Kline Says No Tariff Change

SEATTLE (U-P) — The president of the American Farm Bureau said Thursday he does not believe the change in national administration is likely to result in a new era of higher tariffs.

"Certainly President-elect Eisenhower is international in his thinking," Allan B. Kline said in an interview. "His experiences in Europe must have convinced him of the success of the American strategy in Europe depends in large part on the free interchange of goods between ourselves and the nations we are rehabilitating."

Kline said the switch from a Democratic to a Republican administration gives "an opportunity to reexamine and redraft American farm policy which we wouldn't have if the old administration had carried on."

Kline and other Farm Bureau leaders are here as the advance guard of some 5,000 farmer representatives scheduled to attend the bureau's 34th annual convention starting Sunday.
