### OSI Cracks Espionage Case

**TOKYO (AP)—**An Air Force lieutenant who played along brought about the arrest of two sergeants on charges of trying to sell U. S. Sabre jet secrets.

Details of the investigation and the September arrests of the two, S. Sgt. Giuseppe Cascio, 34, and S. Sgt. John P. Jones, 22, were disclosed today for the first time in records made available to The Associated Press by reliable sources who cannot be named.

They disclosed: Lt. William L. Murphy of Upper Darby, Pa., pretended to plot with the sergeants while tape recordings were made. The sergeants were arrested before they made contact with a Communist agent and the secret information was saved.

Cascio is under mental observation in Tokyo, pending a decision whether he will be tried by a court-martial. The maximum penalty is life imprisonment if convicted.

Jones has been declared insane and returned to the U. S.

Official records disclosed that Air Force Office of Special Investigations (OSI) agents knew a secret document giving data about the F8E type Sabre jet was going to be stolen before it ever was taken. The document was genuine. The Air Force made no attempt to take it.

Cascio, whom OSI agents believed to be the originator of the plot, found nobody to buy the secret document.

Cascio is charged also with 16 counts of illegal dealing in \$46,000 worth of military payment certificates used by military personnel in Japan and Korea.

It was suspicion of black marketing which got the OSI on his trail.

Murphy was chief of the Air Force postoffice in Taegu, Korea. OSI records show Cascio approached Murphy and offered to split profits if Murphy would help him funnel negotiable money orders out of Korea.

Murphy went to the OSI and was told to "play along with him."

OSI reports then relate: Cascio later approached Murphy about the possibility of selling military secrets, saying he had a friend—Sgt. Jones—in Tokyo who could supply them.

The OSI arranged a pass for Murphy to Tokyo, where Murphy met Jones in the Ambassador Hotel. The OSI had the room wired.

In Korea and Japan the next few weeks, the OSI took 20 hours

of tape recordings of conversations between Murphy and Cascio and Jones and Jones. The three never met together.

The records said the FBI data was stolen and transmitted to Korea. Cascio was arrested Sept. 21 at a

girl friend's house in Taegu. Jones was arrested the same day at Air Force headquarters in Tokyo.

Officers who had gathered to see the fight.

Sims and Johnson backed away, firing. Patrolman Knox fell, wounded in the leg. Conlon dropped to the pavement, covering the wounded Knox with his own body, and firing at Sims and Johnson as they broke and ran in different directions.

Patrolman Kenneth Walters commandeered a taxi and ordered the driver to go the wrong way along 44th street, a one-way street.

He cornered Johnson at Ninth Avenue and 45th street, Johnson threw away a .38 revolver and surrendered meekly.

Meanwhile, Sims ran north along Eighth Avenue, weaving to duck the firing of three policemen behind him.

Pedestrians dropped to the sidewalk or flattened themselves in doorways as the chase grew hotter. Patrolman James Kane, 39, heard the shooting and pounded after Sims.

Sims' 45 jammed and he whipped a .38 revolver from a pocket. He halted, spun and fired point blank at Kane, hitting him in the chest.

David Heisel, 32, of the Bronx, a motorist headed home, heard the crackle of approaching gunfire as he waited at a red light.

He decided it was time to flee. Leaping from his car, he ran for a doorway.

Sims saw the empty car, motor idling, and lunged for it. His hands fumbled at the door.

Then, around a corner, ran Patrolman Cor O'Shea, 24. He fired steadily at Sims as he charged the Negro and Sims slumped to the street, a bullet wound in the back of the head, another in the right hand.

Sims and Johnson were booked on charges of felonious assault and illegally carrying weapons. Sims was locked in a hospital prison ward.

Then, after questioning Johnson, police disclosed they'd brought a prize to earth.

O'Shea was not only brave, he was smart. As he leaned over Sims he said, "You know you're dying, don't you?"

"Yes," moaned Sims.

Then O'Shea showed him a list of robberies which the Negro carried in his pocket.

"Do you swear this list is correct?" demanded O'Shea. "Did you do all these jobs?"

"Yes," whispered Sims.

Deputy Chief Inspector James B. Leggett said the two were responsible for "dozens of jobs" in and around the city during the past year.

One job was the kidnaping of two men employed by a Harrison, N. Y., firm who were dumped in a Harlem street after \$8,000 was taken from them.

The slip of paper listed many robberies they'd committed, police said. Among them were a \$12,000 Credit Union job in Brooklyn, a \$3,700 holdup in Boston, a Brooklyn supermarket stickup which netted \$2,500 and many robberies of liquor stores, bars and groceries.

The two were shot by guards in adjacent compounds as they were plotting the meeting, the announcement stated.

In both cases the prisoners refused to obey orders to return to their barracks.
