Blocked Punt Tie Okayed

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—The National Collegiate Athletic Bureau has ruled the University of Idaho is entitled to a share of the national punt-blocking record.

And the player who made the record possible is credited with a record of his own.

It was RAY Lewis who put up his hand during Vandals game with North Dakota State and deflected a punt.

The ball rolled about 20 yards but Al Barackman, official Idaho statistician and sports editor of the Moscow Daily Idahonian ruled it was not a blocked kick.

At first the incident, however, and when the season ended claimed nine blocked kicks for Idaho — tying the national record — but was told by the NCAA he'd only reported eight.

Idaho complained and NCAA director Homer Cooke ruled Monday the partially blocked kick counted.

Idaho had nine blocked punts for the season sharing the record with Miami (Fla.), Wake Forest, and Virginia Tech.

As for Lewis: The NCAA said it hasn't been keeping individual records on blocked punts but Lewis is getting credit for one for the six he stopped this season.

Gault Whips Gagnon Again

QUEBEC, (AP) — Henry (Pappy) Gault, a superbly-conditioned boxer from Spartanburg, S. C., Monday night successfully defended the North American bantamweight title he won here just five weeks ago against Fernando Gagnon of Quebec.

For the second time in a row, Pappy left-jabbed his way to a unanimous 13-round decision over the fading Quebecer who has held the Canadian bantamweight crown since August, 1946.

NCAA Likes Video Plan

NEW YORK (AP) — It appears the pleas of the Universities of Pennsylvania and Notre Dame for unrestricted television of football games in 1953 will go unanswered.

Bums Want Spahn or Simmons

Dodgers Propose 3-2 Swap

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The Brooklyn Dodgers have prepared a pair of 3-for-2 package deals involving top-flight pitchers in an effort to obtain either Warren Spahn of the Boston Braves or Curt Simmons of the Philadelphia Phils. It was learned today.

Recognizing the need of a starting southpaw pitcher to go along with the aging Preacher Roe in defense of their National League championship, the Dodgers are quite willing to give up regular players for either of the pitchers, generally recognized as the best left-handers in the circuit.

The Brooks, who sat by quietly yesterday as three of their better minor league farmhands were plucked in the annual major league draft that opened the annual convention, have these package deals to offer:

DEALS
1. Outfielders Carl Furillo, Andy Paiko and third baseman Billy Cox, all regulars, to the Braves for Spahn and outfielder Sid Gordon or

2. First baseman Gil Hodges, Furillo and Cox to the Philles for Simmons and outfielder Del Ennis. Gordon and Ennis are right-handed power hitters. The Brooklyn-born Braves' left-fielder batted only 239 last season but hammered 25 home runs, a goodly number at Ebbets Field, where he was moved into the majors in 1942. He is 34. Ennis rapped 20 homers and drove in 104 runs on a .291 batting mark. He is only 27.

HOPEFUL
The Dodgers were more hopeful of a trade with Boston, the suspicion prevailing that the Braves are in a mood to part with Spahn in order to augment their right-handed hitting strength as well as to fortify the defense in the infield. Should the trade be consummated, Cox would be installed as Boston's regular shortstop.

Spahn is the man the Dodgers covet the most despite his comparatively poor 14-19 won and lost record last season. The 30-year-old southpaw, a victim of weak hitting and mediocre defense behind him, failed to notch 20 or more victories for the first time in four years in 1952. He topped the circuit in strikeouts for the third successive season with 182. Simmons, only 29, posted a 14-8 record including six shutouts and is far from his peak as a big winner.

ACCURATE
Paiko enjoyed a successful season with a .287 batting mark that included 19 home runs and 85 RBIs. He will be 32 in February, a year older than Furillo, whose batting mark dropped to .247. Carl, however, is regarded as one of the best defensive flycatchers in the league and is possessor of the most accurate arm in the majors.

Glowing reports on Don Hoak, a left third baseman brought up from Montreal for next season, make Cox dispensable.

Hodges, Brooklyn's leading slugger the past three years, has been mentioned in every trade rumor involving the Dodgers. The slugging first baseman walloped 33 home runs and ranked fourth with his 102 RBIs but slumped in the final month of the campaign and was handcuffed without a hit in the World Series. His batting mark was .254. As a fielder, he is second to none.

'Sucker Shifts' Pay Off For Notre Dame, Syracuse

NEW YORK (AP)—A pair of the nation's more prominent football teams, Notre Dame and Syracuse, are being accused right and left of sharp practice in using quick, unexpected backfield shifts at crucial moments of their games to draw the opposition offside and thus benefit by a five-yard penalty.

