

Sarah O'Keeffe Nuptial Mass in St. Augustine's

TULELAKE - In one of the loveliest weddings of the fall, Sarah Veronica O'Keeffe, Tulelake, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan O'Keeffe, became the bride of Patrick Joseph Kenneally, Fort Klamath.

Three hundred guests were present.

The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Kenneally, New Market, County Cork, Ireland.

The double ring nuptial mass was read at 10 a.m. in St. Augustine's Church, Merrill, by Father Cornelius O'Connor, pastor of Holy Cross Church, Tulelake.

Preceding the ceremony, Mrs. Dave Bridger, Klamath Falls, sang "Ave Maria" and "Pans Angelicus" with Mrs. Ellis Wilson, Merrill, at the organ for accompaniments and the wedding marches.

The church was beautifully decorated with masses of bronze and yellow chrysanthemums, woodwardia fern and many lighted tapers in candelabra. Pews were tied with bronze ribbons and yellow mums.

The lovely bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a full-skirted white satin frock with long train. Wide inserted panels of Cluny lace fell from waist to hemline and formed a deep bertha on the bodice. A sheer yoke, tiny stand-up collar and long sleeves pointed at the wrist enhanced the frock.
