MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Doug Ford, a young pro from Harrison, N. Y., who learned the secrets of Miami golf courses when he was stationed here as a Coast Guardsman during the war, took a one-stroke lead into the second round of the \$10,000 Miami Open tournament Friday.

While the favorites floundered in a 26-mile-an-hour wind that raked the 7,010-yard Miami Springs Municipal course, Ford carved a steady three-under-par 67 in Thursday's first 18-hole stretch.

Ford, competing in a field of 166 players from 39 states and five foreign countries, finished his opening round a stroke ahead of Art Wall, Jr., another comparative newcomer to the pro ranks, and Johnny Palmer of Charlotte, N. C.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Pre-season dopsters have ranked Washington and UCLA the top basketball outfits in the Pacific Coast Conference, so when the two teams meet Friday night it could be a preview of the finale.

The Bruins are favored in the Northern Division and the Bruins in the Southern. And in the conference way of deciding the hoop title, division champs hold a playoff.

Friday night's game and another Saturday don't count in the conference standings, but should give more than an inkling of how the two teams stack up.

Last season's Bruins surprised the Huskies in the playoff to take the title. Both are undefeated to date.

Biggest chore for the Bruins at Westwood will be stopping Bob Houder, the 6-foot 7 center with the famed hook shot. And unfortunately for UCLA, Mike Hibler, the 7-foot Bruin center, and Johnny Moore, the other pivot man, are both on the casualty list. Moore, however, is expected to start, and Hibler might see some action.

Program Studied By NCAA

KANSAS CITY (AP) — The National Collegiate A. A., which has been seeking ways and means of becoming a strong enforcement body ever since the death of the ill-fated "sanity code" two years ago, will consider a new program at its meeting in Washington next month.

A ten-point plan, embodied in a 2,200-word report from the NCAA membership committee, was released Thursday by executive director Walter Byers.

Basically, the plan calls for added powers and machinery whereby the membership committee can investigate and punish reported infractions of the association's principles of conduct.

POWERS

The new ten-point program, which has been forwarded to the association's 406 members, calls for greater powers to investigate, clearer definition of disciplinary powers, and closer co-operation with the various associations in conducting investigations and taking disciplinary action.

One important point is to "develop ways and means whereby the NCAA can obtain on the spot checks of the veracity of replies to inquiries from the association."

The present setup calls for inquiries on complaints to be referred to the head of the institution involved. Further investigation, above the conference level, must be carried on by the membership committee, a sub-committee or the executive director.

OPERATIONS

Another point in the new plan is to publicize the replies of such inquiries, so that the administrative officer of an institution is publicly committed to his statement as to the operation of intercollegiate athletics at his institution.

The membership committee reported its submission to the council in October at the same time that it recommended disciplinary action against the University of Kentucky, Bradley University and Midwestern University.

The Owls travel Sunday to Arcata, Calif., where they open Monday night in the first of two games against the Humboldt State Lumbers.

PCC Would Keep Rose Bowl

Coasters Will Ask For Pact

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Pacific Coast Conference wants to continue its Rose Bowl romance with the Big Ten.

The relationship, the Coasters inferred, has been wonderful in all its phases—except, of course, on the football field each New Year's Day.

But the Coasters want to keep up the series, despite six straight losses.

The PCC faculty representatives formally voted Thursday to invite the Big Ten to renew their pact for another three years when the present one expires Jan. 1, 1954.

An answer was asked by June 5, 1953.

The invitation, it was made clear, is contingent on one vital factor—namely, that bowl games are not ruled out by the NCAA when it meets Jan. 9 to 11 in Washington, D. C.

CONCLUSION

In other conference decisions which concluded the PCC winter meeting, athletic directors, after hours of discussion, were unable to determine a policy on live television of football games which will be offered as a recommendation at the NCAA convention.

So they adjourned and called a special meeting. It will be held Sunday, Dec. 21, at the Cliff Hotel in San Francisco.

The TV problem, they said, was just too involved and important to thrash out in the time allotted.

In an important move for conference football fans, the PCC said that effective in 1956 the league, exclusive of Idaho, will play a home-and-home round robin grid schedule.

10 GAMES

A nine-game limit schedule which was to have gone into effect that year was increased to 10 games. Thus each PCC team will play seven conference games and, if desired, play three non-conference contests.

Idaho's position was uncertain. Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt, asked for an opinion, said Idaho will have the right to vote on or be voted upon in the Rose Bowl selection ballot. They would be eligible to play in the bowl if selected.

