Seven Experts Describe Basin

Seven experts on the Klamath Country and its potential yesterday recorded 30 minutes of description of this area on a tape which is to be sent to Kiwanis Clubs throughout the West for rebroadcast.

The panel, under the direction of C. "Bud" Larkin, included Traffic Mr. George Barich, Chamber of Commerce; Lorenz Co. General Mgr. George P. Davis; Klamath County Agent C. A. Henderson; KPCA Secy.-Treas. Lee McMullen; Rogue River District Ranger Robert Cooper; Hercules Powder Co. Plant Supv. Lytle Rothenberger; and Federal Game Management Officer James Savage.

Barich noted the distributive and industrial potential of this area, and the fact that the Klamath Falls area has the five necessities of industrial development—transportation, power, water, sites and recreational facilities. Davis pointed out Klamath's strategic position for distribution throughout the West. Henderson described the area's agricultural production, and the fight now underway in the "land for the ducks or land for men" scuffle.

McMullen described the vast livestock holdings in this area and the more-than \$9,000,000 annual income from that part of the industry. Cooper noted that Klamath pine is among the finest anywhere, and that the annual timber cut here has leveled off at the annual production rate.

Cooper Gets Offers of Aid

Telegram and messages of sympathy and of requests for leniency were received by Dr. Miller E. Cooper, Klamath Falls dentist, was on trial at U.S. District Court in Portland for income tax evasion. Enthusiasm increased steadily during a concert here last night by de Paur's Infantry Chorus. A near-capacity Community Concert crowd responded to the first couple of numbers with polite but rather brief applause. But as the splendid male chorus proceeded through the program, listeners awakened to the beautiful artistry of the singing and applause grew more robust and prolonged. At the close of the program, Conductor Leonard de Paur and his men were accorded a rousing ovation and had to do two encores. The chorus was founded by de Paur as a soldier troop during World War Two. Many of the men served under Capt. de Paur. In their initial concert tour last year, the singers broke many records and were eventually acclaimed for their outstanding television and recording work. Variety of the program last night was entirely unexpected by this reviewer. The many types of music offered was indicative of the ability of de Paur, who was once the great Hall Johnson's assistant.
