7 Teams In Pro Running

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Football League heads into its 11th — and next-to-last — week of action Sunday with seven teams still having a chance for the championship.

It's been many, many seasons since so many teams have been in contention at such a late date. And don't be too surprised if one or even both — conference races end in deadlocks.

Cleveland is the only team to hold a clear margin. Sporting a 7-3 record, the Browns hold a one-game lead over New York and Philadelphia each (6-4) in the American Conference.

SEEK TIE

In Sunday's games, Cleveland journeys to Chicago for a game with the Cardinals. A win for the Browns will insure them of at least a tie for the conference crown.

New York and Philadelphia, both needing a victory to stay in the running, meet teams with poor records but with the potential of springing an upset. The Giants, routed last week by Pittsburgh, entertain Washington, while Philadelphia plays host to Dallas.

In the National Conference, meanwhile, Detroit and Los Angeles are locked for the lead with 7-3 records, and will be trying to break the tie.

SLOW START

The Rams, after a slow start, have won their last six games — all by convincing margins — and will be favored to make Green Bay their seventh consecutive victory.

Detroit, gunning for its first NFL title since 1935, will be host to the Chicago Bears — a team which upset them by one point two weeks ago.

In the other game, the red-hot Pittsburgh Steelers visit San Francisco — and the 49ers had better be on guard. The Smoky City team's starry last week in whipping the Giants by the unbelievable score of 63-7.

Jones Beats Bratton

NEW YORK (AP) — Almost a year ago Ralph (Tiger) Jones worked as a sparring partner for Johnny Bratton. He learned his lessons well.

Friday night he scored an upset victory over the former NBA welterweight king and was in line for some good pay days.

Bratton couldn't hold the Tiger. The 4 to 1 and more underdog seemed the pace on the evening Chicago and romped off with an impressive, unanimous 10-round decision in a bristling punch-fest in Madison Square Garden.

It was a bonanza for Jones and a disaster for Bratton. Matchmaker Billy Brown of the International Boxing Club wants the aggressive, 24-year-old Yonkers, N. Y., Negro laid in action soon and also for a return bout with Bratton in January.

The defeat snapped Bratton's four-fight win streak and ruined a possible rich bout with Carl (Boo) Olson, the top-ranking middleweight contender from Hawaii. That match had been in the works.

Harrison Holds Havana Lead

HAVANA (AP) — Dutch Harrison, professional golfer now playing out of Ardmore, Okla., carried a five-stroke lead into the final 18 holes of the Havana Invitation Golf Tournament Saturday.

Harrison, with a 54-hole total of 201, leads three rivals who have posted 206's. They are Fred Haas of New Orleans, Doug Ford, Harrison, N. Y., and Al Bessellink, Groesinger, N. Y.

At the \$1500 first money, Harrison was four under par Friday with a 66. He had a 68 on the first day, and a 65 Thursday.

Northern Division Split

Washington's hustling Huskies and Oregon's dangerous Ducks upheld the prestige of the Northern Division Friday night as four invading basketball teams gained an even split in a select pre-season bill of fare.

The Huskies lived up to their advance billing with a lopsided, 82-51, win over the Utah Redskins at Seattle, while the Ducks were never headed after the first five minutes in defeating the Stanford Indians at Eugene, 73-68.

Two other Northern clubs of the Pacific Coast Conference came close — but not close enough.

The Oregon State Beavers made a light of it all the way at Corvallis, but went down, 73-63, before the driving attack of the defending conference champions from UCLA.

At Pullman, the Washington State Cougars were defeated by the Montana Grizzlies, 78-71, in a free-scoring contest.

As expected, Big Bob Houbregs, the 6 foot 7 inch sharpshooting center, was the sparkplug of the Washington assault on the Redskins. He stuffed in 20 points in 15 minutes of the first half and added eight more in 13 minutes of additional action to give him a point-a-minute average before he was benched to let reserves take over.

The Huskies pulled away during the first quarter and were ahead at the half, 44-27. They hit 33 of 73 shots for a .452 percentage while the Utahs, led by Bruce Goodrich with 15 points, collected only 19 of 63 for .302.

