Morse Says Misunderstood

ASHLAND (AP) — Sen Wayne Morse described himself here Wednesday as a misunderstood idealist, "smeared by such pressure and selfish interest groups as the U. S. Chamber of Commerce and the National Association of Manufacturers."

Morse, who bolted the Republican Party at the last election, addressed about 400 at Southern Oregon College on his speaking tour of the state.

He complimented the work of Charles A. Sprague, Salem publisher and alternate delegate to the United Nations, and predicted a century of economic revolution.

"It is up to us to carry our form of economic capitalism to all the backward areas of the world," he said.

Morse said that World War III was not inevitable, but that "we can't win the peace with a war. We have got into a hysterical period of view and have allowed Soviet Russia to steal the peace issue with its phony peace proposals," he added.

The Oregon senator, who now calls himself an Independent, answered questions after the talk.

Oregon Nickel Plant Looms

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government gave further encouragement Wednesday to the Hanna Coal and Ore Corp., which has proposed tentatively a ferro-nickel plant in Douglas County, Ore.

The Defense Production Administration authorized a rapid tax write-off for the plant, which has been proposed as a 22 million dollar development. The DPA said 70 per cent of that could be written off for tax purposes.

The Hanna company, which has headquarters in Cleveland, has conducted exploratory work at Nickel Mountain in Douglas County. Surveys indicate there is a large deposit of low-grade nickel there.

Mature Signs Contract For Whopping \$5,000 Per Week

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Victor Mature has just signed a new three-year contract with 20th Century Fox, which will hand him \$5,000 a week and whopping yearly bonuses.

"That is news in these times, when studios are dropping high-salaried stars wherever possible. How does Mature do it?"

"They couldn't afford to let me go," he answered. "It's purely a matter of economics."

Does this sound like the self-selling Mature of old? Ah, but something new has been added. In the postwar years, Vic has given up his old hobby of making publicity and has settled down to merely making money. And that, he explained, is why his studio lifted his option at a handsome hike in salary.

"The loanouts are what did it," he said. "Every time my option comes up, the money boys take a look at my salary and say, 'This boy has got to go.' But then they start going over the books and they see what kind of money I have brought in on loanouts. Then they realize they can't get rid of me. The stockholders would scream if they fired me."

"By the time the fees are added up, the studio is actually paying me about \$1,000 a week. They wouldn't fire any star who was getting only that much."

The situation is different with other, less marketable stars. When their salaries start pushing up to \$3,000 and \$3,500, the studios start looking for ways to get out. The stars are either dropped outright or signed to one or two pictures annually.

The bosses figure it isn't worth keeping most high-priced stars on a year-round salary. They can save money by letting the players go and hiring them back at flat fees.

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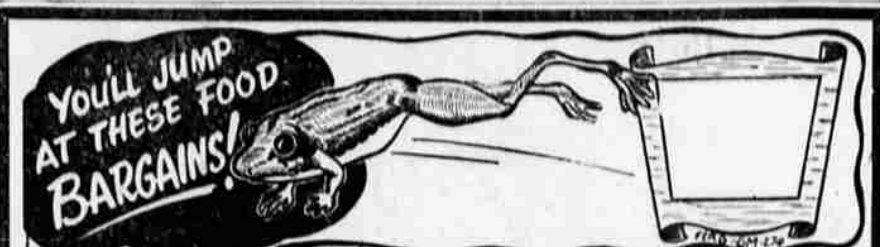
