Two local men were arrested over the weekend on multiple-charged warrants issued by E. E. Grant, justice of the peace at Enterprise, Ore.

They are Theodore Milton Van, 25, of 1825 Biskiyou, a cleaning truck driver, and Lora LeRoy Tinsus, 24, same address, a meat cutter. The men are charged with killing a cow elk in closed season and area, killing a calf elk in closed season and area, and with wanton waste of game animals.

State Police arrested them on the warrants from Enterprise, and they posted \$250 bail each for appearance Wednesday in Judge Grant's court.

Services Held For D. L. Denton

PORT KLAMATH - Funeral services were held at the Fort Klamath Methodist Church for Delbert Louis Denton, Nov. 28. He was a well-known local rancher, whose death on the preceding Monday had shocked friends and relatives. The capacity of the church was overtaken by the many who came to pay their last respects to the popular and respected Fort Klamath citizen, many being forced to stand in the church vestibule and outdoors during the final rites.

Floral arrangements banked the interior of the church, the lovely blooms bearing eloquent silent testimony to the high esteem in which Delbert Denton was held by all who knew him. Two vocal numbers "Rock of Ages," and "The Lord's Prayer," were sung during the services which were conducted by Rev. C. Ellery Echlin, pastor of Fort Klamath and Cluquin Methodist Churches. Concluding graveside services were held at Fort Klamath Cemetery, where Delbert was laid to rest in the family plot.

Thirty-eight years old at the time of his passing, Delbert was born April 5, 1914, at Central Point and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Denton, well known pioneer ranchers of the Wood River Valley. He was a Fort Klamath resident for the past 33 years, and had received his education at local schools, being a graduate in 1937 of Fort Klamath High School, of which Harold Ashley, longtime friend of the Dentons was then principal. During World War II, Delbert enlisted in the U. S. Marine Corps, and saw much combat duty with his division overseas. His father died two years ago, and in addition to his mother, survivors include his widow, Aileen, of Klamath Falls, and two small children, Kathy, 5, and Steve, 3, both of whom have been in the care of their grandmother for some time past.