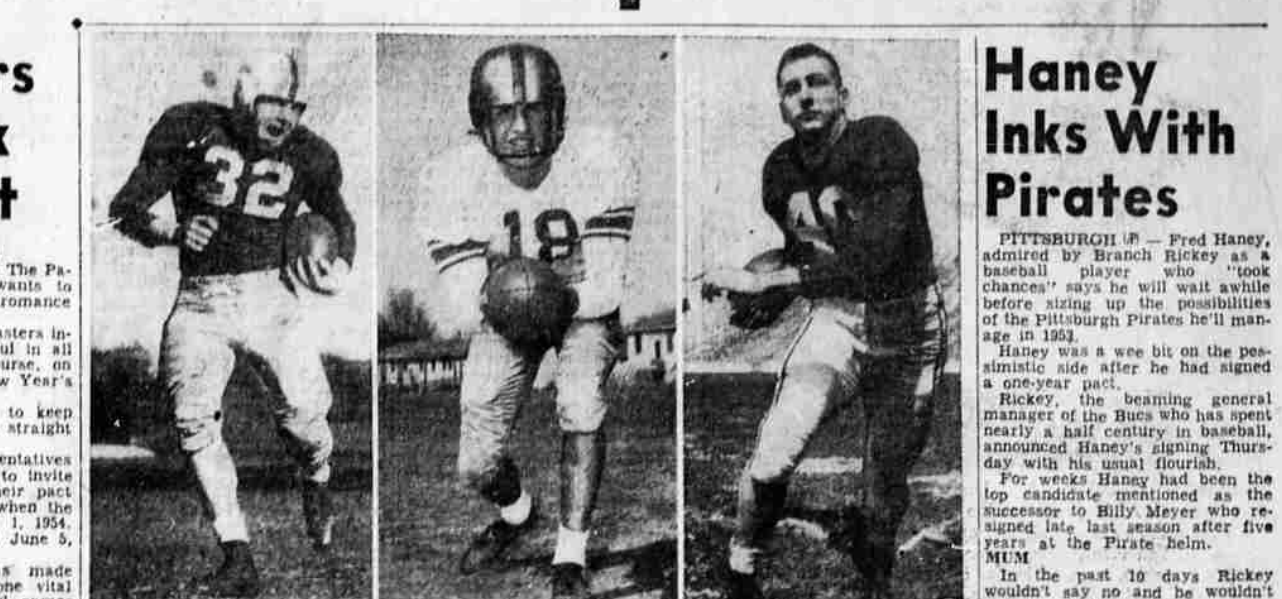
Everett, Washington, the conference's press spokesman, thought otherwise.

This fall Idaho played only the four other Northern Division teams—Washington, Washington State, Oregon and Oregon State—but they had the right to vote in the Rose Bowl ballot for Southern California.

New conference officers elected were: Dean Thomas Kerr, Idaho, president; Emmet Moore, Washington State, secretary; John Jones, UCLA, treasurer; Claude Snyder, Stanford, representative at large for the commissioner.

There was no change in the individual school control of radio and TV for sports other than football.

Press, Radio Would Junk Grid's Platoon System, 'Sucker Shift'

NEW YORK (AP) — When the National Football Rules Committee meets next month it should:

1. Rule out the two-platoon system.

2. Allow unlimited substitution.

3. Clarify the pass interference rule so as to (A) inflict fewer penalties on doubtful interference and (B) protect the receiver from roughness because interference isn't called.

4. Do away with the so-called "sucker shift."

5. Eliminate the dangerous "helmet block."

6. Return the goal posts to the goal line.

7. Permit running with recovered fumbles.

8. Do away with fumbles official.

9. Require a fifth official to watch for downfield infractions.

10. Eliminate a couple of the officials who keep getting in the way or at least take their whistles away.

SIMPLE

It's all very simple. All the rules-makers have to do is figure out the wording of new rules to bring about all these things and a few more.

Actually these 10 points take in the most frequent suggestions offered by sports writers and broadcasters replying to the Associated

Press post-season questionnaire. There were many others and a solid bloc who voted "leave the rules alone."

By far the greatest number of proposals concerned substitution and opinion was almost equally divided as to whether the rules should be tightened to end the platoon system or should provide for unlimited substitution as in pro football.

PUBLICITY

The publicity given this season to shifts which tend to draw the opposition offense and which, according to some coaches, are designed to do just that, brought a demand for a clearer definition of the illegal shift. And a good many experts agreed that pass interference is the hardest penalty to call or resulted in more run-backs. One school held that the defenders are "clobbering" receivers and getting away with it while another insisted that interference is called too often in questionable circumstances.

The rash of "fumble" during the past season brought fresh demands that players be allowed to run with the ball after recovering fumbles and for other changes.

One proposal was to rule out fumbles entirely. "A team would retain possession at the point of the fumble," he wrote. "The roughest play in football comes when

a team tries to steal the ball. And, after all, what's the point of the game—finishing in offense and defense, or how rough can we get?"

The replies showed increasing concern over unnecessary roughness and the frequent brawls during games. There was a strong demand, mostly from the South, for abolition of the "helmet block"—when a blocker lowers his head and rams his hard plastic helmet into a would-be tackler's face.

ROUGHING

Roughing kickers and passers and changing the fair catch rule to provide better protection for punt receivers also were brought up. One writer proposed banning the use of forearms and elbows in blocking, returning to the old shoulder block. Others thought the rule limiting the use of forearms wasn't being enforced strictly enough while several said that mandatory expulsion from the game was too severe a penalty for illegal use of the arms.

But more than half of the questionnaires either said "no change" or left the space blank.

Hill counted 52 members of the varsity at Thursday's practice as USC opened formal drills for its Rose Bowl game with Wisconsin New Year's Day. Added to this were 11 Spartans or junior varsity, giving him a squad of 63 for the pre-bowl grind. Hill said he hopes a few more turn out from the scrub ranks to help condition the varsity.

Bacone Choice In Junior Bowl

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The seventh annual Junior Rose Bowl football game Saturday most likely will turn out to be a free-scoring affair, despite the outstanding defensive records of the competitors—Hartnell Junior College of Salinas, Calif., and Bacone J.C. of Muskogee, Okla.

Both teams specialize on offense. Hartnell scored 260 points in 10 games, Bacone 363 in nine. Hartnell allowed its opponents only 57 points, Bacone 86.

Bacone has been established as a six-point pre-game favorite.
