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LITTLE ALL-AMERICAN TEAM NAMED

NEW YORK — Meet Jodie Connell, guard for the Jacksonville, Ala., Teachers football team and newly named to a berth on the Associated Press' Little All-America team of 1952.

An accident in a swing when Connell was 10 years old cost him his left arm below the elbow, but the rugged 6-1 athlete from Gadsden, Ala., is ranked on a par with the other gridiron greats of 1952.

Connell was the running guard for the Alabama Teachers in their Notre Dame box attack and his agile 180 pounds made him the team's most effective blocker.

In addition, he did the kicking off, converted some of the touchdowns and was used a time or two as a ball carrier in the venerable guards-around play.

Probably the most amazing Connell effort of the year was his one-handed interception of a pass.

Twenty-two colleges and universities are represented on the Little All-America, a team which gets its name from the size of the schools involved and is in no way a reflection on either the size or ability of the players themselves.

Two of the honored athletes are repeaters from the No. 1 team of a year ago — halfback Ralph Dimicco of Alfred and tackle Chester Lagod of Chattanooga.

Both are seniors and Lagod, a returned veteran, already has been drafted by the New York Giants of the National Football League.

With Dimicco in the offensive backfield is Al Conway of William Jewell, the nation's greatest point-maker; Don Goltlob of Sam Houston State, the country's leading ground gainer; and Steve Tridimas, blasting fullback of the unbeaten Lenoir-Rhyne team which plays in the Cigar Bowl.

Conway went to the little Missouri college after leaving the U. S. Military Academy following the cribbing scandals of 1951. He was a great end prospect under Coach Earl Blaik but his 200-pound ballast was needed in the William Jewell backfield.

The offensive team's line is made up of Joe Kirven, Presbyterian, Anthony Chambers, Massachusetts, at end; Robert Lade, Peru, Neb., Teachers, and Tom Fann, Tennessee Tech, at tackles; Pete Swanson, Whitworth, and Connell at guards and Lou Bolnsack of Iowa State Teachers at center.

Lagod and his tackle mate, Cal Roberts of Gustavus-Adolphus, are the big wheels in the defensive setup that includes two light, but furious, line-backers. They are Robert Weichard of Kings Point, and Ted Levenhagen of the LaCrosse, Wis., Teachers.

The secondary defense is completed by Ron Billings of Pacific Abilene Christian and Neil Garrett of Nevada.

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The Beavers' best showing was in their 17-14 loss to Michigan State, the nation's No. 1 team.

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Brown to Head WIL

PHOENIX, Ariz. — The Class A Western International Baseball League will operate as a 10-team circuit in 1953 with Bob Brown as its first full-time president.

Brown, general manager of the Vancouver, B. C. club, was elevated to league president Tuesday by WIL directors here for the Major-minor leagues meeting.

He succeeds Tacoma attorney Robert Abel who has headed the league since 1937. Abel was named secretary and the league's legal adviser.

Brown, one time Notre Dame halfback who turned to baseball half a century ago, takes over as WIL president as the league expands to a 10-team circuit. Calgary and Edmonton will be added next year, joining Spokane, Vancouver, Victoria, Salem, Lewiston, Wenatchee, Yakima and Tri-City in the loop.

Brown will be succeeded as Vancouver general manager by Desney Soriano, ex-Seattle Rainier pitcher and former front-office man for the Yakima Bears. Soriano's appointment is effective Jan. 1.

Directors postponed action on the Tri-City franchise which is being sold to a fans association.

Strand Frowns At Split

CORVALLIS, Ore. — The President of Oregon State College says he opposes any scheme to divide the Pacific Coast Football Conference into Northern and Southern Divisions.

Writing in the alumni magazine Oregon State, OSC President A. L. Strand said Tuesday, however, he would recommend the Beavers reduce the number of games they play with California teams to not more than two a year.

Describing the Coast Conference as a "tough league," Strand said he does not favor "letting out of it or trying to modify it."

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Towler Top Pro Runner

PHILADELPHIA — Deacon Sam Towler, the running man, from Washington and Jefferson College in Western Pennsylvania, is the top ground gainer in the play-for-day ranks. The husky Negro back of the Los Angeles Rams has gained 783 yards on 130 rushes for an average of 6.1, tops in the National Football League.

Towler took over the ground gaining lead from Eddie Price who suffered last Sunday along with his New York Giant teammates in the 63-7 rout by Pittsburgh. Price now has 737 yards on 178 attempts for a 4.1 average. San Francisco's hustling Hugh McElhenny is third with 645 yards on 87 carries and a 7.4 average.

Towler's Green Bay held on to his passing edge for the second straight week. Rote has an average of 8.66 yards for 120 passes. His total gain through the air is 1,663 yards and 12 touchdowns. Norman Van Brocklin of Los Angeles is second with 1,310 yards gained on 148 passes, a 7.94 average and 11 touchdowns.

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