Notre Dame employed the tactic with telling effect in its upsets of Oklahoma and Southern California for each time setting up a score with a first down inside its opponent's

10. Millions of televisioners, among others, saw it work against Oklahoma. Syracuse used its own variation, a sort of quarterback shift, in defeating Fordham in its final game and winning a bid to the Orange Bowl.

Nobody accuses either the Irish or Syracuse of breaking a rule, exactly, but there is a widespread feeling that they gave the spirit of the game a rather thorough going-over, and it is taken for granted that the rules committee will slam the gate on them before

another season comes around. The current rule says, in part: "No player of the offensive team shall make a false start. A false start includes a shift which simulates a play, feigning a charge, or the use of unusual variations in starting signals."

What Notre Dame did, as you might have seen, was shift suddenly from the "T" to its old formation. It drew a valuable out-ofside penalty against both the Sooners and the Trojans, though the ball was not snapped. Coach Jesse Hill of Southern Cal declared that "the play is designed solely to draw the defense offside."

In the Syracuse version, as we have had it explained, the Orange quarterback, after stooping behind his center, rises abruptly and makes a motion with his arm, as though pitching the ball out and back. As one might imagine, this causes several tensed-up linemen to jump as though stung. Coach Ed Danowski of Fordham had this to say about the maneuver:

OFFICIALS
"It's up to the officials to decide whether it's legal or not. I can't do anything about it. But there's no question that it is intended to pull a team offside. It should be barred."

On the other hand, Ben Schwartzwalder, the Syracuse mentor, defended the move vigorously, saying that it was designed solely to put an occasional check on an opposing line which has been anticipating the snap and barreling in too fast. This could, of course, be used as well in defense of the Notre Dame strategem.

WHAT'S WRONG
"What's wrong with out-tricking a team?" Schwartzwalder was quoted as saying. "That's the big idea of the game, isn't it?"

Perhaps we have grown cynical, but it seems here that the whole thing boils down to the fact that a couple of smart coaches read the fine print a little more closely than their fellows.

All the rules committee needs to do in this case, actually, is go back to the old regulation that there can be no offside unless the ball is snapped. Does anyone in the house know why they changed it in the first place?

Reds Slam Americans With Forcing 'Beizbol' On Italy

MOSCOW (AP) — The newspaper Soviet Sport claimed Tuesday Americans are trying to force American baseball — "Beizbol" — on Italy.

The Russian organ said, however, that the Italian people are resisting American efforts to install the national American sport in Italy.

"Thus," said the paper, "Italian people are answering American colonizers who drag thither not only vulgar literature and gangster films, but also their degraded

sports directed at arousing audiences and the wildest instincts in athletes."

Soviet Sport said "American imperialists" are attempting to encourage among Italian youth the growth of rudeness, cruelty and hate for the enemy, striving for personal profit and personal glory. For this reason, said Sport, Americans are forcing "Beizbol" and "Futbol" on Italians.

Sport, which has been attacking "Beizbol" for some time, said the game is famous as being "one of the roughest types of sports most often of all accompanied by human victims."

Sport also claimed the Americans are trying to implant their national game in Spain.

The paper also attacked Pope Pious XII for receiving Italian and Spanish teams and presenting players with medals.

Football Ban Fires Suit

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The refusal of union drivers to operate charter buses to the Gator Bowl during a football game unless they were admitted to the game formed the basis Tuesday for a \$20,000 suit filed by the Jacksonville Coach Co.

The bus company named Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway and Motor Coach Employees, Detroit, and its division 1197, Jacksonville, defendants. The suit is in Federal court.

The complaint says the union forbade its members from operating chartered buses to the Georgia-Florida game here, Oct. 25. The bus company, charging loss of income and good will, said it had no control over admittance to the stadium.

Free Throw Wins for EW

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Forward Bill Ellis' free throw just before the clock ran out in overtime gave Eastern Washington College of Education a 73-71 win over Washington State College in a basketball opener here Monday night.

Ellis put the game into overtime with two free throws which tied the game 66-66 as the regular period ended.

The visiting Savages, after trailing 11-23 at the end of the first period and 33-26 at the half, pulled out in front 51-48 in the third quarter.

WSC went ahead on two free throw conversions with 55 seconds of the final period remaining but they were nullified by Ellis.

Capt. Pete Mullins accounted for 20 of the WSC points, and Ellis and Bill Graham each scored 15 for Eastern Washington.
