## "This is the Life," TV Preview, Slated Sunday

A special television preview has been scheduled for the Zion Lutheran Church this Sunday, 7:30 p.m., featuring two films, the first two installments of the latest family-style television program entitled "This is the Life."

The program went over television for the first time this last September in the intervening two

months it has climbed to the point where it is the most broadcast program in television being seen over 67 stations.

The films tell of episodes in the life of a typical Christian family and were produced at a cost of in excess of \$750,000 by the Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod. Filmed in Hollywood they are professionally done and suitable for the entire family. They are being shown in areas yet unreached by television with the purpose of determining audience reaction.

The audience will fill out reaction forms which will then be collected with program improvement in view.

The program was selected by the National Council of Churches in America to appear on the half hour of free time allotted to it.

## Morse Backs Hell's Canyon

**BAKER (R) — Sen. Wayne Morse** plumped for Hell's Canyon Dam in two Eastern Oregon speeches Thursday, then headed for Western Oregon and a windup of his speaking tour of the state this week end.

He told audiences in Pendleton and Baker that benefits from the dam would be great, and said the Eisenhower administration's attitude on this proposed dam would provide the tip-off on what kind of administration the country would have.

There is "no project for which there is stronger economic justification and against which there are fewer arguments of any substance or material consequence," Morse said.

The Idaho Power Company's opposition to Hell's Canyon Dam he dismissed as so much "hocus-coccus," and added that the company's plans for three dams on the Snake River would fall far short of the benefits to be derived from the Hell's Canyon project.

Support of Hell's Canyon Dam is not in opposition to free enterprise, Morse said, asserting that multi-purpose dams "do more than anything else to build up private enterprise."

He spoke before 120 persons at a Chamber of Commerce luncheon in Pendleton, and before 210 at a night time meeting in Baker, sponsored by the Baker County Commercial Club.

He was scheduled Friday to make a recording at Portland, to speak before the Portland City Club at noon and to address a group at the Portland AFL Labor Temple at night.

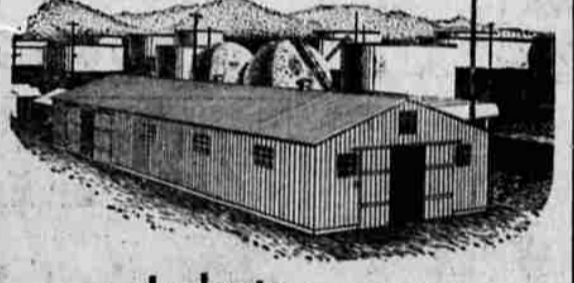

## Sound Good, Picture Bad Say Viewers of Opera TV

**NEW YORK (R) —**When the Metropolitan Opera's famed golden curtains went up last night, a silver screen audience coast to coast settled back to enjoy the telecast of Bizet's "Carmen."

More than 3,000 opera lovers at the Met itself were joined electronically by thousands of other patrons of 31 theaters in 27 cities. Total seating capacity of the theaters was estimated at 60,000. Reports on attendance ranged from half full to capacity.

The closed circuit telecast—you couldn't see it on your home TV set—unanimously was pleasing to the ear. But the picture reproduction got few good notices.

There was a sprinkling of mink in some movie houses but the bulk of the TV viewers wore their weekday clothes and a few brought the children. Popcorn was banned in many of the film palaces.

The met prices ranged from \$1.25 for standing room to an \$8 top. The theater scale was \$1.20 to \$7.50—the top rate charged here in New York City.

The cross-country audience watched and listened to Rise Stevens in the title role. Richard Tucker as Don Jose, Nadine Conner as Micaela and Robert Merrill as Escamillo.

Cries of "bravo" at the Met echoed in the theaters, whose audiences behaved just about like that in the staid old house at 39th Street—some came in late, whispered a bit, applauded various numbers.

Fading and fuzziness of the picture was general, but the audience didn't seem to mind too much.

Most of the complaints about picture reception came from theater managers and music critics. Here are some reactions on the TV version:

Boston: "Sound excellent, quality of picture far from good"—"Interesting and musically superb but everything looked peculiarly flat."

Los Angeles: "Applause and many braves"—"Lobby comments ran from 'wonderful' to 'terrible'—"Some fuzziness due to natural blowup of TV picture." One movie exhibitor said: "This is the way we're going to get our customers back."

Kansas City: "Picture excellent."

but sound superb"—"Audience applauded as if live show." Detroit: "Sound very good, close-up good, but long shot blurry. No fancy dress but theater omitted popcorn and potato chips."
