Shasta OTI foe Saturday

Oregon Tech's basketball work was cut in half for this weekend with the announcement from Redding that Shasta Junior College had canceled Friday night's game.

The Owls tangled with the Knights just Saturday night on Shasta's court.

Oretech Coach Art Kirkland released yesterday a starting lineup that would include four veterans and one rookie.

Jerry Wyatt and Tom Humphrey will start at forward, Tom Schubert at center, Len Genetin and either Larry Willis or Walter Butler at guard.

FIRST YEAR
Willis, from Cadiz, O., and Butler, a Portland boy from Washington High, are first-year men.

Genetin is the playmaker, the lake-charger guy at the other guard spot.

There could be one change. If John Koch, another letterman, gets the nod at the post position, then Schubert would go to forward to team with Humphrey.

Others who will make the trip for Oregon Tech's cage opener are center Charles Jepsen, Dallas, Texas; Don Graham, Muskogee, Okla.; and Jack Sausser, North Bend; guards Jerry Johnson, with Schubert the only Klamath Falls boys, and Bob Greenwood, West Linn; and Paul Weaver, a Los Angeles prospect who shows talent at any position.

WEBER HERE
The Shasta game will tune the Owls for the invasion Monday and Tuesday nights of Weber JC of Ogden, Utah.

The Owls have a busy 30-game schedule. The Shasta cancellation and one against Everett JC Dec. 31 will be supplanted with a two-game series here Jan. 14 and 15 vs. Seattle Pacific.

The Knights are sparked by three vets—Mickey Hilberg, Charles Hawes and Ken Frags.

Rams Get McFadin

HOLLYWOOD — Bud McFadin, Texas' All-America guard in 1950, is out of the U. S. Air Force and in the fold of the Los Angeles Rams, who picked him as their No. 1 draft choice.

McFadin was discharged Monday at Carswell Air Force Base.

The Knights had the best team game, a 98-6, followed by Sons of Italy with a 95-6. The Sons added games of 83-2 and 90-2 for the best series, a 27-0. The Knights had a 26-0 series.

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3 Coast Records Tumble

LOS ANGELES — Three Pacific Coast Conference individual records fell and one was tied during the 1952 football campaign.

Quarterback Don Heinrich of Washington, who paced the nation's collegiate toppers in pass completions with 137, also topped his old conference mark of 134 set in 1950.

Des Korch, the Southern California punting expert, also eclipsed a record he previously had set. Korch averaged 43.5 yards per kick on 47 punts, one of which was blocked. He set a record of 43.3 last year.

Bill Stius of UCLA ran 235 yards with intercepted passes for the other record and Jim Sears of Southern California averaged 15.9 yards on 30 punt returns for a total of 475 yards which tied the PCC mark set by Jake Leicht of Oregon in 1947.

RETURNS
Jim Paulits of Southern Cal had the most pass interceptions, nine, and Jay Buhler, Idaho, led in kick-off returns with 312 yards, an average of 28.4 per carry.

Final statistics from the PCC commissioner's office showed that in 10 games this year Heinrich threw 270 passes for 14 touchdowns gaining 1,647 yards, and had 17 intercepted.

Heinrich's favorite target, and George Black, caught 42 passes to become the PCC No. 1 receiver.

Black caught four in the final game Saturday against Washington State to nose out Monte Brethauer, who had 41, and Sam Morley, Stanford, 40.

NOT CLOSE
There was no one even close to Heinrich as a thrower. Bob Garrett, Stanford, was second with 60 completions and George Shaw, Oregon, third, 55.

California fullback John Olzewski was the PCC leading rusher, totaling 845 yards and averaging 5.3 yards a game. Stanford's Bob Mathias was next with 653 yards and California's Bill Powell, third, 647 yards.

Heinrich topped total offense honors with 1,652 yards, all but five from passing, followed by Jim Sears, Southern Cal, with 1,033 yards, 343 rushing and 691 passing and Olzewski, third, 845 yards, all rushing.

TOP SCORER
Washington State's end, Ed Barker, was the PCC leading scorer, with 44 points on four touchdowns, 14 conversions and two field goals. Five men scored seven touchdowns for 42 points each: Black, Olzewski, Powell, Sam Baker of Oregon State and Don Johnson of California.

Texas statistics showed California the leader in rushing, 281.4 yards a game, and total offense, 327.1 yards a game. Oregon was the best passing team, with 122 completions for an average of 17.2 yards a game, rushing out Washington which finished with an average of 170.8.

Southern California retained total defense honors, allowing but 177.6 yards a game, and also had the best pass defense, allowing 68.8 yards a game. UCLA had the best rushing defense, 94.1 yards a game.

WEISER STOPS HUFF IN SIXTH

PORTLAND — Freddie Beshore took the decision over fellow-Los Angelean Billy McClure in a 10-round heavyweight bout here Tuesday night.

Beshore weighed in at 195 1/2, some 14 pounds lighter than McClure.

In preliminaries, Ralph Weiser, Klamath Falls, Ore., knocked out Billy Huff, 141 1/2, Spokane, in 36 of the sixth round; Harold Kotter, 172 1/2, Silverton, Ore., dethroned Billy Wallace, 179 1/2, Vancouver, B. C.

