Klamath County Treasurer Reports on Bank Accounts

As of Dec. 1, Klamath County had \$2,822,896.88 deposited in one bank or another.

That is the monthly report of County Treasurer Annabelle Newton.

The money is deposited in 80 different accounts in four different banks, three here in Klamath Falls and one in New York City.

The deposits include:

First National Bank (Main Street branch) \$1,067,413.87; First National Bank (S. 6th branch) \$151,233.97; United States National Bank \$1,402,622.79; National City Bank of New York \$11,016.25; and \$100,600 in various government bonds and investments.

Milk Ceiling Prices Set

Recent action by the Office of Price Stabilization has set the minimum milk price as set by the Oregon Milk Marketing Administration through hearings effective Dec. 15 as the ceiling prices on that commodity to be enforced by the OPS.

A meeting to possibly revise minimum prices paid by distributors to producers and wholesale and retail prices is to be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday in the city council chambers, City Hall, before Asst. Adm. W. S. Weidel, who will act as examiner.

According to a release from Weidel's office, prices being paid in the county have exceeded minimum prices set by the administration through negotiation between producers (dairy farmers) and distributors (creameries).

The release said the local hearing has been called to set the ceiling prices "sufficiently high to assure an adequate milk supply."

If ceilings were set without tomorrow's hearing, dairymen would stand to lose money on their operations which already are showing extremely close margins of profit.

State Prison Shop Burned

SALEM, Ore. — Fire destroyed the tailor shop at the State Penitentiary Monday night and prison officials Tuesday were trying to find out whether the blaze had been set.

Guards said they suspected arson as the convicts had been recent during a "shake-down" earlier in the day when prisoners and cells were searched for five cartons of cigarettes stolen from the prison commissary Sunday night.

Warden Virgil J. O'Malley said that during the fire most of the convicts were locked in their cells and there was no disturbance or escape attempt.

The burned tailor shop was on the second floor of a building inside the prison walls. The floor below, containing the prison shoe shop and offices, was damaged by water. The same building was damaged by fire three years ago.

The Salem fire department put out the blaze.

O'Malley estimated the loss from the fire at about \$10,000 including cloth, sewing machines, irons, pressing machines and personal clothing owned by the convicts.
