Crew Reports On C-124 Crash

ELMENDORF AIR FORCE BASE, Alaska — Members of a glacier-trail party, back from a hazardous trip up snow-covered Mt. Gannet, said Wednesday a C-124 Globemaster carrying servicemen to Alaska struck the mountain at full speed and the resulting explosion "left no trace of anything."

Fifty-two persons flying north from McChord Air Force Base, Wash., were killed when the plane crashed against the mountain 60 miles west of here Nov. 23.

The Air Force trail party said they found no bodies. The only identifiable portions of the C-124 were a charred rudder and horizontal stabilizer.

Three Air Force helicopters returned the six-member trail party here Tuesday from a base camp set up on Surprise Glacier at the 5700-foot level.

The veteran mountain climbers told of spending seven days and nights battling blizzards and sub-zero weather making their way to the crash scene about 8,300 feet up and back to the camp.

Capt. William D. Hackett, Portland, was the leader of the group. With him were Lt. Curtis Proctor, of the Alaskan Air Command; Capt. Alan Skir, veteran paratrooper of the 10th Rescue Group (home towns unavailable); Capt. Fred L. McGuire, Everett, Wash.; Lt. Luther Dean, 10th Rescue Group (home town not given); and AIC George Bell, radio operator from Fresno, Calif. They were landed on the mountain Dec. 3.

Hackett, Proctor, Skir and McGuire reached the wreckage four days later, after battling winds up to 70 miles an hour in subzero cold.

Basin Scouts Plan For Trip

The Third Annual Jamboree of the Boy Scouts of America may see some 114 young Scouts and nine adult leaders from the Modoc Area Council on the trek.

Registrations for the affair are being accepted by troop leaders slated for Santa Ana's Irvine Ranch, in Southern California, for July 17-23. Scout Executive Harold Shearer announced the jamboree here yesterday.

To be eligible for the trek, Shearer said the Scouts must be at least 12 years of age, and be rated at least a second class Scout, or Apprentice Explorer on or before Jan. 1, 1953.

Nine adult troop leaders are expected to attend.

About 50,000 Scouts from throughout the United States are expected to attend the Jamboree this year, Shearer said. The initial fee is \$10 per Scout, and total cost will run about \$175 per Scout — including meals, transportation to and from, and Jamboree fee.

The trip from here is to last two weeks, and is to include a sight-seeing tour through San Francisco, another through San Diego, and a trip into Mexico—all before the Jamboree begins.

State Wants Eugene Road

EUGENE — A \$19 million program of highway and street construction to remedy congested traffic in the Eugene-Springfield metropolitan area is recommended by the Oregon State Highway Department.

A traffic and route study report released this week calls for a series of 36 projects, 21 of them considered "immediately necessary in the area, that which occurs between Eugene and Springfield."

The project would cost an estimated \$1,624,000 for a divided four-lane highway.

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Revised Bible Said Unholy

DENVER — An approving crowd of 1,200 Tuesday night heard the new revised standard version of the Bible denounced as the work of "Satan and his agents."

Rev. Carl McIntire, of Collingswood, N. J., said the new Bible is "an unholy book" produced by "Liberals and Modernists" who "do not believe in the deity of Christ."

"I tell you beloved," McIntire

said. "Carl McIntire believes the Christian church in this new Bible faces one of the greatest crises it has ever faced."

Thirty-four times during the speech, the crowd chanted "amen." And the people shouted "no" repeatedly when McIntire asked if they could accept the new Bible.

He assailed the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U. S. A., which sponsored the revision, and said the "radical, pro-Communist ideas in these very churches are at the bottom" of the Bible project.

McIntire is president of the International Council of Christian Churches, which sponsored the rally.

Both organizations, composed mostly of smaller, young denominations, have strongly opposed the National Council, embracing more than two-thirds of American Protestants.

At the rally, a huge, red-and-black banner, proclaiming "crucifixion for an uncorrupted Bible," draped the front of the South Denver High School auditorium.

Many carried signs bearing slogans condemning the new Bible. McIntire said the Bible was "Satan's most vicious, biggest sales promotion job ever put over on the American people," and announced a series of rallies would be held across the country Jan. 20 to protest it.

Girdles For Men, Predicts Medico

LOS ANGELES — Men, too, are going to be doing the Charleston getting into their girdles, says Dr. Burgess Gordon, president of the Women's Medical College, Philadelphia.

Men need girdles and will feel better and be better able to remain in the race with women in politics, industry and medicine, Dr. Gordon told interviewers yesterday.

Some of women's success is due to their girdles, he said, because they get support that elevates the abdomen and facilitates the movement of air in and out of the lungs, thus contributing to the entrance of oxygen into the tissues.

Israel Has New President

JERUSALEM — Itzhak Ben-Zvi, who spent a lifetime working for the establishment of Israel as a national home for the Jews, took the oath of office today as the second president of his youthful state in a solemn Parliament ceremony.

The 65-year-old leader of the Israeli Labor Party was elected by the Knesset (parliament) on Monday to a five-year term succeeding the late Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

Ham Operators Aid In Storm

Klamath County's civil defense radio communication corps played an important part in getting Southern Pacific rolling stock moving during the "big storm" last week-end.

The SP called for help when communications between Grass Lake and points south cut out during the storm. The CD radio group took two mobile units to Grass Lake and set them up. Seven freight trains were stranded there at the time.

Since trains don't roll without orders, the ham radio operators filled in, sent and received messages and passed along the orders that got the trains on the road.

Meanwhile, local ham operators maintained contact with San Francisco and other points during the storm. Director George Conner of the CD radio division pointed out the entire operation here was maintained with emergency power even while all power in the area was out.

Leave extensions and requests by service men were passed along via the ham radio and an emergency network.

US Navy PIO Dies in Italy

NAPLES, Italy — Capt. Charles G. Duffy, 33, prominent newspaperman and U. S. Navy public information officer, died of a heart attack Wednesday.

The gruff, graying captain, who was in the first U. S. landing party in France in 1917, was chief of the public information division, Allied Headquarters, Southern Europe.

"Thousands of persons have lost a joyful and wonderful friend," said Adm. Robert B. Carney, Allied commander-in-chief, Southern Europe.

Duffy was stricken just after midnight, rushed to the local U. S. Navy hospital and there received the last rites of the Roman Catholic Church.

A native of Boston, Duffy began his journalistic career there with the Associated Press in 1911.

He remained with the AP until 1917 when he joined the Navy. He was a member of the Navy's 2d aeronautical detachment in France.
