

Maryland Loss Gets Upset Nod

NEW YORK (AP)—It took a heck of an upset to jolt the nation's football experts during the past season, there were so many of them. But they really got one Nov. 15 when Mississippi beat Maryland, 21-14.

Going into that afternoon the Maryland team, victorious in seven straight games, was rolling along in high. It was ranked third in the Associated Press poll, and a good many experts placed the Terrapins even higher.

Mississippi also was unbeaten, but had been tied twice, by Kentucky and Vanderbilt, and hardly had been given a tumble by the pollsters.

That afternoon the Ole Miss line completely outplayed Maryland's celebrated "T" quarterback, Jack Scarbath. Jimmy Lears assumed the star's role instead, and in the final quarter completed a 42-yard pass to Bud Day that set up the winning touchdown by Wilson Dillard.

No life final score was posted; Maryland lost its first game since Oct. 4, 1950, and Mississippi received a lucrative invitation to play Georgia Tech in the Sugar Bowl.

As another result, 64 out of about 150 sportswriters and broadcasters from every section of America returned questionnaires to the Associated Press listing Mississippi as the greatest upset of the 1952 football season.

Two other games drew special attention. Second, with 37 votes, was Iowa's 8-0 victory over Ohio State, of which Sec Taylor, veteran of the Moines, la., expert, said: "It was like my 8-year-old granddaughter outboxing Sugar Ray Robinson."

Third, with 34 votes, was Notre Dame's 27-21 triumph over Oklahoma.

Yank Farmhands To Edmonton

EDMONTON, Alta. (AP)—Six New York Yankee farmhands will play for Edmonton during its first season in the Class A Western International League, a club official reported Wednesday.

John Ducey said under a new working agreement with the Yankees Edmonton will receive a pitcher, two catchers, two shortstops and an outfielder when it opens in the league in 1953.

Ducey also reported the outright purchase of pitcher John Conant from the Spokane Indians, and said the Pittsburgh Pirates will send pitcher Larry Manier to Edmonton on a 30-day look-see basis.

The eight players will be the nucleus of the club which will report at Hanford, Calif., for spring training late in March.

Portland Bowler Fourth

CHICAGO (AP)—Thirty-two of the nation's top men and women bowlers started firing Thursday for the national all-star individual championship.

Junie McMahon of Chicago and Fairlawn, N. J., is seeking his third title and his second straight in the round robin matches which continue until Sunday night.

The men will roll 16 games daily compared to eight for the women.

Mrs. Marion Ladewig of Grand Rapids, Mich., winner in the three previous all-star matches for women against 15 top-ranking women kept, is defending her 1951 crown.

Both champions lost their special matches in which they competed while 160 men and 48 women battled through preliminary rounds. Fourteen placed in the finals after Wednesday's semi-finals, the men completing 36 games and the women 24.

Topping the finalists were Detroit's Keglers, Ed Lubanski with a 36-game total of 7,363 and Elvira Toepfer with 4,566 for 24 games.

St. Clair, Mich., finished fourth with 7,260 for 36 games and Ted Tadich, Tacoma, Wash., was 10th with 7,185.

Italy, India Split at Nets

BRISBANE, Australia, (AP)—India trotted out a really fine tennis player named Sumat Misra Thursday in gaining an even break with the Italians in the opening singles matches of their Davis Cup interzone semi-final.

Misra, a big tall fellow with a terrific service, blasted Rolando Del Bello off the court, 6-4, 6-4, after Fausto Gardini had put the Italians off in front with a 6-1, 6-7, 7-5, 6-2 victory over Naray Kumar.

As a result, Australian experts, for the first time, gave the Indians a chance of upsetting the European zone champions and opposing the Americans in the interzone final in Sydney next week.

Passers Lead In Yardage

NEW YORK (AP)—If you want to lead the country's major college football players in total offense, don't tuck the pigskin under the arm and run — throw the ball.

That, at least, is the lesson taught by Ted Marchbroda of Detroit, who won the honor this fall with 1,813 yards, 1,637 by passing.

Furthermore, final statistics of the NCAA Service Bureau disclosed Thursday that all of the top 10 places, and 17 of the first 20, went to aerial specialists. Nothing like it has happened before.

Marchbroda was the leading runner of the top 10 with 174 yards in rushing. As a group the 10 netted only 355 yards out of a total of 16,347, or a mere 2.2 per cent. The top 10 in 1951 ran for 4,715 yards.

Behind the Detroit senior, a transfer from St. Bonaventure, were Zeke Bratkowski, Georgia, 1,774 yards; Tommy O'Connell, Illinois, 1,734; and Don Heinrich, Washington, 1,652.

Heinrich, who played against Washington State five days after being inducted into the Army, won the passing title for the second time. He was No. 1 in 1950, but skipped 1951 because of an injury.

In his final game this year Heinrich completed seven passes for a total of 137, second highest mark ever produced. Don Klosterman of Los Angeles Loyola completed 159 a year ago. O'Connell was second this year, completing 133 in nine games. Heinrich played 10.

Revolta Cards 68

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The wide open scramble for the \$10,000 Miami Open Golf championship began Thursday over the 7,010-yard Miami Springs golf course with 145 pros and 21 amateurs competing.

With defending champion Sam Snead in California making a motion picture, together with national open champion Julius Boros, there is no outstanding favorite.

Johnny Revolta, who won in 1933, had the best practice round Wednesday when he toured the 35-35-70 layout in 68.

The big field includes golfers from 39 states and from Hawaii, Ecuador, Canada, England and Venezuela.

Low scorer among qualifiers was Andy Gaspar, pro from Pittsburgh, Pa., with a five under par 65.
