WASHINGTON (AP)—Administration officials attempted to pump new life today into the floundering Wage Stabilization Board, pledging that wage curbs will be kept with or without a board.

Mobilization Director Henry Fowler and Economic Stabilizer Roger L. Putnam said last night they were hopeful of persuading a new set of industry members to take seats on the WSB with public and labor members.

The industry members quit as a group last week end, thereby preventing the WSB from operating.

## Bus Driver Has Innings

CHICAGO (AP)—W. E. Jackson, 30, a Chicago Transit Authority streetcar motorman for four months, got his long awaited chance to drive a CTA bus Monday.

His tour of duty as a bus pilot was hectic, speedy and brief. He was in the loop at the height of the evening rush. Traffic was snarled. Package-laden Christmas shoppers jam-packed his Archer Avenue bus and he slammed the doors and took off for the 10-mile express trip to the southeast side.

He didn't make a single stop to take on or let off a passenger. He drove his howling passengers all the way to the bus barn at Rockwell Street, jumped from the bus and walked into the superintendent's office.

"I'm through," Jackson said as he threw his identification badge onto a desk. "I spent 10 years in the Army but I can't take this."

A relief driver was summoned to take some 50 distraught passengers to their proper destination.

A CTA spokesman said Jackson had quit.

"He can't do that," the spokesman said. "We'll fire him."

## DEPA Studies Power Cuts

PORTLAND (AP)—Members of the Defense Electric Power Administration's Advisory Committee conferred here Tuesday on the possibility of additional cutbacks in use of Pacific Northwest power.

Recent rains were not general or heavy enough to relieve the acute shortage, committee chairman J. Frank Ward reported after a meeting at Tacoma Monday.

Northwest public and private power officials discussed the shortage—and means of relieving it—in a conference telephone call with DEPA committee members at the meeting.

Ward said consideration of the possibility of further mandatory curtailments was put over until the Portland conference.

A 10 per cent power cut went into effect Nov. 10 for large power users.

## Inauguration To Be Nationwide

WASHINGTON (AP)—The three-day party celebrating President-elect Eisenhower's inauguration "will be a national party," says dancer George Murphy, who will direct the entertainment.

Murphy, appointed yesterday, said most of the Jan. 19-20 proceedings will be carried by radio and television. Some programs, he said, may be sold to sponsors to cut expenses which the Inaugural Committee estimates may hit one million dollars.

Murphy said highlights will include a concert by the National Symphony Orchestra Jan. 18, a "real variety show, not a vaudeville show" Jan. 19 and an invitation-only ball after the inauguration Jan. 20.

## Sailor Admits Torture Killing

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The Marine Corps Air Base reported Tuesday a sailor had confessed to the torture slaying of a woman, still unidentified, whose nude body was found Sunday at a lonely spot north of Miami.

The provost marshal's office listed the sailor as Wilbur J. White, 20, of Coupeville, Wash.

White was arrested Nov. 7 on a charge of hitting a Miami Beach woman with a brick. He was at liberty on \$3,000 bond in that case.

The man's story, as told to Lt. Tom Robbins and made public by the provost marshal's office, was as follows:

White met the woman at 11 a.m. Saturday in the Circle Bar in Miami. She was intoxicated, and they left the bar together.

White took an automobile parked in front of the bar and with the woman drove to the lonely spot near a rock pit where her body was found later.

There, they had sexual relations. The woman wanted to walk around, and to prevent her from doing so, he tied her hands behind her back, strangled her and stuffed her belt in her mouth.