Chet Noe, Oregon center, and Ron Tomasic, Stanford guard shared scoring honors at Eugene with 22 points apiece.

The Ducks led 44-28 at the half and 60-50 at the end of the third period, but were forced to step up their pace in the final period after Stanford had closed the gap at 64-62 and 66-64. The Indians' drive fizzled at that point.

Big Tony Vlastelica, who went scoreless in his first game for the OSC Beavers, found the range against the Cougars and was the standout performer with 22 points. The transfer from Grays Harbor Junior College got most of his total with effective hook shots from the key.

The Beavers were ahead at the end of the first quarter, 19-17. The Bruins gained a one-point 37-36 edge at the half as Ron Bane netted a free throw at the gun. UCLA started off with a rush in the third quarter and remained comfortably in front the rest of the way. Dick Ridgway topped the winners with 17.

The Montana-WSC game turned into a scoring contest between Cougar Capt. Pete Mullins and Grizzly Co-Capt. Chuck Davis.

Davis won individual honors with 11 field goals and six free throws for 26 points. Mullins was close behind with 26. The Montanans led 36-35 at the half and were only one point ahead going into the fourth quarter.

O'BRIEN 'HELD' TO 18 AS CHIEFS WIN

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle University's Chiefs won their second game of the basketball season Friday night with a 75-62 triumph over Pacific Lutheran, but the Lutes claimed "moral victory" in holding "Super Chief" Johnny O'Brien to 18 points.

The Evergreen Conference club from Tacoma jammed up the key so tightly that Johnny-O was forced to shoot from the outside.

He hit six of 16 attempts and collected six free throws.

In two games, O'Brien has collected 46 points in his quest for the all-time national collegiate scoring record. He was the nation's top scorer last season and became the first player to crack the 1,000-mark in a single campaign.

The Chiefsians led 38-28 at the half. Glen Huffman was the Lutes' top point-maker with 10.

Robinson's Title Hangs Fire

Sugar Says He'll Fight Randy Turpin

NEW YORK (AP) — Middleweight Champion Ray Robinson says he wants to fight Randy Turpin for the third time this June. If Sugar Ray signs for the rubber match real quick, most everyone will be happy, including the New York State Athletic Commission.

The only unhappy souls will be either British promoter Jack Solomons, or Jim Norris, the president of the International Boxing Club. Both want the lucrative fight, Solomons for London or Dublin, Norris for New York.

Norris says he has Robinson under contract. Solomons has the papers with Turpin. There's going to be plenty of complications and confusion before the match is made.

Although George Gairford, Robinson's manager, said the fight will be held under Solomons' promotion overseas, and Solomons agreed whole-heartedly, the IBC raised an objection.

"We have a contract with Robinson," said Harry Markson, managing director of the IBC. "We can better any proposition Solomons makes. The last fight between Robinson and Turpin here did \$76,000, and I'm sure we can approximate that sum even indoors. I think Robinson will prefer to fight for Jim Norris."

As far as the state commission is concerned, it demands a "binding agreement" before it will restore Robinson's title recognition in the Empire State. The commission started all the fuss over Sugar Ray's future when it vacated Robinson's title in New York at 12:01 a.m. Friday morning.

STRIPPED

The commission stripped Ray of his crown in his home state because he hadn't signed for a title defense within the required six-month period plus an extension granted him. New York's action wasn't followed by the National Boxing Association which includes all states but New York.

Robinson's defense against Turpin in London next June "is good enough for the National Boxing Association," said George Barton, president of the NBA.

PROOF

Barton, in Minneapolis, added however, that the NBA will expect proof from Gairford that Robinson-Turpin fight is something definite.

That was the point Bob Christensen stressed. The New York boxing commission head said he wanted "concrete evidence" that Robinson was going to fight Turpin.

Gairford told Christensen by telephone from Boston, where Robinson is appearing in a night club, that "the deal for a fight with Turpin has been closed except for time and place."

However, the manager wired the NBA that Robinson would defend against Turpin on "coronation eve" in London. That would be June 1.

AGREED

But in London, Solomons said he has received a cable from Gairford which read: "This confirms our conversation—Robinson to defend his title against Turpin on date agreed."