Snively Quits NC Grid Job

CHAPEL HILL, N. C. — The University of North Carolina today started looking for a new football coach to replace Carl Snively, and speculation immediately centered on two former Tar Heel players.

Snively resigned last night, effective Jan. 1. The University Athletic Council accepted the resignation and said the veteran mentor would be assigned other duties in the Department of Athletics and Physical Education, possibly teaching.

10 YEARS
The white-haired, 54-year-old Snively had guided the Tar Heels for 10 years, eight of them in succession. His 1946 and 1948 teams went to the Sugar Bowl and his 1949 squad to the Cotton Bowl.

His resignation came after the Tar Heels ended the three most disastrous seasons in their history. They won only seven of 28 games and only two weeks ago ended an 11-game losing streak by beating South Carolina. They won only two of eight games this year.

The athletic council said its coaches committee would recommend a new coach, but gave no indication as to who would be offered the job.

CANDIDATE
Tatum, head coach at Maryland and a great guard under Snively when the latter first coached here in 1931-35, has been mentioned as the top candidate for the job for more than a year. Barclay, an all-time university lineman, was head coach at Washington and Lee until brought here last year to help Snively install the split-T formation.

Other coaches already figuring in speculation are Art Guepe of Virginia, Johnny Vaught of Mississippi, a former assistant here, and Jim Gill, Snively's long-time assistant on the Tar Heel staff.

Coley Wallace Faces Dunlap

DETROIT — Coley Wallace, sometimes dubbed the "Young Joe Louis" of the ring, meets fifth-ranked Bob Dunlap Wednesday night in a nationally televised 10-round fight at Detroit's Olympia Stadium.

Wallace, because of a striking resemblance to Louis at the start of his career, likely will be the sentimental favorite of Detroit fans who saw the Brown Bomber go on to fame from here more than a decade ago.

But because of his national rating, Dunlap would rule the betting favorite.

Redding Here For 2 Games

Coach Paul McCall may open the cage season against Redding Friday night with an all-lettermen starting five.

The Wolves will be here with both junior varsity and varsity teams for a Friday-Saturday set, opening action for both schools.

If McCall settles on his lettermen, he would have Doug Pence and Ed Barron at forward, Jack Horton at center, Cal Gilmore and Ken Young at guard.

NOT FINAL
But the Pelican hoop skipper indicated yesterday that his decision to start his lettermen is far from final.

Any one of a second quintet could move into a starting position. They are Jim Bevans, Don Mills, Guy Munsell, Larry Yarnell and Jim Dougherty.

David D'Olivo, Leg Davis and Dan Lowe are others working with the varsity and these 13 boys may jell as McCall's squad for the 22-game season.

EIGHT KING'S-X
The Pelicans have eight king's-X games before they settle down to league action Jan. 9 and 10 in Ashland.

University High of Eugene is here Dec. 12 and 13. Then the Pels travel to Chico for a Dec. 19-20 set and to Bend for two games Dec. 26 and 27.

The junior varsity clubs of both Klamath Falls and Redding open the shows Friday and Saturday at 6:45 p.m.

Sparkling of the Redding team is Ron Friebe.

Dressen Rehired; Black Signs

PHOENIX, Ariz. — Tip of Hank Greenberg, general manager of the Cleveland Indians.

Wanna beat the Yankees for the pennant next year? Let Casey Stengel, the guy who stopped you four years in a row, tell you how.

"Nothing to it," says the easy skipper — New York's world champions, "If you want to beat us, just make a trade with us. No fooling. Look at all the good players we gave away to other clubs in trades in recent years—Bob Porterfield, Jackie Jensen, Frank Shea, Tommy Byrne, Duane Pillette.

"That Greenberg pops off how he hates the Yankees and wants his players to do likewise. Does he think his Indians can win the pennant by hating us? No sir.

"Know how Cleveland can win the pennant? By getting some of our players. That's how simple it is. If you can't lick 'em, get 'em on your side."

While Stengel was having some fun at the expense of his friendly rival from the Ohio city, Chuck Dressen, whose Brooklyn Dodgers bowed to Stengel's Yankees in the recent World Series, was accepting congratulations on having been rehired for another season as manager of the Brooks for a salary ranging from \$35,000 to \$40,000.

HEAVY AGENDA
The Dressen signing along with the announcement that Joe Black, who all but pitched the Dodgers to the championship and won Rookie of the Year honors, also had signed his contract for 1953 came as the baseball convention wound up its three-day player draft and prepared to delve into one of the heaviest legislative agendas in many years.

Dressen, obviously delighted over his new pact, immediately announced the Dodgers were slated to meet with the Braves "in a day or two" in an effort to transact a deal. The little leader did not identify the players he intended to dangle in front of the eyes of Braves' officials but made no bones about the fact he was anxious to land Warren Spahn, Boston's star southpaw.

SMILES
Asked whether he would be willing to give first baseman Gil Hedges and outfielder Carl Furillo for Spahn, Dressen smiled and said:

"All I can say is I'd be willing to break up my infield and outfield to get a good starting pitcher, preferably a left-hander."

Dressen said he planned to use Black as a starter and reliever next season and expressed hope that such newcomers as Jim Hughes, Bob Milliken and Ronnie Lee would fortify the pitching staff.



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
