Baugh, Albert Bow Out

NEW YORK (AP) — Sammy Baugh and Frankie Albert, two of the game's all-time greats, call it a career Sunday, while three teams battle it out for National Football League playoff berths.
Playoff berths in both the American and National Conference are at stake. Cleveland's perennial champion Browns can wrap up the American title with a triumph over the New York Giants at the Polo Grounds.
The National Conference crown lies between the Detroit Lions and Los Angeles Rams. The Lions can take a half game edge over the Rams when they clash with the homeless Dallas Texans Saturday. The Texans have won only one game in 11 starts. The Rams entertain the tough Pittsburgh Steelers Sunday.
CLEVELAND, which never has lost a conference title in six years while operating in the defunct All-American Conference and the National League, needs only a victory or a tie to make it seven straight.
The Philadelphia Eagles are the only team with a chance to catch the Browns. The Eagles can tie the Browns for the brass ring by beating the Washington Redskins while the Giants upset Cleveland.
In the event both races wind up deadlocked the Eagles and Browns will meet in Philadelphia next Sunday and the Rams and Lions in Detroit. Should both races be decided the championship playoff will be staged at Cleveland Dec. 21.

Baugh, a Washington landmark, will make his final appearance for the Redskins in the game against the Eagles at Washington. Albert hangs up his cleats at San Francisco where his 49ers entertain the Green Bay Packers. WASHINGTON gained a measure of revenge Friday night in UCLA's cramped Westwood gym where the Huskies' Pacific Coast Conference basketball title hopes were erased last spring.
In their first meeting since that championship series, the potent Huskies took the Bruins into camp, 53-49, after trailing by one point at halftime, 23-27.
The two giants of the West Coast go to a final Saturday night at Los Angeles.
Two other Northern Division PCC clubs also saw action, with Idaho's Vandals having an easy time against Whitman, 59-31, at Moscow, and Oregon State dropping a close one to Santa Clara, 68-66, at Corvallis.
HOOK SHOT
