N.Y., club of the Eastern League as manager.

An ex-teacher, Kittle is particularly valuable as a teacher of young hitters.

### Gonsalves Eyes Shot At Carter

NEW YORK (AP) — Johnny Gonsalves was ready to park on Light-weight Champion Jimmy Carter's doorstep Saturday following his come from behind victory over Orlando Zulueta.

The Strongman contender from Oakland, Calif., achieved two of his long sought goals—a Garden and national television show victory—when he edged Zulueta, who had brought him closer to his third ambition, a title crack at Carter.

For awhile it looked as if the 22-year-old, third-ranking contender was going down to defeat in his Garden and National TV debut. He appeared to be in a bad position.

But by the end of the third round he was trailing badly and was out under the right eye and over the left eye.

But the 135 1/2 pound youngster firmed up in the fourth round and from then on outscored his aggressive 133-pound rival with flashy combination punches to gain the split decision.

Manager Jack Mendonca said he was going to discuss Carter and future fights with International Boxing Club officials Saturday.

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## Standlee Punched By Polio

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Polio has struck down Norm Standlee, full-back and team captain of the San Francisco 49ers.

But, it was announced Saturday, no team quarantine has been imposed and the 49ers' crucial game with the Los Angeles Rams Sunday will go on as scheduled. Whichever team wins will vault into a first place tie with the Detroit Lions.

Standlee, nicknamed "Big Chief" because he played his college football with the Stanford University Indians, was confined Friday to the isolation ward in Children's Hospital here.

Doctors said the crippling disease was caught in its early stages, and Standlee is not in any immediate danger of permanent disability. He has no paralysis at present, they added.

Standlee was confined to bed Tuesday night. First diagnosis indicated a virus infection and possible pneumonia. When he failed to respond to treatment, he was taken to a hospital in Palo Alto, and later transferred to Children's Hospital here.

Standlee joined the Chicago Bears after being graduated from Stanford in 1941. In his first season with the Bears, Standlee was named the greatest fullback of all time. He also became the owner of the Washington Redskins. After wartime Army duty, the powerful 240-pound fullback joined the 49ers for their opening season in 1946.

## Pvt. Don Heinrich Bows Out

SPOKANE (AP) — A five-star field general, who'll go back to being an Army private next week, will close out a brilliant collegiate football career Saturday as he leads the Washington Huskies in their annual "civil war" against the Washington State Cougars.

Quarterback Don Heinrich, who made the 1950 All-America as a Washington junior, has a chance to become the second man in college history to win two national passing championships.

Daring Don needs only four completions to overtake Tommy O'Connell of Illinois, who ended his season last Saturday with 133. Heinrich now has hit 130.

He also could take over the total offense leadership if he has a terrific day against the Cougars. He rates fourth now with 1,506 yards, a bit 218 behind O'Connell.

Heinrich was inducted into the Army last Monday, but received two three-day passes so he could complete his college gridiron career in the final major West Coast game of the season.

The Cougars, itching for revenge against a "gift" touchdown Washington gave them on the same day, Memorial Stadium field two years ago, are one to two touchdowns underdogs.

## Spring Menu Okayed By NW Circuit

PORTLAND (AP) — Spring sports schedules were approved without change Friday at the annual Northwest Conference winter meeting. The conference golf and tennis championships were set for May 13 at Willamette University, Salem, with the track tournament to be at the same site the following day.

Conference officials also approved the use of the rubber-covered football; granted Ralph Stephenson, Willamette junior, another year's eligibility in track, and decided that if the Bear Bow benefit football game at Medford is resumed teams from the Northwest Conference can participate.

Member schools were asked to make recommendations at the spring meeting on a substitute for the controversial "five to one" eligibility rule. In effect, it requires an athlete to be passing in at least five hours of school work for every hour in which he is failing.

It has been proposed that the ratio be changed to four-to-one.

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## Prineville Whips St. Helens

Prineville ranked No. 9 in the final American Prep Oregon prep poll, but it could do to turn back St. Helens. Prineville had a yardage advantage of 293 yards to 265, but St. Helens recorded 11 first downs to 10.

The favored Cougars from Central Oregon started strongly, romping 51 yards on eight plays with Fullback Chuck Martinson, the game's ruffling star, bucking seven yards to a touchdown.

St. Helens promptly tried it with a 47-yard scoring drive. Fullback Bob Bogardus going the final eight.

Martinson's 66-yard run with a partially-blocked punt set up a Prineville touchdown in the second period. Quarterback Martin Johnson ran four yards to the score to give Prineville a 12-6 halftime lead.

Halfback Dwaine Marshall put St. Helens back in a tie when he took the second half kick-off and scrambled 70 yards to the goal.

St. Helens kept threatening until halted early in the fourth period on the Prineville 10. From there, the Cougars marched 90 yards on seven plays to the winning touchdown. Halfback Earl Moore went the final 23 yards.

