5,597 Duck Stamps Sold

Truman, Stevenson To Plan Strategy for '56 Election

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman, Adlai Stevenson and other Democratic party leaders meet in the privacy of the White House today to dig for a way out of a landslide political defeat.

Nobody was talking in advance of their conference, although Truman may have some news when he receives reporters afterward.

But there seemed no doubt that No. 1 on the agenda was this question: How can the Democrats, voted out of office last Nov. 4 for their first presidential defeat since 1928, regain their winning ways?

The No. 2 question appeared to be: Who will play what roles in the comeback try?

A crowd of some 200, mostly women and children, met Stevenson at Washington's National Airport last night and shouted and waved one reply to that last question.

Some chanted "We want Adlai!" and others "Stevenson in '56." There were banners that read "Retrieve with Steve."

The Illinois governor and defeated Democratic presidential nominee was noncommittal. He told the welcoming group, "I have only this to say aside from my gratitude—I'm not coming back for four years."

Inquiring reporters, Stevenson said, "I came at the invitation of President Truman. I suppose we're going to discuss the Democratic party and have a little farewell dinner."

There was no elaboration. It was not clear what Stevenson meant by "not coming back for four years."

The "farewell dinner" was a reference to tonight's final dinner gathering of President and Mrs. Truman, Stevenson, Cabinet officers and "some former members" of the Cabinet.

Stevenson dined at the White House with President and Mrs. Truman last night. He arrived at about 6:30 p.m. after flying from Atlantic City, N. J., where he attended memorial services for the late CIO President Philip Murray.

The Truman-Stevenson get-together is their first since the gov-

ernor got a White House briefing on the diplomatic and military situation shortly after his nomination last July.

The listing for the regular White House staff conference today includes, besides Stevenson, the names of Democratic National Chairman Stephen Mitchell, Deputy Chairman C. L. Clayton Fritchey and Party Treasurer Dwight Palmer. The inclusion of Palmer suggests the Democrats' campaign financing is up for consideration.

When the conferees end their post-mortem and begin fitting personalities into plans, the future roles of Truman and Stevenson will come to the fore.

They must decide whether Truman, who as president has been party chief, will continue to bear the standard, step to the sidelines as an elder statesman or go into political retirement.

After two nights and a full day at the White House, Stevenson flies back to Illinois tomorrow morning.

Court Mulls News Sources

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — Judge Seymour H. Lyne said he would rule today on whether Alabama law protects a reporter from having to answer questions about his news sources asked in a four-million dollar federal libel suit.

Hugh Sparrow, writer for the Birmingham News, yesterday declined to answer questions asked at a pre-trial hearing about the sources of his information on Alabama prison conditions.

He cited a 1935 Alabama statute which grants immunity to reporters from revealing such sources.

He was called as a witness in an action brought by former Gov. James E. Folsom and three of his administration aides against the magazines Front Page Detective and Readers Digest.

A 1959 article and reprint entitled, "Devil's Island U. S. A.," caused the suit. Sparrow's investigation of prison conditions under the Folsom administration was discussed in the magazines.

Sparrow declined to answer questions about his sources asked by attorneys for Folsom, former Prison Director Frank Boswell, Boswell and former Pardons and Parole Board members Glenn Vinson and Bill Drinkard.

Each of the four asked \$500,000 from each magazine in a suit filed in U. S. District Court for the Southern District of New York.

More Testimony Due In Obscene Magazine Probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Spokesmen for federal law enforcement agencies today tell House probes of indecent literature what laws they believe are needed to keep obscene and gruesome magazines off the newsstands.

Charmen Gathings (D-Ark) called for the information to aid the special House committee in deciding what Congress might do to stop the flow of off-color reading matter.

The group yesterday heard a spokesman for magazine publishers urge against the passage of laws that might interfere with freedom of the press.

Arch Crawford, president of an association of periodical publishers, counseled the committee to guard against "vagueness and uncertainty in legislation."

Crawford also expressed opposition to censorship of any form. Instead, he advocated reliance on present laws against obscenity which he said are easily enforced by local governments.
