## Cold Weather Hits South

Sub-freezing weather was the rule in much of the south early Monday while in the northeast heavy snow and rain storms moved into Canada, leaving 22 deaths and tangled communications in their wake.

Gordonsville, Va., was the coldest town in the south, with a 10 above zero reading.

Pensacola, Fla., registered 27, though early morning readings in the 30's and 40's were more common further south in the state.

Snow flurries were reported at three places in Florida Sunday—an extremely rare occurrence.

In the northeast, week end storms hit New England and the Buffalo, N. Y., area, causing 22 deaths and disrupting transportation and communications.

Most of the deaths were in automobile accidents on icy or snow-covered roads. Others were attributed to heart attacks while shoveling snow.

The New England storm brought up to 22 inches of snow in Northern Vermont while about 12 inches fell in some sections of New York state.

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## Sothorn New Girl After 2-Year Sickness

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—"I learned a lot during my illness, I learned that the important thing is not how much money you've got or how much people love you. The important thing is your health."

This was Anna Sothorn talking. Not the flip, wise-cracking Maine of film fame. She was a new person, tempered by two years of illness that brought her near death.

"It started three years ago," she recalled. "I had just finished 'Nancy goes to Rio,' and I was very tired. But they wanted me to go to London to appear at the command performance. They had wanted me many times before, so I decided to go. I thought the excitement would pep me up."

"We had five or six wonderful weeks in London. I was enjoying myself, but I couldn't understand why I was so tired. As we were taking the train to Cherbourg for the boat trip back, Roz Russell kept staring at me. She asked me if I felt well, and I admitted that

I was tired. Later, she told me she noticed I had the yellowest eyes she had ever seen."

Ann had a spree in New York and went to Sun Valley for skiing. Then she was stricken. "The doctors couldn't understand what had hit me," she said. "At first they thought I had gone off my rocker."

The trouble was finally diagnosed as a virus infection of the liver. Recovery was slow and full of disappointment, at times her life was uncertain.

"For a whole year I could do nothing," she remarked. "I couldn't have radio or TV, because noise was painful. I found things to do. I embroidered little lace pillowcases by the hour. I sewed designs on slippers and did needlepoint. I also did a lot of thinking. You have time to evaluate your entire life when you are ill."

The actress emerged from her illness early this year. She found she had to carve a whole new career for herself.

"I had lost the momentum that

every acting career must have to be successful," she said. "I had to start all over again. I decided the best thing to do would be to find the hardest work possible. So I went back to the stage."

Her Broadway show was not a roaring success, but it taught her how to work again.

"Like all the other stars at MGM, I had been living in a glass cage," she observed. "Life was beautiful there; everything was done for us. I had forgotten what real work was."

Ann also took on the hard work of doing some live TV dramas in New York. Then she returned to

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out of it. "It hit the ground in a matter of seconds," Welch said. The plane was from Paine Air Force Base. It was on a routine training flight, Paine officers said.

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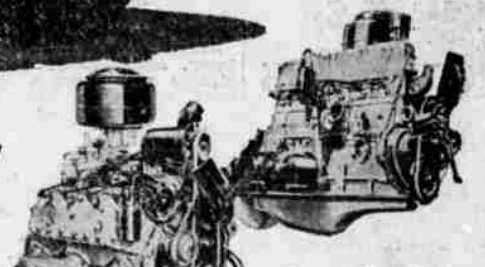
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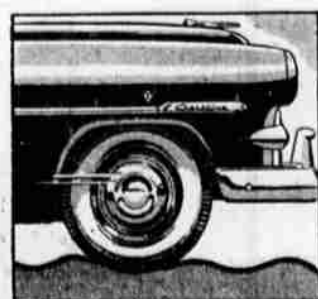
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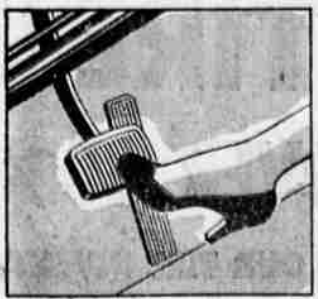
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