Solomons said the date would be June 1, 1953.

Robinson and Turpin are all square in their two fights. Turpin accomplished one of boxing's greatest upsets when he won the crown by decision from Robinson in London, July 10, 1951. Exactly 31 days later Robinson regained the crown by knocking out Randy in the 10th round in New York.

Saigh Scores Video Victory With Cubs

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Fighting Fred Saigh, baseball's batting bantam, finally has broken through in his long bitter fight for a share of television receipts from other ball parks.

The wily president of the St. Louis Cardinals, unwavering in his demand that the visiting club be cut into all TV profits, got a "foot in the door" yesterday when he reached an agreement with the Chicago Cubs whereby St. Louis will share in the television money for each game they play at Chicago's Wrigley Field.

AGREEMENT

The Cubs also came to a reciprocal agreement with the Cincinnati Reds in which the Reds and Cubs will receive a visitor's share of the receipts in their respective parks. No other reciprocal agreements were concluded but President Cobe, Paul of the Reds was confident he will reach an agreement with all clubs "because I'm not being militant." Saigh was not hopeful of such an agreement with the other clubs, especially with the New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers.

The television problem did not occupy the entire National League meeting. The bonus and high school rule was passed and a night game schedule permitting the home club five nocturnal games without the visiting club's permission was voted on. A new waiver rule forbidding the sale of a player to another club or to another league above the waiver price after June 15 also was passed. The original amendment, submitted by the Executive Council, set the date at July 15.

VOTED DOWN

The American set an unlimited number of night games without permission from the visiting team. It also voted down a proposal by Hank Greenberg of Cleveland to create a suspended game situation because of rain, curfew, etc. It discussed the bonus rule and high school rule but issued no statement. The two leagues were to convene again today and wind up the convention with a joint session under Commissioner Ford Frick tomorrow.

In agreeing to give the Cardinals and Reds a TV cut, President Phil Wrigley of the Cubs stated flatly he would not become a party to any solid front in opposing Saigh's aims.

"We are conducting our own business," he said. "We've been doing just that right along even as to continuing to play day baseball at home."

"I believe the business of playing television is fair. That is why I made the agreements with St. Louis and Cincinnati. I will make the same Cincinnati agreements with any other club that so desires."

MUM

Neither party would disclose the exact percentage of Chicago's television money that will be given to the Cardinals and Reds, but it was learned that they will get 30 percent after all expenses are deducted. The Cubs, according to Business Editor James Gallagher, received only \$75,000 for their TV rights as compared to about \$400,000 received by the Giants and Dodgers. That comes to exactly \$974 per game. On a 30 per cent cut, the Cardinals and Reds' total take, based on the same game each plays at Wrigley Field, will come to only \$3,214.

"Actually it is not the matter of making a lot of money," Saigh said, "but at least we have a foot in the door. What we are trying to do is to establish a precedent while television is still a baby. It is a form of establishing an equalization of power, helping the smaller clubs and offsetting the loss in local receipts caused by television."

SMALL CUT

Saigh said he agreed to the "small" percentage TV cut from Chicago "because the Cubs receive very little from their TV rights."

"It is not so much the money but it is the equity I am asking for," he said. "If a club does not make much money on its TV, then I don't think the visiting clubs should get much. But where a lot of money is involved, they should get a proportionate share."

Saigh did not say but it was reported he intended to ask for 50 per cent of the TV receipts (after expenses) for Cardinal games in New York and Brooklyn and a smaller fee in Boston, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and Cincinnati.

Saigh, who operates in a one-channel town and therefore does not televise more than three or four home games due to difficulty in obtaining television time, has given notice to all National League clubs that he will not consent to the televising of games in which the Cardinals are involved unless his team is cut in.

"We provide half the entertainment," he said, "therefore we should receive half the money."

No team other than the Cubs has yet to ask Saigh for permission to televise its home games with the Cardinals. The Giants, Dodgers and Braves already have stated they do not intend to share their TV receipts with any other club. Unless an agreement is reached, no Cardinal games will be seen on New York, Brooklyn and Boston screens next season.