Martinson added an insurance touchdown on a short plunge after Prineville recovered a fumble on the St. Helens four-yard line.

It was the 11th victory in 12 games for Prineville, coached by Keith DeCourcy, a former University of Washington and University of Oregon player. The Cougars' A-2 championship is the first officially won in a class set up for schools with enrollments between 150 and 450.

St. Helens had won 10 of its 11 games this year.

Wallowa led all the way in the Class B title game at Roseburg. Quarterback Hubert Crow passed to Ed John Clark for the opening touchdown and Fullback Dallas Johnson kicked the first of three conversions.

Drain, which had won 11 straight games, matched the touchdown on the first of two scoring passes from Quarterback Jim Whipple to Ed Jack Weaver. But Dr. Weaver missed the conversion, and that was as close as they could get.

Halfback Jerry Constock dashed 50 yards to the second Wallowa touchdown and set up the third game with a 40-yard scamper, enabling Crow to plunge over from the one.

Dallas Johnson ran seven yards to the victors' last touchdown. A Whipple-Weaver pass produced the game's final score with 17 seconds to go.

Two Portland teams—Central Catholic and Benson Tech—met Saturday afternoon for the A-1 championship to wind up this year's Oregon prep football activity.

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## Basketball Shouldn't Hurt from Scandals

NEW YORK (AP) — The basketball season is upon us again, mates, and we have been asked if it is true that the sport is in a bad way from the series of "dumping" scandals and other assorted malfeasances that have kept it up in the crime news, along with arson and multiple bigamy, during the past few years.

"Will people continue to pay to see it after all this bad publicity?" we are asked. "Don't you feel that this is the critical season for the game, when it might start sliding back to the status of the very minor sport it was before Ned Irish got on his first program in Madison Square Garden in the early 30's?"

We have passed on the questions to a number of men who know a

great deal more about basketball than we ever intend to, and their answer is a vigorous "no" on each count. They claim the game is treasured in the country of its birth much too big, too solidly entrenched in the country of its birth and much of the rest of the world to be seriously hurt by its recent misfortunes.

The garden has a fine schedule of attractions booked for the winter, they point out, even if such former standouts as Kentucky, Long Island U., Bradley, Oklahoma Aggies and CCNY will be missing. They predict confidently that about as large as in other years.

"That is only a small part of the overall picture, though," one of our experts commented. "Since the Garden made basketball big stuff and showed the kind of money there was in it, schools all over the country have built huge, expensive field houses and advanced basketball to a status only just behind that of football. They no longer need to come to the Garden to make big money."

"As for the fans who love basketball staying away just because a few boys were caught shaving points for money you can forget it. Did baseball fold up after the Black Sox scandal? All that did was awaken baseball to the fact that it had a problem on its hands, and this has done the same for basketball."

**NO BRIBING**

The banishment of the Black Sox had its effect upon every baseball player who has come along since. It's hard for a stranger to get the time of day from one of them. From here on it's going to be much the same with the basketball players. You've got to be a most optimistic person that you'll ever again hear of a college player accepting a bribe."

In view of the amount of bribing that seems to have gone on at the height of the practice a few seasons back, this would appear to be a most optimistic prediction, but the man could be close to right. The boys who succumbed to the gamblers originally did not feel, upon their word, that they were doing anything very wrong in merely adjusting the score to fit the point spread. It was only later, after they were hooked, that some of them actually took to throwing games. The players you will see out there this winter know the facts of life.

## Rams, 49'ers Quarrel For Top Spot Pro Tie

NEW YORK (AP) — Four games will be played in the National Football League Sunday, but only one thing is certain—not more than two teams will be tied for first place in the National Conference.

All four games have a direct bearing on the championship picture and it could well be that the day's play will end with the New York Giants, Cleveland Browns and the Philadelphia Eagles still tied for the lead in the American Conference.

But such is not the case in the National, where the Detroit Lions hold a half-game advantage over the San Francisco 49ers and the Los Angeles Rams thanks to a 48-24 Thanksgiving Day victory over Green Bay.

The 49ers and the Rams, who won the league title last year, will

lash for the second straight week with the engagement scheduled before 60,000 fans at San Francisco's Kezar Stadium.

A victory for either team will create a two-way deadlock with the Lions. But a tie—something unusual in the pro circuit—would give Detroit loose possession of the top spot.

To maintain the three-way tie at the head of the American Division, Cleveland will have to defeat the Redskins at Washington, the Giants will have to down the tough Steelers at Pittsburgh and the Eagles will have to take their second straight from the Cardinals at Chicago's Gomiskey Park.

Although the Rams walloped the 49ers 38-9 in Los Angeles last Sunday, the odds-makers say it still an even-money proposition.
