Oretech Splits With SOC

The Oregon Tech Owls have split in two cage series thus far but hope for a clean sweep tonight and tomorrow night against Humboldt State in Arcata.

The Owls earned a split with Southern Oregon Saturday night, winning 58-55, after dropping Friday's game, 50-63.

Tom Schubert and Jerry Wyatt, Oretech's scoring stars, found the range Saturday to dunk 18 and 17 points.

Wyatt had his corner shots working and Schubert was hot on his swing shot as the Owls after a second quarter, headed into the second half with a 16-14 lead and bulged their advantage to 37-28 at the half.

Ken Kimura scored 16 for Southern Oregon but 10 came from the foul line. Leon Keefe ended with 15, but scored just one field goal.

In fact, the Raiders stayed in the game from the charity stripe. They scored 29 via the foul line and only 13 field goals.

Oretech had 20 field goals and just 18 free throws.

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Pels Win, Plan Trek To Chico

Murder in Midfield

YANKEE FOOTBALL AMAZES BRITISH

LONDON (AP) — Baffled British sportswriters couldn't figure it all out but agreed this game of American football is just wonderful stuff.

"It's molder!" headlined the Sunday Graphic, "Mayhem, Hula and bands," exclaimed Reynolds News. "Murder in midfield," said the Sunday Express. But everyone agreed it was a lot of fun.

All the excitement was centered about London's view of a full-scale American football game with all the trimmings—grass bands, pretty cheerleaders in short skirts, a fist-fight in the stands and a couple of dogs chasing around the field.

FINAL
It was the final of the U. S. Air Force's European football championships Saturday at the big Wembley Stadium, and some 25,000 had gathered to watch the Fursey Eagles from Germany beat the Burtonwood (England) Bulls 26-7.

British sportswriters, to whom football used to mean the comparatively gentleman-like game of rugby or just soccer, sat in on the proceedings and tried to explain it all to its readers.

"Twenty-two mastedons in leather shoulders and nylon knees crouched facing each other in what looked like 'the dance of the chuckers-out,'" said one Sunday Graphic.

"At some secret signal, utterly ignoring the ball, the 22 leaped at each other's throats. A whistle blew and the debris was removed."

BODIES
Stretcher-bearers kept carting off the bodies and the score apparently depended on a cornerer's report, the Graphic explained.

"Then the final whistle blew, and we all gave three hearty cheers to the ambulance which had won a fine game," the Graphic added.

But what impressed the British most was the noise and the cheering. The Sunday Pictorial couldn't quite figure out what was being said but explained it simply: "Pretty girls leaped up and down in Maori war dances to stir up the crowd, shouting: 'How do you like your oysters—raw! Raw! Raw!'"

The Graphic described the cheerleaders as "six dainty American
