Troy's Play Stirs Beef

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Two big unsolved questions of the Pacific Coast Conference winter meeting are: Will the coaches at the session see movies of the 1952 SC-Stanford football game? And if so, why?

Stanford graduate manager Al Masters admitted Monday night that he brought along movies of the one-sided contest—the Trojans won last month 54-7—to be shown at the coaches' meeting. However, the screen treat is not on the agenda.

Declining to elaborate, Masters would say only that the proposed showing would be "to see if there were any violations."

It was rumored around that Stanford is unhappy about Troy's aggressive play on that occasion. USC Coach Jess Hill commented, "As far as I'm concerned we played nothing but clean, aggressive football. Until something comes up officially or on the agenda, I just don't have anything to say."

As for Stanford Coach Chuck Taylor, he denied a published report that he accused USC of over-rough tactics. But he did say there might be some question about the officiating.

Tech Whips Weber On Late Rally, 75-67

Tom Schubert, all-Oregon prep star from Klamath Union High School a couple of seasons back, got his swing shot working in the second half last night to pace Oregon Tech in a furious late rally that gave the Owls a 75-67 victory over an invading Weber College team from Ogden, Utah. Schubert ended with 28 points.
The same teams tangle again tonight. Tip-off time is 8 o'clock.

It was the cage opener for the Owls. Although showing opening-night raggedness at times, for the most part the Kirklandmen were sharp for a debut showing.
Trailing 56-60, Schubert found the range on two swing shots to tie the score. Fouled on his second shot, Schubert dunked the free throw to put the Owls ahead for good, 61-60.
The first half was touch-and-go.

With the lead changing hands three times and the score deadlocking four times.

OPENS SCORING
Schubert opened the scoring with a shot from sidocourt but Bob Nish, Weber's elongated center, tied it at 2-all with a tip-in. But after Tom Humphrey scored on a gift pass and Jerry Wyatt found the range from the side, the Owls stayed a jump ahead for awhile until Darrell Saunders pumped in a free throw and Larry Peterson swished a jump shot to give Weber the lead. The Wildcats stayed a squeak ahead but Wyatt, on a jump shot, tied the score at the quarter, 17-all.

Weber's second team put the Wildcats ahead again in the second frame but Wyatt gave the Owls a 22-20 lead after Len Genetin tied it up with a free throw.
Paul Furlong, then Wright, hit for two-pointers to give the Wildcats a lead they enjoyed for more than two quarters as the Ogden line pumped up its lead to 34-29 at intermission time.

WYATT HAS IT
Wyatt was right behind Schubert in scoring with 21 although 11 came on free throws.
Genetin added 16 to give three Owls more than Weber's top man, Ron Lowery, with 13. Doug Champion shipped in with 12 and Peterson had 11.
Weber had control of the boards most of the first half. But Johnny Henslee broke up Ogden's bump-and-run monopoly in the second half for Oregon Tech.
Each team dunked 25 field goals but the Owls threw in the same number of free throws while Weber sank just 17 from the charity stripe.

But Weber was whittled down 29 times while the Owls drew just 18 fouls. Two Weber players—Von Larsen and Saunders—fouled out while Oregon Tech's Walt Butler drew his quota of fouls for Oregon Tech.
Schubert, held to seven points in the first half, broke loose for 19 after the rest period. Wyatt carried the load in the first half, potting 14 of his 21.

Lindskog Benched By PCC

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Pacific Coast Conference faculty representatives considered the eligibility appeals of nine college athletes Monday and ruled that six — including Edward Zarosinski of Oregon State College — may compete one more season.
The faculty fathers pointed to the sidelines, however, in the cases of Vern Lindskog, captain-elect of the 1953 University of Washington football team, and two Washington State College boxers.

Reviewing Zarosinski's case, the PCC officials found he fractured a collar bone in September before the football season started. He was in the Michigan State game less than a minute before he was reinjured. Zarosinski was ruled eligible for another season.
The ruling in Lindskog's case was based on the fact he played 43 seconds against Kansas State in 1950. In his appeal, the Husky center said he did not plan to play that year but suited up and made his brief appearance in the one game. Appeal denied, the PCC said.

The appeals of WSC boxers Royce Gish and Gordon Gladson also were denied on grounds they boxed in public exhibitions after they were 16 years old, violating a PCC rule.
The faculty heads granted another year of eligibility to Phillip Matson, WSC track athlete, although he missed classes this fall. Matson, a major in forestry, said all his courses do not come up until the spring semester.

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Little Maureen Connolly of San Diego, Calif., who seems to win a championship every time she picks up her tennis racket, added another title to her growing list Tuesday when she teamed with Julie Sampson to win the women's doubles crown in the Victorian tournament.
The California teenagers combined to trim the top-seeded Australian pair of Mary Hawton and Beryl Penrose, 6-2, 6-4, in the final.
The Aussies, however, won one title when their crack doubles team of Frank Sedgman and Ken McGregor whipped Ken Rosewall and Lewis Hoad, 6-4, 10-8, 3-6, 6-3, in an All-Australian final of the men's doubles.

Miami Golf Field Bulky

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A bulky field of 183 pros and amateurs competed Tuesday for 64 berths in the \$10,000 Miami Open golf tournament to be played Thursday through Sunday.
Eighty-six top pros and amateurs were exempt from qualifying over the lengthened and toughened Miami Springs Golf Club course which measures 7,010 yards with par 35-36-71.
The 72-hole affair is wide open this time with no standout favorite, principally because Sam Snead, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., is a buster. Snead, who won this tournament five times and is defending champion, is in Hollywood to make a motion picture.

Baugh Plans To Quit

WASHINGTON (AP) — On Sept. 16, 1931, a gangling Texan wearing No. 33 trotted out on the field at Griffith Stadium—and 24,943 fans had their first look at their new pro football team and Sammy Baugh.

As he has for 16 years, Baugh will trot out on the field again Sunday when the Washington Redskins play the Philadelphia Eagles. But this time it will be different.
Baugh announced Monday this will be his last year as a player.
The indestructible Baugh, quitting at last, holds almost every passing record in the books.
Long ago he reached the point where he couldn't touch a football without setting a new record. Even his errors became statistical history.

For along with throwing more passes, completing more passes and scoring with more passes than any other player in pro history, Baugh also is ahead on the other side of the record: He's had more passes intercepted than any one else.
